

Covid update and Duty of Care

Covid update

You will need to sign in with your membership number, name, time of arrival and phone number. You will need to sign out when leaving. Your temperature will be checked. Be prepared for limited numbers in the building. All computers will be in use. You must wear a face mask at all times whilst in the building.

As the Delta and Omicron forms of the virus are aerosols, doors will have to remain open to create a draft to allow through ventilation and the upright fans will be used to ventilate the computer area. Any food and drinks should be consumed outside.

Cleaning of all surfaces will need to be done after each user. All books, CDs, maps, etc will need to be quarantined after use for 48 hours.

Remember you can always borrow books in person or via click and collect.

We aim to maintain as healthy an environment as possible at the NFHS Rooms and all are welcome to attend. Remember to wear your mask at all times and socially distance. If you are still hesitant, wear an N95 mask or wear two masks to safeguard yourself from the aerosol droplets.

If you are unwell, then please stay at home until you are well. Organise click and collect to continue your research from home and have a friend collect the books for you.

June monthly meeting overview

Overview of June's monthly meeting presented by Julie Keating

Penal settlement – after an attempt to establish a penal settlement was unsuccessful in 1801, a successful attempt was made in 1804. An increasing number of convicts had been escaping from Sydney into the bush so an alternative location was required for re-offending convicts that was far enough away from Sydney that they couldn't return.

Newcastle Gaol – the first gaol was built about 1814 by Lt James Thompson. In 1817-18, Captain Wallis had a new gaol built near where Fort Scratchley is today and the old gaol was converted for hospital use. The new gaol was used until 1848 when prisoners were relocated to East Maitland.

Christ Church – around 1812 a slab hut was constructed for church services, being demolished in 1817 and replaced with a more permanent structure which survived till 1884. 1882 saw the commencement of the present cathedral.

Parsonage - located in Church Street, was first occupied in 1821 and used till 1899.

Court House/Post Office/Customs House – the first Court House (or Sessions House) was built in 1822 (demolished 1890). It also housed the first Post Office (1828) and Customs House (1839). The purpose-built Customs House was completed in 1876 however was unoccupied for a year as there was no money for fittings and furniture.

Post Office and Telegraph Office – Post Office moved to the former Commissariat Depot c1853. Telegraph Office opened in 1861 and also housed the Post Office. Purpose built Post Office opened in 1873. Post Office moved to corner of Hunter and Bolton Streets in 1903. The previous Post Office was then occupied by the Public Works and the Telegraph Office by the Police.

Military Barracks – erected in 1842 on the Parsonage site. After soldiers left the area, the AA Company used the facility for accommodation until 1853. It was then used by the Police and Department of Works. In 1867 it was used for a girl's reformatory before being taken over in 1871 by James Fletcher Mental Hospital.

Fort Scratchley – named after one of the Government advisors Col Peter Scratchley, was operational by 1886 and has been enlarged over time. In June 1942 a Japanese submarine shelled Newcastle and the guns on Fort Scratchley returned fire, being "the first time in Australian history that heavy guns were fired at hostile vessels from an Australian coastal defence".

Macquarie Pier – constructed between 1817 and 1872 to connect Nobbys to the headland to improve safety for vessels entering the harbour.

Pilot Service – was introduced in 1812 to assist with entering and navigating Newcastle Harbour, with the station initially located in the Stockade buildings. The first official Government pilot was Robert Whitmore, a convict. In 1866 the pilot station moved closer to Nobbys and remained there until 1946 when the service was terminated.

Hospital – the first building used as a hospital was purchased from Sir Henry Brown Hayes c1810. A newer hospital was erected in 1866 funded by public subscription, a major benefactor being James Hannell, the first Mayor of Newcastle. The Hannell wing opened in 1884.





To turn them on, press the power button (it's an orangey colour) and they will begin heating the rooms. Please do not play with the settings on the remotes. All remotes are beside the doors but the one in the blue room is behind the door. You will need to close the doors for them to operate effectively and turn the fans on in the blue room and office area to distribute the heat. While it is recommended that we work in a well ventilated area while indoors, if the weather dictates that the air conditioning be used, please close the doors to contain the heat/cold and wear a face mask to limit spread of diseases.



There will be a Newcastle Family History trade table at the conference in September. You might notice that the fluorescent lights in the Reception area and entrance hallway have been upgraded to LED's. We were able to use a NSW Government scheme to have the lights changed for a cost of \$33.00, under a small business scheme available at the moment.




