

Overview of February Monthly Meeting

It was fantastic to see so many members and visitors join our February monthly meeting where we had a very interesting and sometimes amusing presentation by our member, Dr Jude Conway. There were 28 people in our rooms and 15 on Zoom to listen about the life of Prof Beryl Nashar, the first University of Newcastle Geology Professor. Prof Nashar actually had a number of firsts throughout her life and career.

Beryl was born in Maryville, Newcastle on 9 July 1923. She first attended Tighes Hill Public School before moving to Cardiff Public School when her father commenced working in that area. She was always top of the class. Beryl was selected to attend Newcastle Girls' High School where she studied English, French, German, Latin, Maths, Science (Geology). She excelled in all subjects except for German which she disliked. Bervl admitted she had a crush on her science teacher, Lillian Whiteoak. Beryl completed her leaving certificate twice, having passed the first time, but not getting the scholarship she wanted. In her second attempt, she was first in the state for Geology.

She attended the University of Sydney studying the Earth Sciences - Geology

and Geography – as well as Maths and Chemistry, graduating with 1st class honours in 1947, won the University Medal. Beryl's research thesis was the geology of the Stanhope district, in the Hunter Valley. When she was in the field, she fell in love with every rock. In 1948 Beryl had to decide if she would become a geologist in the field or a teacher. She completed her teaching degree and commenced teaching at Home Science Girls' High School in Newcastle. After only one day there, she was offered a role as a demonstrator at the University of Tasmania which she accepted, stating she didn't like playground duty or signing on and off. She paid up her bond and left.

Prior to accepting the role at the University of Tasmania, Beryl had applied for a Rotary Foundation Fellowship. Professor Carey, head of the department in Tasmania, said it didn't matter and they would



support her. She was successful in gaining the Fellowship (the first woman to ever receive this). So, in 1949 Beryl headed to Cambridge for 12 months, to the Department of Mineralogy and Petrology, taking her Tasmanian rock collection with her.

Whilst at Cambridge, Beryl met her future husband, Ali Nashar, an Egyptian philosopher. He proposed to her; however, Beryl chose to come home for two years to be sure of her decision. At the end of her PhD, Beryl became the first Australian person to gain a PhD in Geology at an Australian university. Her PhD was on the Cambrian volcanic rocks of Tasmania. In July 1952 Beryl married Ali in Cairo and their son Tarek Ali was born in November 1953 back home in Newcastle Hospital. She did return to Egypt at the beginning of 1954, however because of political upheaval in Egypt, Ali had to flee to Lebanon. It wasn't the best sort of place politically to bring up their son, so towards the end of '54 it was decided she would come back to Australia and Ali would follow when he could. This never eventuated and Ali died in 1980, never actually having lived in Australia – only visiting, and Beryl and Tarek would visit over there. Ali's last job was in Monaco but he returned to Egypt only two weeks before passing. He knew he was dying and wanted to be on Egyptian soil.

In 1955, Beryl applied for and was successful in gaining the position of Geology Lecturer at the newly formed Newcastle University College (at the time in the grounds of the Tighes Hill College). She became the second Geology staff member at the University and the first female staff member at the university. She loved the teaching, her only disappointment was that she could not do any research because there was no equipment.

In 1968, Beryl became the Dean of the Faculty of Science at the University of Newcastle, being elected by 60 male staff. Another first – the first woman Dean of Science in Australia. Her department was known as being innovative; she introduced vivas (oral testing). She also had to be very diplomatic in a male world.

Beryl was very involved in the community and sat on a number of committees and boards. There were University committees; the Board of Directors of the Royal Newcastle Hospital; the Board of Directors of the Greater Newcastle Building Society; the secondary schools Board; the academic committee of the Higher Education Board; the Hunter Valley Research Foundation; the committee to achieve autonomy for the university; president of the Newcastle branch of BPW (Business and Professional Women); national president of the Australian Federation of BPW; international president of BPW; and a few others. Beryl stated that she wanted to be involved because it would have been a backward step for women if she declined.

Beryl had a great deal of public recognition and in 1972, before the Order of Australia came into being, she was made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire. Beryl also found she was good at writing books for school children and published four books. She passed away in 2012. Her son, Tarek, became a Consulting Geologist, married a French lady, and lives in Sydney.
