

A huge thank you to all our willing volunteers, without you, FHANQ could not continue to operate.



- Editorial team members for Relatively Speaking



Identify WHO Is In Your Old Family Photos

Unusual Sources for Finding Old Family Photos

Members Ask:



What can I do to help me find photographs of my ancestors?

Fire, floods, moves from town to town, rats, mice, mildew, and numerous other things meant that my immediate family has no photographs of anyone prior to my grandparents. We have very few photos of us because our family didn't have a camera and duplicate photo printing was expensive.

This topic is too large to cover completely in this edition of Relatively Speaking. There are a number of simple steps to take to maximize your chances of finding the elusive photographs. Life becomes much easier once you find your family packrat (hoarder).

Preliminary research is required and suggested steps are included for each person you are researching:

- Identify what you already have, who and where the photos were taken;
- Identify all photos other family members may have. (Beg, plead, to copy)
 - If there are commercial photographs identify content, studio location or photographer and date if known.
 - Check the back of any photos for notes/ names
- Contact even distant cousins/ family members. In the past they were more likely to share letters and photos
- Establish a time line for each person you are researching. Here Trove, family stories, and google search can be a good place to start.
 - List full name, aliases, nicknames
 - List important dates of events and places of residence/work
 - Birth, christening, churches, schools, employment, marriages, birth and place of birth of children, death
 - List other activities by date and place e.g. sport, recreational activities, community engagements, military service
 - Property details ownership or where other family may have resided
 - Any trade qualifications and where they were obtained
 - Employment records and locations
 - Locations and dates identified in newspaper articles
 - List any other dates or places which may be relevant
- Examine any photos you already have and identify each person. If there is someone you cannot identify, circulate the photo among your family and family friends
- Decide which person you are going to find first and search methodically.

More Members Ask:

I have created a timeline for each member of my immediate family. How does this help me find photos?

Timelines are a very useful tool when researching an individual. A timeline allows you to see gaps in the record. These gaps beg questions, which often send the researcher in a totally different direction seeking answers.



Did you ever consider that using the locations might help to identify other family, family friends, neighbours and other local resources where you may find photographs?

Your individual timeline for your family member can be a very useful aid.

These steps will assist in identifying what to search for in each location

- Select one person initially
- Check the various locations this person has lived, worked, studied or visited during their lifetime
- Identify the periods of time this person was associated with each place
- Identify which key life events occurred in each locality during this time for the specific person and other family members
- Compare timelines with those of siblings and parents
- Identify family friends or neighbours who were resident in the same locality at the same time

In addition to normal on-line search methods, contact your local family history or genealogy group, search on line for genealogy groups/ history groups in the location of interest. These groups are staffed by volunteers.

Politely ring them, email them, or contact them via Facebook etc. and ask them if they can be of assistance. Be clear in what you seek. Don't forget to thank them.



Did you know?

The most highly decorated of all the millions of infantrymen who served in the armies of Great Britain and its empire in World War 1 moved to Blairmack Station, Muckadilla, Queensland after being discharged from AIF in 1920.

In 1928, he purchased Glenlyon station, Richmond, a 74,000-acre (29,947 ha) grazing property where he lived for the rest of his life.

We salute Lieutenant Colonel Henry William Murray, VC, CMG, DSO (and Bar), DCM (1880–1966) in our Lest We Forget tribute

In World War II, he commanded the **26th Battalion in North Queensland** until April 1942; in August, he became lieutenant-colonel commanding his local battalion of the Volunteer Defence Corps; he retired from military service on 8 February 1944.

He remains the most highly decorated Australian soldier of all time. -oo0oo-

disappearing into yet another amazing rabbit hole.



The FHANQ odyssey began with an obituary in 1939 for Mr. Gustav Pass (1863-1939) in the Townsville Morning Bulletin

As with most obituaries, there is a degree of latitude with facts. Gustav Adolphus Pass age 10 arrived in Australia at Port Denison, Bowen in 1873. He was accompanied by his parents and 5 siblings. As a family, they settled in the Mackay area, but from there spread across Queensland.



1888-1922, he was on Croydon goldfields where his children were born. He owned a number of businesses including Hotels, hardware suppliers, timber yards and general stores, became a councillor and one time Mayor Croydon Shire Council.

1923-1939 - In Townsville, he returned to the business of building, and owned a substantial number of properties at the time of his death. 18 of which were auctioned to finalise his estate in 1940

His sons followed his example of keen business acumen, civic duty and quiet philanthropy.

His grandsons served in WW2.

Other family names of descendants include Lloyd, Wilson, Ganly, Edmunds and Williams families. Principal residences and business were in Bowen, Brisbane, Croydon, Charters

Towers, Collinsville, Mirani, Mackay, Townsville, Innisfail, Rockhampton, and Ithica.



Family members were well represented in the local Chambers of Commerce, as councillors and council member in their local Councils/Shires and in community organisations.

Since the Pass family arrived in 1873, the family has expanded and dispersed across Queensland and Australia. Photos and memorabilia

have become misplaced over the last 150 years.

Trove proved invaluable in supplementing known information. We are still seeking photos of family members and businesses associated with the Pass family. **Can you help**?




I remember the smell of Castrol R, rubber, chips and hot dogs at the speedway.

Lest We Forget

Murray, Henry William (Harry) VC, CMG, DSO & Bar, DCM

Harry Murray was born at Evandale, Tasmania, on 1 December 1880.

He had already seen 6 years service in a militia unit, the Australian Field Artillery, in Launceston before moving to Western Australia in 1908

He enlisted as a private in the AIF at Blackboy Hill, Western Australia on 30 September 1914. SERN 315



He landed at Gallipoli on 25 April 1915 as a member of one of the 16th Battalion's two machine-gun crews. Murray was wounded several times and spent June 1915 in hospital.

WW1 War service: Egypt, Gallipoli, Western Front

Wounded three times at Gallipoli (25 April, 30 May, 8 August) and in France (August 1916 at Mouquet Farm).

Promotions: Appointed Lance Corporal, 13 May 1915; Sergeant, 13 August 1915; commissioned as 2nd Lieutenant, 13 August 1915.

Detached to 2nd American Corps, 24 September-2 October 1918.

Medals: Victoria Cross, Commander of the Order of St Michael & St George, Distinguished Service Order & Bar, , Croix de Guerre (France), 1914-15 Star, British War Medal, Victory Medal


"Lieutenant-Colonel Henry William Murray (1880–1966), was the British Empire's most highly decorated soldier in the First World War. ...

... A modest man, Murray attributed his actions in combat to discipline rather than bravery." Peter Henning

The historian of the 16th Battalion wrote of him: 'To Murray belongs the honour of rising from a machine-gun private to the command of a machine-gun battalion of 64 guns, and of receiving more fighting decorations than any other infantry soldier in the British Army in the Great War'.

Peru is the third largest country in South America, with a 2,400 km long coastline at the South Pacific Ocean. It borders **Bolivia**, **Brazil**, **Chile**, **Colombia**, and **Ecuador**.

Peru has a population of more than 31 million inhabitants (in 2015). Capital and largest city is Lima.

Principal languages are Spanish, Quechua, and Aymara.

There are at least 5 distinct ethnic groups

The history of Peru is long and at times, bloody.

Migration to, through and from Peru has created some difficulty

Peru Catholic Church Records (1603-1992)

An index to and images of registers of baptism, confirmation, marriage, premarriage investigations, marriage dispensations and deaths; and parish censuses. The records cover around 40 million entries.

Peru Baptism Index (1556-1930)

An index to over 4.1 million Catholic baptism records, listing parents' names.

Peru Marriage Index (1600-1940)

An index to over 450,000 marriage records, including date and place of marriage and the names of the bride and groom.

Peru Catholic Death Index (1750-1930)

An index to around 100,000 death records. The index may contain name, age, gender, parents' names, and place of burial and date of burial.



Daphne "Rose" Colless was a Kuku-Yalanji woman who went to school at **Jarvisfield** via Ayr before the family moved to Cairns where she then attended Woree School.



This amazing woman worked tirelessly to improve the situation of indigenous people. At 45, she became a Liaison Officer with the Department of Aboriginal and Island Affairs (DAIA), then worked with the Aboriginal Legal Service (3.5 years).later working for eight months at the state-level Aboriginal and Islander Commission.

1984 – She was recognised for her continuing efforts with an Order of Australia Medal for service to Aboriginal welfare. .

1987- The Human Rights Medal was presented to her. Click on the link to see the citation. This was for her outstanding work for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Far North Queensland.

Daphne Rose Colless was the first recipient of this award.

Footnote:

Harry Doyle was a 16 year old from Yarrabah when he lied about his age to enlist in the imperial army and went on to fight with the 11th Light Horse Regiment in the Middle East in 1917. Trooper Doyle died in 1967 in Cairns but his gravesite was unmarked until Rose Colless raise funds for a headstone.


In the past newspapers had many uses, from lining shelves, and birdcages, under the lino and wrapping parcels, to a more basic use in the outdoor lavatory.

Book Review..... Australian Battlers Remember

Do you remember your parents or family discussing the Great Depression of the 1930s? FHANQ has a number of books on its shelves dealing with life and times during those difficult years. One recently included in FHANQ tinyCat was - Australian Battlers Remember by Keith Smith

The publishers blurb states:

"In 1929 a world depression hit Australia with the speed of an express train. Its effects on the national economy were devastating and resulted in massive unemployment for hundreds of thousands of Australian workers and their families. There were no signs of future recovery and soon the susso, with its meagre handouts, became an accepted part of Australian life.

By 1933 two-thirds of the male workforce and one-third of the female workforce were either unemployed or earning less than the basic wage. The personalities and future professions of many Australians including June Dally-Watkins, Sir Roden Cutler and Smoky Dawson all attest to the influence of growing up during the Great Depression

Keith Smith made his name in Australian radio as a comedy writer, broadcaster and designer of original radio programs. In AUSTRALIAN BATTLERS REMEMBER-The Great Depression he has unearthed humorous, touching and horrifying stories from across Australia of the deprivations and hardships borne by a generation of Australians. These oral histories provide an intimate and compelling picture of family life during the most poverty-stricken period in Australia's history."





The impressment of American seamen by the British was one of the causes of the War of 1812. The practice also resulted in the creation of extensive records about merchant seamen that are of great value to genealogists and historians. These Seamen's Protection Certificate Applications for what might well be called a merchant seaman's passport have remained virtually untouched since they were originally filed. Now they are being organized and preserved, and those from the early years are already indexed. These records are in the Old Military and Civil Branch at the National Archives

Australia's State and Territory boundaries

Border changes across the world have caused many difficulties for family researchers who do not know the historical sequence of boundary changes. This is no more evident than when a new researcher is surprised by their DNA ethnicity results.

Australia's state and territory boundaries have changed over time. If you're trying to find an ancestor but can't locate them in the state records, make sure you're checking other state records, too.

Queensland was originally part of New South Wales until it was established in 1859, while the South Australian border fluctuated until after federation.

Meanwhile, the Northern Territory didn't exist until 1911.

Many of the states also originally had different names.

Western Australia was known as the Swan River Colony for a few years, and Tasmania was originally Van Diemen's Land.
