

### **Overview of August meeting**

Our August monthly meeting was thoroughly enjoyed by 17 members and visitors in the rooms and four on Zoom. Our guest speaker, historian and author Dr Jan McLeod, gave an interesting overview

of her great-uncle Private Lawrence Nicholas Kennedy's story. Private Kennedy was a medical orderly who served in the Middle East and on the Kokoda Track during World War II. Jan used Private Kennedy's wartime diary and photographs to highlight the important links between personal, local, national, and global history.

Jan's interest in her Uncle Nick's story is focussed on the medical service and the provision of medical care to the soldiers. To give a little background, prior to the war Nick owned a home at 6 Cleary Street, Hamilton which



he did return to many years later. Both Nick and his brother, Bill, worked at Peat and Milson Islands Hospital, Nick as a trainee 'mental' nurse, and Bill as a laundryman. Jan's interest was piqued when she was given an ice-cream container by her father labelled "Medals Nick". Inside was a plethora of items including Nick's armband still with the blood stains, Nick's diary, postcards and his medals.

When Nick joined the AIF with his brother Bill on 27 May 1940, he was a member of the 2/4 Australian Field Ambulance 7 Division AIF. In this unit there were 28 personnel who had links to Newcastle and the Hunter, hailing from suburbs including Abermain, Carrington, Cessnock, Dungog, Morisset, Minmi, Newcastle, Redhead, Toronto and Wallsend. Their occupations were varied covering Clerk, Truck Driver, Waiter, Steel Worker, Storekeeper, 'Mental' Nurse, Railway Worker, Shop Assistant and at the time of enlistment ages ranged from 22 to 40. In the unit, there weren't a lot of nurses as the role of the Field Ambulance was broader than just nursing in that you had transport, guys that went along and constructed field stations, stretcher bearers. There were also 'Mental' Nurses because in those days there were no male nurses unless they were in the 'mental' field as it was considered strength was required here. Interestingly, a lot of the Army personnel didn't see the Field Ambulance as soldiers because they were not fighting on the front. On the other side, the female nurses resented having the males in their hospitals and having to train them. Historically the Medical Corps was sometimes referred to as Linseed Lancers.

Nick and Bill's training was in Ingleburn and Bathurst. The Field Ambulance members still had to do all the rigorous training the same as the infantry, including the marches, however they also had to complete medical training which in the early stages was very much like first aid training. They sailed out of Fremantle on 27 October 1940 aboard the RMS Aquitania heading to the Middle East via Bombay, India where they arrived on 4 November. Whilst onboard the Aquitania, they were responsible for the medical care treating over 600 for things such as infections, fractures, cuts, dental and boils. After Bombay they travelled on to the Middle East reaching Port Suez in November.

Nick's first experience of war was when he went into Egypt at the end of 1940 as a first-aid man on a convoy of motor trucks. He was in the Middle East until early 1942. As well as more training, most of the work was done serving in Palestine, Egypt, Syria, Lebanon but mostly Syria. Here there was infrastructure – towns, railways, roads, air fields, transport system for supply and evacuation. Nick's own health took

a bit of a dive here with him spending weeks in hospital. Nick's diary gives vivid descriptions of their experiences.

On 16 February 1942, while they were at sea, they learnt of the fall of Singapore and they knew they were going home. They returned to Australia moving around from South Australia to New South Wales to Queensland in different training camps. Later in 1942 they were sent to Port Moresby aboard the Jason Lee arriving on 17 September. By the time Nick arrived, the Australians had unsuccessfully attempted to push the Japanese back along the Kokoda Track. Nick went up as part of a team to reinforce the militia men that were up there and was part of the offensive heading back up the Kokoda Track.

Some of the health and medical challenges they had to face whilst fighting in Papua were lack of leadership; lack of preparation and planning (it was not thought that the Japanese would attack from the north and get over the ranges); the terrain, environment and lack of infrastructure (far different to the Middle East); communication; supply/transport issues (there were planes but not many, and also not many pilots); how to treat people in this environment in the jungle; and one of the key issues was evacuation (no casualty clearing stations, an under-equipped and under-staffed base hospital, there were only dressing stations along the Track). Malaria was one of the main issues. Approximately 90% of Australians contracted malaria during the Papuan Campaign, affecting the soldiers but also the men of the medical unit. The whole situation was completely different to the way things were done in a location where there was infrastructure. They had to make ad hoc decisions on treatment. Many times, they spent 18 hours straight attending to casualties. Morphine which was air dropped was greatly used. Although many men didn't make it, it is amazing how many survived.

The last section focusses on The Beachheads from November 1942 to January 1943 in the area of Gona, Buna and Sanananda. The furthest north the 2/4 Field Ambulance reached was Soputa getting ready for the offence that was planned by MacArthur and there was great fear something terrible was going to happen, and it did. Far more of the fighting, the malaria and the deaths happened here than anywhere else on the track. On 27 November the Japanese bombed strafed the 2/4 Field Ambulance Main Dressing Station and the nearby 7 Division AIF Headquarters. This was regarded by the Australians as a war crime. Nick drew a map of this area and indicated where his mates were buried. Nick wrote in his diary "We come under heavy machine gun fire and aerial bombardment. 36 are killed and 70 wounded. The OC of our company is killed, Major Vickery. Also Major McDonald. There is not much left here – dead mangled bodies, blood, guts, and mud. This is a day that none of the 2/4th will forget, and some great boys have paid the supreme sacrifice. Bill buries most of our dead. It is midnight before the last of the dead is covered in." These were tragic circumstances.

After the war, Nick came back to Australia and completed his medical training, then working for 30 years on Peat and Milson Islands. He never married.

Jan has written two books, the first being Shadows on the Track: Australia's Medical War in Papua 1942-1943 which was published in 2019 as part of the Australian Army History Collection. Her second book, All the Broken Soldiers: Private Kennedy's War was released in November 2022 and tells the story of Nick in a lot more detail. 
### **Library Orientation 2023**


