



IDENTIFICATION BOARDS FOR FROMELLES TO NOW TAKE PLACE IN AUSTRALIA.

We are pleased to report that all future Identifications for soldiers who were killed at Fromelles, will now be dealt with in Australia. In a letter to us dated 24 November, 2022, from Minister for Veterans' Affairs and Minister for Defence Personnel the Honorable Matt Keogh, we were advised that:

'..the Fromelles Project was interrupted during the COVID-19 pandemic. It has also been subject to recent process review, which included contract negotiations with service providers. The transition to Australian-based identification boards has impacted the usual timing of Fromelles identification announcements; however, the transition is now complete.

I share your desire for identification announcements to be publicized as soon as possible and in good time for families to attend any scheduled commemoration activities.'

The identifications announced in November 2022 were the result of an Identification Board convened in Australia during 2022.

Minister Keogh went on to commend the Fromelles Association for its research to date, and for its assistance to Army and the Fromelles Project in identifying our First World War soldiers.

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'POMPEY' ELLIOTT REMEMBRANCE SERVICE, BURWOOD CEMETERY MELBOURNE

Friends of the 15th Brigade commemorated The 92nd Anniversary of the death of 'POMPEY' ELLIOTT at Melbourne's Burwood Cemetery on 23 March 2023.

Lambis Englezos welcomed everyone to the ceremony with special thanks to students from the Ballarat and Clarendon College for their attendance. He then introduced their guest speaker Dr Ross McMullin, Historian, Author, 'Pompey' Elliott's Biographer.

Ross described the details of two soldiers profiled in his newly released book 'Life So Full of Promise.' Both were connected with

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Pompey Elliott before and during WW1.

The first was Murdoch Mackay from Bendigo, who as a student of law at Ormond College, Melbourne University, became acquainted with Pompey's brother George Elliott, and who at the age of 20 emulated Pompey Elliott six years after Pompey's own completion of legal studies, and came top in final year law and won the Supreme Court Prize.

When Mackay moved to Melbourne to work as a barrister, he and Pompey served in the same militia unit. Pompey's solicitors firm briefed Mackay to appear in various court cases.

Mackay went on to become an AIF Company Commander in the 22nd Battalion, but was killed in action on 5 August, 1916. Pompey was dismayed. "I am very sorry as he was a splendid fellow", Pompey wrote; he was "a very fine boy and a great friend of mine".

After the war Pompey reminisced about Mackay and praised him glowingly. So there was a strong connection between the pair.

The second soldier was Mac Gibbs, a 15th Brigade officer. Pompey also got to know Gibbs through his brother George. Mac Gibbs and George Elliott were team-mates in the University football team in the VFL, and overlapped as medicine students. Gibbs is in the book because he was connected to Mackay, in that his fiancée and Mackay's wife were sisters.

Soon after the formation of the 15th Brigade, when Pompey was looking for capable officers to join the brigade, Mac Gibbs arrived in Egypt with a batch of reinforcements. He agreed to become a lieutenant in the 59th Battalion.

Gibbs had a significant role at Fromelles. With his company commander wounded at the outset, Gibbs took charge of the company and led it across no-man's-land very competently despite heavy enemy fire. To quote from the award recommendation that Pompey wrote, Gibbs's "calm and collected" leadership "gave his men the impulse necessary to carry them as far as it was possible to go", and he was later awarded the Military Cross for his conspicuous gallantry.

Not many in the 59th ended up closer to the Germans than Mac, but he was missing after the battle, and months later he was officially declared to have died at Fromelles.

The sisters who were attached to Mackay and Gibbs heard about their fates in the same week. The fate of Mac Gibbs was just one of the far too many losses that Pompey had to endure at Fromelles, with the result that he could never be the same after such a terrible disaster.

Ross went on to detail the work done by Pompey Elliott in bringing his Brigade to a first class one. In summing up, Ross went on to state that 'We're here today on the anniversary of Pompey's death, and the story of Fromelles is a significant factor in Pompey's death, in the how, when and why of his death.'

Ross's book 'Life So Full of Promise' will be launched at the Shrine of Remembrance on 20 April, and the Friends of the 15th Brigade are welcome to attend. Here are the event details:

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**SERVICE TO HONOUR CAPTAIN
NORMAN GIBBINS, HELD AT
CITYHOPE CHURCH, RIPLEY,
IPSWICH ON 2 APRIL, 2023.**

The material for this post has come from our friends at 31 Bn Memorial Association, Michael James in particular.

It is about an Anzac Service held at the Cityhope Church at Ripley, Ipswich on 2 April, 2023. It includes a video about the life of Capt Norman Gibbins and the effect of the Battle on his family, after the Battle of Fromelles

The service was conducted by Senior Pastor at Ripley, Ps Mark Edwards OAM who has been there for 33 years.

This service has been continuing for a decade now.

This year they had their video story on Capt Norman Gibbons AIF who grew up in Ipswich and went to Ipswich Grammar School.

As the Video was on a 55th Bn Soldier, Michael arranged for Geoffrey Benn, as President of Fromelles Association of Australia, to receive an invitation, with his concurrence, of course. Geoff is mentioned in the program. At the end of the Service, 2 copies of Pierre Seillier OAM's Tribute to Capt Norman Gibbins were presented to Ps Mark Edwards OAM & Ipswich Grammar School Headmaster, Richard Morrison, by Geoff.

If you view the footage of the service itself (see link below) you will see 20 photos of soldiers shown on the screen during the Hymn. All are 55th Battalion soldiers. Their photos and brief histories were also placed on chairs throughout the congregation.

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THE FAMILIES OF FROMELLES

In November 2022, we published a pamphlet dealing with the Brothers in Arms Project at Zonnebeke, Belgium. James and John Hunter fought at Polygon Wood near Ypres in Belgium. John Hunter was killed, and Jim Hunter ultimately returned to Australia.

John's body was recovered along with four others in September, 2006 during roadwork and pipe-laying excavations near the small village of Westhoek. Two other soldiers' remains have been identified since. The identifications were able to take place with the assistance of DNA, and that process became the standard for Fromelles when bodies were discovered there in 2008.

In the last year or so, we've been compiling a list of soldiers who were at Fromelles, and in the course of doing so have identified a number of brothers, and even father and sons, who fought at Fromelles. Some fatally. Some to fight elsewhere but not return. Some who would ultimately return after the loss of a brother, or a son.

The following list has been compiled from material from Pierre Seillier, and Geoffrey Benn, Bronwyn Stanley and Stephen Brooks, and is a work in progress.

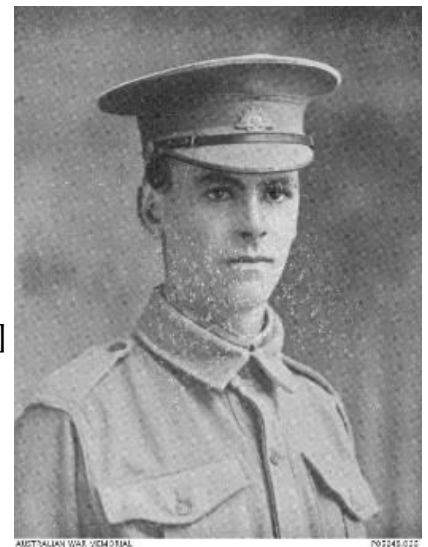

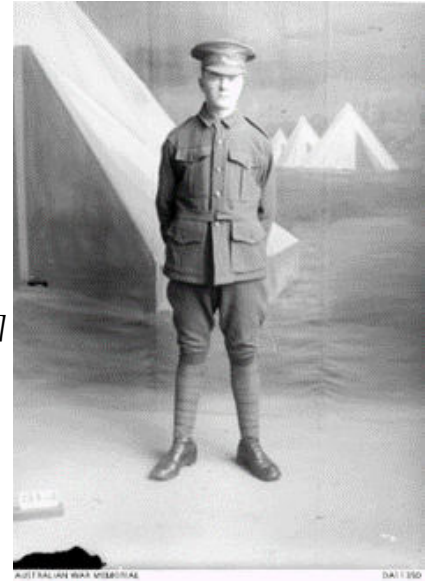

We wish to bring to your attention, the conferral of the Order of Australia upon our long-time friend of the soldiers of Fromelles, as reported in the latest Newsletter of the Friends of the 15th Brigade:

It is with great pleasure that we announce that Pierre Seillier, a true friend and supporter of Friends of the 15th Brigade, has been awarded **the Medal of the Order of Australia.**

Many of us have had the privilege of meeting Pierre and enjoyed his hospitality and support. On February 2023 the Office Governor General stated:

The Governor-General is pleased to announce the following award in the Order of Australia:

Mr Pierre SEILLIER, La Bassee, France.

The media note tells us more of the man. Mr Pierre Seillier has dedicated a large part of his life to preserving the memory of Australia's military service, particularly in Fromelles, France. Fromelles is the site of the worst tragedy in Australia's history, with 5,533 Australian soldiers dead or injured in less than 24 hours during World War I - most of them in their early 20s and fighting in their first and last battle. Mr Seillier regularly organises, or represents Australian organisations, at commemorative ceremonies and dedications in France.



On the 100th Anniversary of the Battle of Fromelles in 2016, the 31st Infantry Bn Association Inc. presented Mr Seillier with an Honorary Life Membership to acknowledge the voluntary assistance he has given to so many Australians in finding the gravesites of their loved ones and producing special tributes to the fallen. Mr Seillier has also been honoured with Life Membership of the Rats of Tobruk Association Inc.

Mr Seillier is dedicated to ensuring the gratitude and remembrance of Australian soldiers is spread throughout the community and also passed down to younger generations. Mr Seillier regularly teaches at the Cobbers School, Fromelles, about their town's historic links to Australia, and developed an 'Adopt a Soldier' initiative where each primary school student takes on an Australian soldier buried in the Pheasant Wood Cemetery and learns about that soldier in the form of a school project. This is usually in conjunction with that soldier's relatives in Australia, thus preserving and extending the relationship between Australia and Fromelles, France, for future generations.

Another example of Mr Seillier's service was in organising for the Cobbers School children to

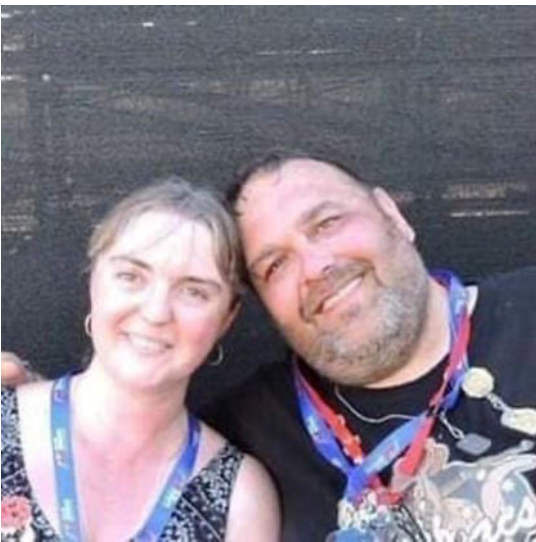

RELATIVES WITH MULTIPLE SOLDIERS NOW RESTING AT FROMELLES

In the course of compiling material on our lost soldiers, we come learn who is related to a particular soldier. Sometimes we find more than one person is related to a soldier in the course of seeking DNA for testing. Sometimes our contacts advise us of having found they are related to more than one soldier now identified at Fromelles.

These are the soldiers and their connections that we have identified so far.

Jim Munday is related to brothers 4887 Eric Wilson and 3534 Samuel Wilson, both of 53 Bn, and both identified alongside each other, and now laid to rest alongside each other at Fromelles.

Stuart Quarmby is related on his mother's side to 1520 A/Sgt William Polding Ryan, 31 Bn.

Stuart is also related on his father's side to 1252 Cpl Alfred Tuck, 29 Bn.

Both have been identified, and both are laid to rest at Fromelles.

John Clingan is related to 3168 Pte Alexander Stanley Clingan, 53 Bn.

John's wife **Dorothy Clingan** (nee Grogan) is related to 3114 Sgt Vincent Michael Grogan, 60 Bn.

Alexander Clingan has been identified and is laid to rest at Fromelles.

Vincent Michael Grogan is remembered on the VC Corner Cemetery Wall of Remembrance.

Peter Stroud-Watts is related to 4533 James Joseph Lee, 54 Bn, a brother of his maternal grandmother.

Peter is also related to 3606 William Henry Turner, 54 Bn a brother of his maternal grandfather.

So his grandmother and grandfather had brothers in the same battalion, and fought in the same battle.

James Joseph Lee is remembered on the VC Corner Cemetery Wall of Remembrance.

William Henry Turner was taken prisoner of war, and returned to Australia in March, 1919.

Bruce Lees is related to 2 Lt James Benson, 32 Bn. He was his grandmother's father. His headstone was dedicated at Fromelles in 2016.

Bruce's wife **Dianne Lees** is related to Major Victor Horatio Buller Sampson, 53 Bn. His remains were identified in 2010 and he is now laid to rest at Fromelles.

Glennys Gow is related herself to 1520 William Polding Ryan, 31 Bn. His headstone was dedicated in 2010. She is a 1st cousin, 3x removed.

Her late husband John Oliver Gow is a 1st cousin 1x removed to 4807 David George Irvin of 36 Heavy Artillery Brigade, who was killed in action 19/20 July 1916, and his headstone was dedicated at Fromelles in 2010.

Jeff Nash is through his father Clarence Nash, a nephew of 4341 Pte Clarence Ernest Nash of 54 Bn who was Killed in Action 19-20 July, 1916. Clarence is remembered on the VC Corner Cemetery Wall of Remembrance.

Jeff is also a nephew via his mother Mary, of 4190 Pte Keith Whitmee Davis of 54 Bn, who died of wounds from Fromelles, on 22 July, 1916. Keith staggered to assistance following him being injured, and is buried at Bologne Eastern Cemetery.

All we can say when learning of these connections is 'It's a small world'.

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THE CONTINUING SEARCH FOR DNA

Some time ago we arranged for a media release to be issued in the search for relatives of Lemuel Batey, of 29 Bn. We had a response from that and we are hoping it will lead us to find suitable dna testing candidates so that we can submit details to Unrecovered War Casualties Unit, in the hope of identifying him at Fromelles.

We recently arranged for a media release to be issued in the search for relatives of 974 Pte William Keating, 32 Bn. We have had a response from that and we will work with the person concerned, again in the hope that it will lead us to find a suitable dna testing candidate.

Sometimes the feedback we receive is from persons who are themselves not able to provide a dna test, but hopefully their knowledge of the family network is sufficient to enable us to approach another person in the family's extended tree. This has prompted us to include the following information and explanation about the search for dna, for your understanding.

In the years following the end of World War 1, our soldiers and their families took steps to rebuild their lives and to develop their own families.

Sometimes the soldiers who served had children who survived them.

Thus there were soldiers' own children who went on to give birth to grandchildren.

Sons of the soldiers had grandsons and granddaughters.

Brothers of the soldiers had nephews, who in turn had great nephews, who shared the Y-DNA line.

This is the 'male line', and it is passed on by fathers to sons and sons to sons and so on.

Daughters of the soldiers had granddaughters and grandsons.

Sisters of the soldiers had daughters, who in turn begat nieces, who shared mitochondrial DNA (mt-DNA) with the soldier.

Sisters of the soldiers who had daughters all shared the same mt-DNA line with the soldier, going back to the soldier's mother, and her mother before her.

But if those daughters, nieces, granddaughters had a son, their son did not pass on the mt-DNA to his own children. The son's children would instead receive the mt-DNA from their own mother, i.e. their father's female partner. Thus the mt-DNA link with the soldier would not get

passed down further.

This is the 'female line' DNA.

So the trail of connections via DNA extended and radiated around the world. We seek to find the families who are alive today, who can help us to make a positive linkage to a soldier who was killed at Fromelles. So in the same way, our search for DNA linkages has also extended and radiated around the world.

DNA has proven to be the vital element needed to identify the remains of all the soldiers remains uncovered in 2008 and 2009. The process of identification is undertaken by the Australian Army in conjunction with expert advisors in the United Kingdom and wherever else information may be required to be scrutinised.

The Australian Army now seeks DNA from two male-line donors, and two female-line donors in order to establish the best chance of identification by DNA.

We don't research the full family tree, just the part of the tree around the DNA e.g. male line or female line. Or both, if requested by the Army.

By tracing the linkages genealogically, our work often results in us finding connections with the descendants of a soldier who did not know of each other before our research began.

When a soldier is identified by use of DNA matching on the female and male lines, these families share a bond which they are unable to break.

You will therefore soon appreciate that the identification of the necessary donors will only take place after extensive genealogical research.

We get to learn a lot about DNA. They get to learn a lot about their family.
