RAHS response to Trove's urgent need for funding before July 2023

The National Library of Australia's recent <u>Trove Strategy</u> revealed the 'future of Trove beyond July 2023 will be dependent upon available funds' and without urgent government support, 'the Library will need to cease offering the Trove service entirely.'

Given the dire nature of this report, the RAHS expressed its profound concerns for Trove's ongoing funding to Tony Burke, the Federal Minister for the Arts.

RAHS President Dr Iain Stuart wrote:

State and local government libraries, cultural organisations of all types, newspaper companies and historical societies have had their collections uploaded to Trove since its inception. These organisations have trusted the NLA to manage the harvested data on behalf of all Australians for the benefit of the Australian nation. ... Together Trove and its partners have created arguably the most significant collection of Australian stories and cultural heritage. What has been achieved already is invaluable, but this work needs adequate and ongoing funding to continue.

Trove is an invaluable resource for anyone interested in Australia's past. Our 'getting to know Trove' webinar series, organised by RAHS Senior Vice-President Christine Yeats, is among our most popular. Access to Trove's

digitalised collections is essential for historians and researchers who do not live in Canberra. This fact has only been amplified since the beginning of the pandemic and the National Library's <u>recent major renovation work</u>, which has restricted access to its nationally significant collection.

Having a well-funded Trove has never been more important.



Museums of History NSW and using the NSW State Archives Collection

The historic houses, museums and collections, which were previously administered by Sydney Living Museums, and the archives and records in the NSW State Archives Collection have been brought together in the Museums of History NSW.

All the web-based resources on the former NSW State Archives collection are now available through the new Museums of History NSW website.

 You can search both collections by selecting 'Search' in the top right corner of the Home Page at: https://mhnsw.au/. When you click on 'Search' you can enter a search term or choose between going direct to either State Archives' indexes or State Archives' catalogue. The simplest and most direct way to the State Archives collection on the new site is to click on 'Search State Archives' on the Home Page. This will take you to the <u>State Archives Collection page</u>.



Here you can start your search using either of these options:

- **1. Subjects A-Z.** This new search option is a good starting point bringing the online indexes, guides, articles (additional information) and webinars together under alphabetical headings. It is also a good option if you want to search a particular index or locate a guide, article or webinar for particular records.
- 2. 'Search the collection'. This is useful for searching across a number of indexes and records. The results page will display entries from the various 'entity types'. These include index, item, series, agency, person (for example a member of the judiciary) and portfolio. You can refine/filter the results using the tools on the right of the screen. For example, by selecting 'index' the results are limited to index entries. You can also use this search option for specific records such as a Probate Packet enter 'Edmund Barton death' or Primary Application enter 'Walter Liberty Vernon primary'.

There is a lot to discover about the NSW State Archives and 'How to use the State Archives Collection' may answer some of your questions. If you are having difficulty you can use the 'Ask an Archivist' service.

Central Coast Regional Seminar

LAND RECORDS, CONVICT CRIMES AND CONVICTS TRANSPORTED FROM IRELAND: A TREASURE TROVE OF RESEARCH POSSIBILITIES

The RAHS is staging one of its popular regional seminars in conjunction with the <u>Central Coast Family History Society</u>. This one-day, in-person seminar will appeal to anyone who wants to learn more about convicts and their crimes, Irish convicts transported to Australia, and how to use land records.

Approximately twelve percent of all convicts transported to Australia were Irish.

RAHS Senior Vice-President Christine Yeats will show you the hidden
resources you can use to learn more about convicts transported from Ireland to
Australia. With so many online resources, Christine says, 'it has never been
easier to discover something new about your Irish convict ancestors and their

life experiences.'

'Local history requires specific research into a place, and the best way to do that is to look into the records of who owned the land.' Adjunct Associate Professor Carol Liston AO is a historian who specialises in the history of early New South Wales. In her presentations, Professor Liston will show you how to use land records from the Historical Land Records Viewer, Primary Applications and the Court of Claims to learn about the past.

In a recent RAHS *History* magazine, Dr Kathrine Reynolds said, '[m]any Australians are descended from convicts transported from Britain and in recent years it has been possible and enjoyable to discover one's convict ancestors. However, as the crimes were committed in Britain and tried in British courts, much data exists in British record offices that provide a more fulsome story'. This seminar will also feature a talk that will show you how to research the crimes of convict women using English court records.



RAHS Special Lecture - Semut: An Australian Secret Operation in WWII Borneo

Christine will also suggest that this ostensibly Australian operation was orchestrated by the British for their own political purposes and outline its hidden reliance on Dayak headhunting.

In the wake of the Second World War and the realisation that the Soviet Union had set up extensive espionage networks around the world, Australia responded by establishing its own spyhunting agency: ASIO. By the 1950s, its counterespionage activities were increasingly supplemented by attempts at counter-subversion - identifying individuals and organisations suspected of activities that threatened national security. In doing so, it crossed the boundary from being a professional agency that collected, evaluated and transmitted intelligence, to a sometimes politicised but always shadowy presence, monitoring not just communists but also peace activists, scientists, academics, journalists and writers.



Call for expressions of interest for new editor/s of the Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society

The Council of the RAHS is seeking expressions of interest for the position of editor of the *Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society (JRAHS*). The current editor Adjunct Associate Professor Carol Liston AO and our proof reader Mrs Joy Hughes are stepping down after many years of distinguished services in their respective roles. The RAHS Council thanks Adjunct Associate Professor Carol Liston AO for her service as editor and Mrs Joy Hughes for her service as journal proof reader.

The *JRAHS* is the official journal of the RAHS. It is a peer-reviewed biannual journal, the aim of which is to publish original, non-fiction scholarly articles and reviews on all aspects of Australian history. The Editor (or Editorial Team) is supported by the *JRAHS* Editorial Board and the RAHS Publications Committee. The appointment is for an initial period of three years, renewable by mutual agreement.

The RAHS Council welcomes expressions of interest from historians engaged in any aspect of Australian history, to be received by **3 February 2023 at 5 pm**.

Responsibilities of the Editor role include:

- Engaging members of the history community to submit articles and undertaking timely reviews of drafts.
- Alongside support staff, the Publications Committee and the Editorial Board, collating the proofs for review and applying editorial policies and style guidance.
- Maintaining the high level of quality of the publication that should be focussed on supporting the education goals of the Society.
- Ensuring appropriate and timely communication with contributors and encouraging a variety of submissions.
- Working with support staff to coordinate media releases and social media promotion.
- Writing an editorial that outlines the content and common themes of each issue.

Expressions of interest should include:

- A brief cv (one-page max) that outlines your experience.
- A brief outline (one-page max) of your thoughts on the future direction of the journal.

Members of the Publications Committee are happy to discuss with potential applicants what the position involves. The role of editor is an honorary position, but the RAHS Council is happy to discuss an honorarium to cover expenses incurred. Subject to the number of applications, the RAHS Council will appoint the successful applicant to the position at the 17 February Council Meeting.

Lisa will share some of her insights and discoveries from tapping these historical records, including the brewery's involvement in the Tied-House System to expand their market share.


She will also demonstrate the digital mapping she has undertaken of Tooheys tied-hotels based on data extracted from the collection.

This significant collection promises a deeper understanding of the way the breweries controlled the industry and influenced pub culture in NSW.

Siege of Petersburg:

When the American Civil War Foreshadowed the Trenches of 1914

The American Civil War raged from April 1861 to June 1865. It killed an astonishing proportion of the American population.

There were several armies conducting several battles and campaigns in various states during the nine and a half months that Petersburg, only about 20 miles (or approximately 35 kilometres) south of the Confederate capitol at Richmond in Virginia, was said to be under siege. It was not technically a siege, as it was never surrounded, but it was a portend of what was to happen in Europe 50 years later. The campaign at Petersburg did not kill as many people as other battles of the war, but it accounted for a long period of time, and its outcome was of huge political significance. The lifting of the siege signalled the end of the American Civil War shortly thereafter.
