

New RAHS website with an updated members' area

The RAHS has launched a new website on a new platform which will help us better manage our increasing number of website visitors. We have also introduced new features to improve accessibility for visually impaired visitors, people using devices with small screens, and those using a slow Internet connection with limited bandwidth.

We want to thank RAHS volunteers Rebbell Barnes AO and Elaine Phillips for helping us test the members' area of the RAHS website. Rebbell also provided descriptive text for our blog post images using website guidelines provided by Vision Australia.

If members haven't accessed the members' area yet, we have prepared a short five-minute instructional video that provides an overview of the type of content that you can access from the members' area.

The new website is another good reason to join if you still need to become a member. The December 2020 edition of *History* magazine is one of many examples of the breadth and depth of the content available to members only. Edited by RAHS Councillor Richard White, the articles 'straddle the entertaining


and the substantial, often in the same article.' It features:

On Saturday, 24 June, the Ashfield and District Historical Society (ADHS) celebrated its 50th anniversary at Wests Ashfield Club. Many ADHS members dressed in the fashion of its inaugural year – 1973 – and part of the celebratory events included a quiz to test attendees' knowledge of this important decade. There was also a presentation on the history and achievements of the ADHS, played throughout the event, which can now be viewed on the ADHS website.

The Hon. Penny Sharpe MLC, the NSW Minister for Heritage, and Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne attended the event. The Minister spoke of the importance of the Heritage Act and the need for Aboriginal Cultural Heritage reform, and the mayor spoke of the role of community groups in promoting discussions on the Voice to Parliament. Both wished the ADHS another successful fifty years of community contribution.

ADHS President Alex Lofts reflected on the work of the historical society and its members past and present, including founding and life member Dr John O. Ward (1940–2023). John's wife, Gail, also a life member, was a guest of honour and took the first cut of the ADHS 50th birthday cake. RAHS General Manager Suzanne Holohan also congratulated the ADHS on its achievements. Below is an excerpt from Suzanne's speech:

The RAHS congratulates the members of Ashfield and District Historical Society for all the research and writing you have done to promote and preserve the history and heritage of the area. It has helped create the sense of community and connection that makes a place a home for so many people. We look forward to seeing your future work in our library.

And we will not have to wait long! The ADHS will launch a new publication by Ann O'Connell – *John Jasper Stone (1848–1921): Engineer, Architect and Baptist.* The book will be launched on 23 July at Summer Hill Community

Centre. RAHS Senior Vice President Christine Yeats will be representing the RAHS at this event.

We are pleased to share our new look Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society (JRAHS), which

There are four refereed articles and nine book reviews in this issue.

Terry Kass discusses the War Service Home scheme operating after World War I. Mark St Leon's article outlines the origins and development of Beaumont & Waller's Botanical & Zoological Gardens at the Sir Joseph Banks Hotel, Botany Bay, between 1848–1861. Keith Amos discusses the history of the Ingleside Powder Works, from its creation in the 1880s to its controversial collapse. Matthew Fishburn's article documents the connections between Thomas Wilson Esq and the natural history collections of John White.


In the editorial, Honorary Editor Christine Yeats expressed 'appreciation for the incredible work and dedication of the previous editorial team':

English Bigamists and their Australian Travels

This paper explores two sets of English bigamists – those convicted of the offence between 1795 and 1853 and sentenced to transportation to Australia and those who escaped prosecution because they had travelled down under before remarrying. The first sample is drawn from a systematic analysis of the Criminal Registers: the frequency with which transportation was ordered undermines the common claim that convicted bigamists were treated lightly in the first half of the nineteenth century. The second, unprosecuted, sample was amassed by means of the generosity of family historians across the globe who shared their ancestors' stories. While it is unsurprising that those who put thousands of miles between their two marriages should escape prosecution, the fact that such persons accounted for a significant proportion of the unprosecuted does raise interesting questions about the extent of undetected bigamy amongst those who stayed in England.

Hanged for Bigamy? Alexander Wilson Smart's Love Stories

In 1878, twenty-year-old Alexander Wilson Smart married eighteen-year-old Mary Jane Bailey in Eltham (VIC), and a mere three months later, the young couple welcomed their first son. Over the next twenty years, Alexander and Mary Jane added four children to the family and appeared to live happily. Like many Australian men lured by the gold rush, Smart left his home and made his way to Western Australia in 1898 but continued to write and send money to Mary Jane for the next six years. In March 1910, claiming to be only thirty-four and now going by a pseudonym, Smart went through a form of marriage with a different Mary-Jane on her twenty-first birthday, thereby committing bigamy. As a result of his guilty plea, Smart was given a two-year jail sentence. A few weeks later, while serving his sentence in Fremantle jail, he was charged with the wilful murder of one Ethel Harris, his paramour from 1904 until her death, presumably at his hands.

In this talk, Professor Méthot will dissect the media coverage and the case files and argue that not only was Alexander Smart convicted of murder on circumstantial evidence, but his bigamy conviction would play a significant role in the inevitable verdict and his eventual death sentence.


The RAHS welcomes contributions to the *JRAHS*. Submissions should be:




New book

The 2023 publication, *Gladesville Hospital Cemetery: The forgotten cemetery—the forgotten people*, is a fully revised and updated version of the Ryde District Historical Society's 2012 booklet. As well as documenting 1200+ deaths and burials from 1869 to 1893, it contains an additional 555 names of patients who died at the Tarban Creek Asylum between 1839 and 1868. While it has not been possible to ascertain whether those people were necessarily buried at the cemetery, it nevertheless honours the names of these 'forgotten people'.


