

2023 RAHS Conference - Featured Session: Stories from the Riverina

Bookings are open for the 2023 RAHS Conference in Wagga Wagga. Our discounted early bird tickets are available until close of business tomorrow. Book now to save up to \$15 on your tickets. In this eNewsletter, we take a closer look at our Session B speakers, who will share local histories that will deepen our understanding of the Riverina Region.

In 1865, Wagga butcher Tom Castro stepped across the threshold of his shop and into the history books. Claiming to be the long-lost heir to the Tichborne family's Hampshire estates, Tom unwittingly set in motion one of the greatest cases of disputed identity in recent criminal history. Michelle Maddison is Curator at the Museum of the Riverina and, in her talk, will answer the question: Who was the elusive Tom Castro, and did he ever really exist?

Dr Stephen Gapps is a historian committed to bringing the Frontier Wars into broader public recognition as Australia's First Wars. He has published awardwinning books and has previously worked as a consultant historian and curator at the Australian National Maritime Museum. Stephen is now Senior Associate Historian at Artefact Heritage Services and is working on his next project 'The Rising. Resistance Warfare along the entire frontier of the Colony 1838–1842'. Stephen's paper will build on his previous research on the Wiradyuri Wars.

Marie Narelle was a Riverina-born Edwardian concert singer blessed with a voice of operatic quality. With the aid of her extended family and her church, she drew upon her rich Irish heritage to overcome early challenges in her life and establish herself as a leading exponent of traditional Irish folk music in Australia, the British Isles and North America. Local historian Bill Spiers will showcase the life of Marie Narelle, 'The Australian Queen of Irish Song'.

Conference delegates will also have plenty of opportunities to explore Wagga Wagga's history, especially during the Friday welcome reception at the Historic Council Chambers and the Saturday behind-the-scenes tour of the redeveloped Museum of the Riverina. 2023 Cultural Grants Recipients

RAHS President Dr Iain Stuart announced today that eighteen local history projects will receive funding from the 2023 Cultural Grants Program. This grant program is administered by the RAHS on behalf of the NSW Government.

'The Royal Australian Historical Society thanks Create NSW for funding this grants program, which supports local and community history projects. These projects provide unique insights into the people and places of New South Wales and strengthen community connections through preserving and sharing our histories. History is preserved and passed on at the local level through communities interested in our history and by the individuals working in community groups. Without this grant funding, many shared histories and local history resources would be lost to us,' explained Dr Stuart.

Recipients of the Cultural Grants cover a diverse range of projects, including research, publications, and conservation of historic material through digitisation projects.

Australian Catholic Historical Society

For the publication of a comprehensive and contextual history of the Society, *The Australian Catholic Historical Society and Sydney Catholics 1940–2020*. Awarded: \$5,000.

Paterson Historical Society

For the publication *Vacy to Gresford – People and Places*. The book will record the history along the Paterson and Allyn Rivers between the village of Vacy and the town of Gresford. Awarded: \$2,000.

Tomaree Headland Heritage Group

For the publication *Tomaree Headland Port Stephens in World War II: Fort Tomaree, HMAS Assault.* Awarded: \$5,000.

The City of Liverpool and District Historical Society

For the publication of a collection of recollections, journals, diaries, letters and articles. *Recollections of Old Liverpool Vol. 2.* Awarded: \$1,000.

Manly Warringah and Pittwater Historical Society

For the publication of the Society's centenary history, *Bridging the Years: Manly Warringah and Pittwater Historical Society 1924–2024.* Awarded: \$4,800.

Albury and District Historical Society

To include the *Border Morning Mail* 1953 on Trove and to conduct free public workshops on 'Exploring the Local Past with Trove'. Awarded: \$3,572.

Hurstville Museum and Gallery

For the publication *Makers and Manufacturers: The Industrial History of St George*. Awarded: \$3,571.

Port Macquarie and District Family History Society

To publish a register of the female convicts who came to Port Macquarie (for punishment, on assignment, on Tickets of Leave, or to join their husbands). *Rowdy Voices and Quiet Whispers*. Awarded: \$4,000.

Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society

For an original journal with local content, *Grist Mills* 37. Awarded: \$1,000.

Surf Life Saving Mid North Coast Branch

For an oral history project on preserving local and lifesaving history through interviewing life members, which will be available on a website. Awarded: \$495.

Nutcote Trust

For a publication about the life of celebrated author and illustrator May Gibbs, *Inside Story: May Gibbs' Life and Work at Nutcote*. Awarded: \$3,300.

Hill End and Tambaroora Gathering Group

For the publication of a detailed history of 150 years of St Paul's Presbyterian Church, Hill End, from 1872 until 2022. Awarded: \$3,530.

Australian Computer Museum Society

For the Max Burnet Digitisation Project. Max Burnet played a major part in Australian computing, running the second-largest hardware vendor in Australia. This project aims to digitise his collection. Awarded: \$3,000.

The Royal Society of NSW

To illuminate the cultural evolution of Australasia's earliest colonial scientific and philosophical society. *Sydney's Colonial Scientists: Origins of the Royal Society of NSW.* Awarded: \$5,000.

Maitland Regional Museum

For the publication *Maitland Stories*, which will collect and record oral histories of Maitland's older citizens who represent a range of backgrounds and communities. Awarded: \$3,100.

Shoalhaven Libraries

For the *Shoalhaven Heritage Newspaper Digitisation Project*, which will be made available on Trove. Awarded: \$5,000.


The Fort Street Foundation

For the Fort Street Speech Day Digitisation Project (1899–2023), which will digitise at-risk

paper copies of all records associated with Speech Day at a nationally significant school institution. Awarded: \$3,850.

Clarence River Historical Society

For the Carl Ehlers Collection. Awarded: \$3,450.



NSW Premier's History Award Winners Announced

The 2023 NSW Premier's History Awards, with \$85,000 in prize money, were announced at the State Library of NSW on Thursday 7 September.

The winner of the Australian History Prize was Alan Atkinson's *Elizabeth and John: The Macarthurs of Elizabeth Farm*. The Judges said that Atkinson had 'produced a landmark book that will refresh early colonial studies and stand as a model for comparative biography, sensitive research and beautiful writing.'

The NSW Community and Regional History Prize was awarded to *He Belonged* to Wagga: The Great War, the AIF and returned soldiers in an Australian country town by Ian Hodges. The first episode of *The Australian Wars* was

awarded the Digital History Prize. The series can be watched on <u>SBS On</u>

<u>Demand</u>. The Anzac Memorial Trustees Military History Prize went to *Soldiers*and Aliens: Men in the Australian Army's Employment Companies during World

War II by June Factor.

Hundreds of Australian women graced the popular stage in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Despite the racism, sexism and other cruelties of vaudeville, it gave them space in which to live unusually public lives, and sometimes to test conventional ideas about how women should behave. Their stories speak to the treatment of women in earlier times. But they also show what is lost to our culture and our history when imported entertainments are permitted to overwhelm local artists and their work.

A former documentary filmmaker, television producer and chief executive of Film Australia, Sharon Connolly has been involved in making many landmark history programs since her first film, *Red Matildas*. In her first book, *My Giddy Aunt and her sister comedians*, she once more writes some remarkable yet uncelebrated women back into the stories of Australia.







Symposium Sponsored by The Centre for Applied History Tuesday 5 December 2023, Macquarie University Hybrid face-to-face and online event

This symposium will explore intersections between Public Sport History and Community Sport. It provides an opportunity for reflection on scholarship that these topics have generated in recent years and for collaborative discussion about current projects and the state of the field today. For the purposes of the event, we are defining Public Sport History broadly as the production, representation or consumption of sports history in the public sphere, for diverse audiences by a wide range of practitioners and organisations.

We are interested in exploring the importance of historical knowledge, education, employment, research and expertise outside of university environments, as well as connections and collaborations between academics, 'professional' and 'amateur' historians, cultural institutions, sporting organisations and the media.


We encourage reflective papers that interrogate processes, practices, representations or understandings of Public History in community sports-related research projects or community sports history in the public sphere. Areas of interest include, but are not limited to: oral history, public memory, sports history in the media and documentaries, commissioned histories, museums and cultural institutions, collaborations with community sports associations, gender, race, narrative, sporting statues and memorials, heritage and preservation, popular culture, and vernacular sports history.

Contributions will be selected for a Special Issue of an international sports history journal, such as *The International Journal of the History of Sport*, depending on the mix of papers.

The symposium will feature a **keynote address by Dr Guy Hansen**, Director of Exhibitions, National Library of Australia: Grassroots: Community sport collections at the National Library of Australia.
