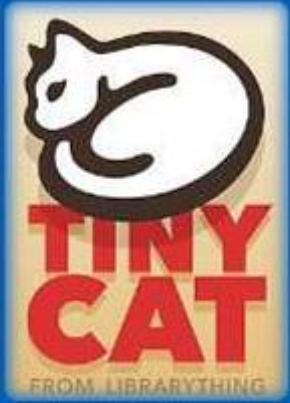
Peter Simmonds was also awarded a Certificate of Appreciation for his service to the Association.

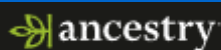
What's New

Is Genealogy Dying?

Is genealogy dying? When you talk to the Baby Boomer generation, they say yes, Generation X are more concerned with the DNA side and making sure that their family won't inherit any gene that may cause medical issues down the track. They are also the generation that is happy to just take the heirlooms and keepsakes and have a hard time saying no, but really don't know what they will do with them in the future. There are a small handful who are interested in finding out where their families are from, but most would work on being social butterflies.

Gen Y, the newly coined term Millennials, when it comes to family history, heirlooms and keepsakes, they need a 'reason'. You can't just pass off a heirloom and expect them to accept it, they need to know; Whose was it? What is that person's story? Why is that artefact special and how will it be special for them?

When it comes to family trees most want to create a family tree, but starting is just too hard. It also comes down to the wording of things, currently this generation only knows of Ancestry and My Heritage and these sites scare them and overwhelm them. They do not realize that there are associations and libraries that they can join for help and advice. If you call it research this generation will run in the opposite direction as school was a nightmare for most of them.

Gen Z have worked out from research that it takes 21 days to form a habit but being so young still rely on the older generations for guidance and support. They are keen and enthusiastic when they find out new information or a family connection, but being young, money is an issue. This group also likes to be a part of online forums and support groups based on their interests and find this the easiest way to join a group rather than physically come into an association.

So, Genealogy and family research may not be dying out. It means that the older generations need to relearn how to encourage and mentor the younger generations and change with the times to keep this interest alive.

As for the last Generation, Alpha, we all need to encourage this interest as soon as possible, taking them to cemeteries, giving them hints where to find the headstones, encourage them to ask questions and record them on their devices and spend time with the older before the knowledge and skills they have disappear.

Ever-growing access to online records means that many family history researchers aren't taking advantage of physical repositories like they used to. But, [as we discuss in this article about the important of offline records](#), a great deal of what we need to really understand our ancestors still cannot be found digitally.

That's why taking advantage of libraries and record archives, in person, is still so critically important to building a successful family tree. And now that it is becoming safer and safer to travel in the covid era, most of these locations are again open to the public.

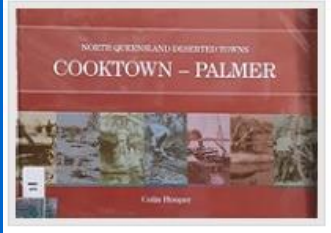
So, whether you're doing research in your own town, making a trip to the home of an ancestor for records you can't find ([or order](#)) online, or requesting a lookup and mailed copy of a record (this is a common service and usually not terribly expensive) make the most of the libraries and archives in the areas you are researching.

Volume 5 discloses Gulf Railway – Croydon

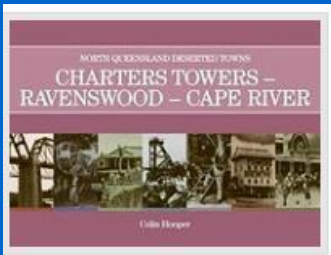
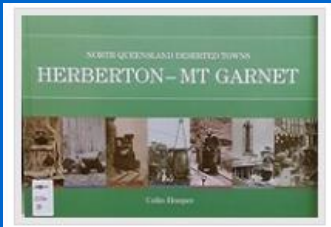
Volume 6 explores Etheridge – Woolgar

In Flanders Fields

by John McCrae, 1914

In Flanders fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place; and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly

Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie,
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae was a Canadian poet, physician, author, artist and soldier during World War I. He was also a surgeon during the Second battle of Ypres, in Belgium.





Norman Leslie Carrington



Born 3rd December 1920, enlisted into the Australian Army at the age of 21 on 7th January 1942. He served overseas at New Britain leaving Australia on 29th November 1944. Norman served with the Australia Auxiliary Horse Transport Company then transferred to Australian Water Transport Operational Company, finally transferring to the 39th Australian Works Company. On 16th December 1944 he disembarked his posting back to Australia and was discharged on 4th March 1946.

William Hearn



Born 15th January 1912, enlisted into the Australian Army at the age of 21 on 26th November 1942. He served at home evacuating smaller war hospitals, moving them to bigger hospitals and built a number of Convalescent Depots for the Army. William Hearn was not able to serve overseas; at enlistment he had a wife and five children. On the 23rd June 1943 he was declared medically unfit and was discharged from service on 17th July 1943.

Amelia Frances Field



Born 27th August 1914, enlisted into the Australian Army at the age 28 of on 16th October 1941. She served with the 106th Australia General Hospital in Melbourne before transferring to Bonegilla Army Camp where she was promoted to Sergeant. In 1943 Amelia embarked on the HMAS Canberra to Townsville then onto Port Moresby with the 8th Australian Company. She returned back to Australia on 27th March 1944 disembarking in Townsville and spending time at the barracks, before being shipped off to Morotai on a hospital ship in June of 1945. Amelia return to Sydney 17th March 1946 and was discharged on 24th April 1946.

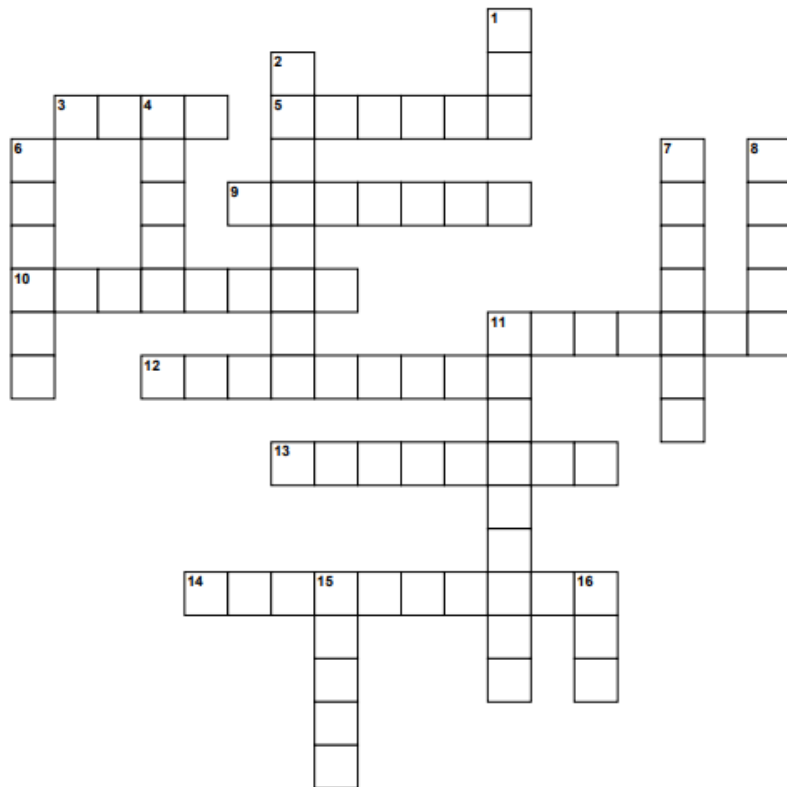
