


In the early days, the entire resources of the Association were transported to each meeting in a suitcase. Moving in time to a cupboard in the staff room of the Currajong State School.

My first introduction to Family History came when flicking through a 1982 Australasian Post magazine, which featured a story about the Society of Genealogists in Sydney. A 'booklet' 'was mentioned and suggested that anyone interested in Family History should purchase one.

As my four grandparents had passed away over the previous few years I realised that this was an omen; I sent for the booklet and learned the basics of genealogy as it was pre-computer days. Later I read in the Townsville Bulletin that a Society had commenced in Townsville and there was a meeting monthly on a Saturday afternoon at the Currajong School. I joined and drove up from Giru for each meeting.

One highlight I recall from this time was when the guest speaker (Helen Mayes from UNI.), brought along some of their oldest acquisitions, one of which featured the name of Antrobus, in which I had interest.

Not long after my husband was transferred by CSR to Hambledon

Mill at Mapleton, and I joined the Cairns & District Society. This club met under the home of the then president. Eventually we were able to obtain a venue at Raintrees Shopping Centre. We increased our research materials and met a number of prominent genealogists from both Australia and England. During this period I served a stint as Librarian and President, and also worked at various locations around the area for Cairns Municipal Library.



After about eight years Hambledon Mill ceased crushing and another decision had to be made. On a holiday we had visited Mapleton (in the hills behind Nambour) and had liked the area; as the local Mapleton Store was for sale that is where we were in 1992. And so I was off to join The Sunshine Coast Family & Historical Society. Bob's health was deteriorating, and after eleven years we sold the shop. I now had time to catch up a little with computerization of my research, become a weekly volunteer and Secretary.


In 2010, we decided to devote some help to my mother, daughter and grandchildren, and move back to Townsville; where it all began.




Bookshelf Treasures


When Narrabri was Young

This book takes the reader on a journey through the town of Narrabri's early past, from 1818 when the first white man set foot in this area of north west New South Wales to 1900 when the tow stood established and secure as one of the principal towns in the region.

Guy Hunt, the author, a former Narrabri resident of long standing, undertook the task of writing the story Narrabri's early years when the Narrabri Municipal Council decided in 1977 to proceed with the project.


The book has been carefully researched and contains a wealth of historical information about the origins and development of the town. But author Hunt does more. He gives substance and personality to many of the pioneers who lived, worked and died in the town and district through extracts from diaries, letters, reports and newspaper clippings of the period. The text is further enhanced by photographs, drawings and etchings of old Narrabri and its people.





Early chapters outline basic steps such as drawing family trees, using census records and searching for birth, marriage, and death certificates. Others outline strategies for organizing research and making use of the Internet and other technology.

For experienced genealogists there is detailed information on legal, military, professional-association, and property records. There is extensive information regarding Church of England parish registers, as well as information for tracing Catholic, Jewish, and other nonconformist records. The book is further enhanced by almost 100 illustrations of various records, wills, gravestones, and family photographs.







Our library has received a generous donation of new books for the library, our volunteers are working hard at cataloguing them and putting them into our TinyCat system allowing you to borrow these new resources out.
















We have also received a collection of photos which we are sorting and trying to find out more about before we add them to the displays in the library.


Our biggest donation was from Nick Shailer who donated 5 large volumes of English Newspapers Editions to the library.





This Month's Feature - Convicts







- Britain shipped 52 000 convicts to America between 1717 and 1775 before they sent to Australia because of the American Revolution.
- First Fleet left Portsmouth in Hampshire, England on 13 May 1787 arriving at Botany Bay, New South Wales, Australia between 18-20 January 1788
- There was 11 ships, 6 convict ships, 2 naval ships and 3 ships with supplies
- The ships were HMS Sirius, Charlotte, Alexander, Scarborough, Lady Penrhyn, Friendship, HMS Supply, Prince of Wales, Golden Grove, Fishburn and Borrowdale
- The captain was Arthur Phillip
- The journey took 259 days that was 8 months and 14 days
- The First Fleet stopped at Tenerife in the Canary Islands, Rio de Janeiro in Brazil and Cape Town at South Africa, to stock up on food and supplies.
- When the ships left England there was a total of 1420 people on board Officials and passengers 15, Crew 323, Marines 247, Marines wives and children 46. Male convicts 582. Female convicts 193. Convicts' children 14.
- Most people were English, Irish or Scottish but there were some South Africans, American and French convicts
- There was 18 turkeys, 20 geese, 35 ducks, 122 fowls, 87 chickens, kittens, puppies, 4 mares, 2 stallions, 4 cows, 1 bull, 44 sheep, 19 goats, 32 hogs, 5 rabbits and Governor Phillip's greyhounds and Reverend Johnsons's cats
- The fleet arrived at Botany Bay but was deemed unsuitable as a settlement due to lack of water, the fleet sailed on to Port Jackson arriving on 26 January 1788.
- When the fleet arrived there was a total of 1373 due to some deaths on the voyage – Officials and passengers 14, Crew 306, Marines 245, Marines wives and children 54, Male convicts 543, Female convicts 189, Convicts' children 22
- 26 January marks the arrival of the First Fleet of British ships at Port Jackson. It also signifies the beginning of European settlement in Australia. It was not always known as Australia Day it was originally know as "First Landing Day" or "Foundation Day"





Bonnet Project

It is the first Memorial to the 25,566 convict women sentenced to transportation to Australia, from 1788 to 1853, from Britain and Ireland. The project involves the making of a bonnet, similar to that worn at the time, to commemorate the life and contribution each of the women made towards the founding of a new nation.

'Blessing of the Bonnets' ceremonies are being held in various cities and towns throughout Australia, Britain and Ireland. Once the 25,566 bonnets are completed 'Bringing the Spirit of the Convict Women Back Home' ceremonies will be staged in Britain and Ireland.



The convict women will then return to Australia Free Women.

Famous Convicts

Mary Ann FOWLES



Theatre Actress 1790's

Mary Ann FOWLES (alias FOWLE, FOULE, FOULES, Mrs. Ann RADLEY) must have been quite an interesting character. During her lifetime she was an accessory to highway robbery, charged with lying under oath, a convict, a playhouse actress, a concubine, a mother, had a feisty temper and lived to the age of 81 years.

Mary Reibey

Mary Reibey (alias Molly Haydock, James Burrow) was 13 when she stole a horse in 1790. She was sentenced to transportation for seven years. When arrested she was dressed as a boy. She married Thomas Reibey who she met in transport. Over the years she became a legend in the colony as a successful business woman. She died in 1855.



Francis Greenway

Francis Greenway was born in 1777. His family was stonemasons, builders and architects. In 1812 Francis was found guilty of forging a document and



was sentenced to death but this was changed to fourteen years transportation. He arrived in Botany Bay in 1814, but due to skills and occupation he was given freedom in exchange for his designs. Greenaway died in 1837 after being grant emancipation, given a house to live in and land, But his arrogance made him many enemies and fell out with the governors when he issued a bill for 11 000 pounds. Thus ending his career.

Alfred Chopin

Alfred Chopin was convicted for accepting stolen goods to 10 years penal servitude in Australia. He was transported to Western Australia on the

Norwood arriving in Freemantle on 13 July 1867. But they had the wrong man, he was given a pardoned for the crime he did not commit in 1869. However he was now stranded in Australia. Alfred obtained a confectioner's licence and opened a shop in Perth. He married Ellen Mary McNamara and had eight children. He started a photography business in 1872 and become a famous portrait and photographer and was appointment by his Excellency.




THE CONVICT SHIPS -


"SURPRIZE 2"

The "Surprize 2" sailed from Cork, England on 2 May 1794 for the trip of 176 days via Rio de Janeiro arriving at Port Jackson on 25 October 1794.

On board there were 23 men and 60 women.



Captain Patrick Campbell was paid one guinea for each convict landed in Port Jackson. Thus, he was under pressure to take care of the convicts. Not one convict died during the voyage. There were reports of mutiny being voiced. Amongst the convicts were some deserters from the Savov Prison. The captain put these six soldiers in irons to avoid problems.

"Sovereign I"

Sovereign I set sail on 14 July 1827 from under the command of William McKellar and the ship's surgeon Robert Malcolm. The ship arrived on 20 November 1827 at Van Diemen's Land with 81 female convicts disembarking to the colony. There were only 129 ships that transported female convicts Australia.

Surgeon's General Comments- There could be no better circumstances for the spread of disease than that of female convicts confined in a ship and separated from their homes and country. Even so there was no great sickness on the voyage. The only death was a fourteen week old child who suffered convulsions.



Only those who have stood within the bars and heard the din of devils and the appalling sounds of despair can imagine the horrors of the hold of a convict ship.





THE YOUNGEST CONVICTS

Hudson, John (c. 1774-?)

John Hudson (c.1774-) a 9-year-old chimney-sweep who had no parents, was found guilty on 10 December 1783 at the Old Bailey, London, of breaking into a house at night and stealing clothing and a pistol. Sentenced to 7 years transportation to America, he was among the prisoners who mutinied on the convict transport *Mercury* in April 1784. Recaptured, he was sent to the *Dunkirk* hulk in June 1784. He was discharged to the *Friendship* in March 1787 and arrived in Sydney in January 1788 as part of the First Fleet. Hudson was probably the youngest male convict (when sentenced) to be sent to New South Wales.

Hudson was sent to Norfolk Island on the *Sirius* in March 1790. He received 50 lashes for 'been out of his hutt after nine o'Clock' on 15 February 1791. He returned to Port Jackson prior to 1792. There is a John Hudson marked off stores at Port Jackson on 24 October 1795. If this is him it is the last record that has been found for him in the colony.

HAYWOOD/HAYWARD ELIZABETH

Elizabeth was the born on 20th July 1773 to Samuel and Elizabeth Haywood in Stepney in the Parish of Saint Mary White Chapel. On Wednesday 10 January 1787, she was tried by the Middlesex Jury at the Justice Hall in Old Bailey. Her occupation at the time was an apprentice clog maker to Mr Thomas Cross.

On 19 December 1786, Elizabeth stole a linen gown value at 4 shillings, a silk bonnet valued at 2 shillings and a bath cloak valued at 1 shilling. She then prawned these goods off to Sarah Phillips.

Elizabeth was found guilty and was sentenced to transportation for 7 years. She was sent to Newgate Prison to await her transportation to Botany Bay. Elizabeth travelled to Australia on the Lady Penrhyn. She was 13 when she was sentenced and 14 when she sailed on the first fleet.

It was reported that Alexander and Lady Penrhyn had the worst conditions of all the ships, having convicts loaded onto the ships two months before setting sail. The ship was to carry only 70 convicts but had more than 100 onboard.

Elizabeth was assigned to Mary Johnson, wife of the Reverend and was a servant in her household until Monday 9 February 1789 when she was ordered 30 lashes for insolence to Mr Johnson by the Supreme Court. She was sentence to Norfolk Island and was put aboard the HMS Sirius in March 1790, which was shipwrecked in dangerous surf off the coast of Norfolk Island.

Elizabeth survived this trauma, and become a mother on 2 March 1794 to a baby girl. It is believe that Elizabeth had another daughter in 1796, a son in 1802. She also had children with Captain Piper and Joseph Lowe

Elizabeth was buried on 29 October 1836.


Origin of Old Sayings:

In George Washington's days, there were no cameras. One's image was either sculpted or painted. Some paintings of George Washington have him standing behind a desk with one arm behind his back while others showed both legs and both arms. Prices charged by painters were not based on how many people were to be painted, but by how many limbs were to be painted. Arms and legs are 'limbs,' therefore painting them would cost the buyer more. Hence the expression, 'Okay, but it'll cos you an arm and a leg'.

In the late 1700s, many houses consisted of a large room with only one chair. Commonly, a long wide bench folded down from the wall, and was used for dining. The 'head of the household' always sat in the chair while everyone else ate sitting on the bench. Occasionally a guest, who was usually a man, would be invited to sit in this chair during a meal. To sit in the chair meant you were important and in charge. They called the one sitting in the chair the 'chair man'. Today in business, we use the expression or title 'Chairman' or 'Chairman of the Board'.


Early politicians required feedback from the public to determine what the people considered important. Since there were no telephones, TV's, radios nor internet, the politicians sent their assistants to local taverns, pubs and bars. They were told to 'go sip some Ale and listen to people's conversations and political concerns. Many assistants were dispatched at different times. 'You go sip here' and 'You go sip there'. The two words 'go sip' were eventually combined when referring to the local opinion and, thus we have the term 'gossip'.

At local taverns, pubs and bars, people drank from pint and quart-sized containers. A barmaid's job was to keep an eye on the customers and keep the drinks coming. She had to pay close attention and remember who was drinking in pints and was drinking in quarts, hence the phrase 'minding your Ps and Qs'.
