In September 2023, I was appointed to fill an RAHS Council position and as Editor for the *Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society*.


I am a practicing lawyer and legal history academic, with a military background. I earned my commission in the Royal Australian Infantry Corps,



and later served in the Australian Army Legal Corps across a variety of tactical, operational and strategic level postings. The focus of my work for the past decade has been on domestic security operations, with postings to Maritime Border Command and Special Operations Command and my PhD in the constitutional frameworks around calling out the troops. This was primarily from my interest in the legal history perspective of military intervention in industrial actions, and prerogative rule in colonial Australia. Indeed, Enid Campbell's paper on the topic in 1964 with the *Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society* catalysed my interest in the subject!

Although not holding a 'traditional' entry in history, or Australian history, I do hope to earn my stripes. I have published a monograph on the history of military interventions in Australia (*Keeping the Peace of the Realm*, LexisNexis, 2021) and I edit a series of books that address different laws of war across time and history, outside of European constructs (*The Laws of Yesterday's Wars*, Brill). One of my professional aims with the *JRAHS* is to engage a wide spectrum of RAHS members, and academia, in publications. It is my hope that we will be able to start to record and publish pieces in presentations – just like Dr Campbell did. It will be great to re-invigorate the *JRAHS* and be able to engage with one another.

I look forward to my dual roles with the RAHS, and to connecting with everyone. I will notify members soon about my plans for the journal.



#### The Voice to Parliament Referendum

This Saturday will mark a significant milestone in Australia's history. Whatever the outcome, the result could be a 'paradigm-shifting moment', to quote historian Clare Wright. Professor Wright and 350 historians have signed an open letter in support of the Voice and the Uluru Statement From The Heart. In their letter, they urge Australians to vote Yes on 14 October in recognition of the 'historical injustices' suffered by Indigenous Australians:

We know from our own empirical studies, and the evidence-based research of our peers and colleagues, that Australia's Indigenous peoples have suffered from historic injustices as a result of the colonisation and dispossession of their lands, as well as the exploitation of their labour and resources in a way that has prevented them from achieving full and equal participation in our society.

We each believe those injustices warrant Constitutional recognition and enshrinement of a Voice.

In the lead-up to this important referendum, the Royal Australian Historical Society urges its members and friends to make an informed decision before

The Tenth Theo Barker Lecture

On 21 September 2023, I presented the tenth Theo Barker Lecture titled *The more things change the more they stay the same* at the Bathurst Memorial Entertainment Centre. The lectures are held every two years and honour the memory of Theo Barker, a former President and active and valued member of the Bathurst District Historical Society from 1956 until his death in August 2003. My lecture focused on Theo Barker's presentation to the 1973 RAHS conference, where he discussed the results of his 1972 survey of the needs,

The survey was an attempt by the RAHS to 'get some facts about historical societies so that they would not be working from supposition'. It succeeded, providing a perfect snapshot in time while also confirming that despite the passage of time and the opportunities and challenges of modern technology, the problems facing today's historical societies differ little from those of fifty years ago. These include concerns about falling numbers of volunteers, lack of funds and space, difficulties in attracting and keeping members, and the need to maintain relevance within the community.

Theo's report also identified the aims of historical societies – collecting, researching, preserving, exhibiting and interpreting archives and artefacts relating to the area for the benefit and education of the community. There was one notable absence. None of the societies that responded to the survey referred to any engagement with First Nations people. Over the past fifty years, much has changed. Significant steps have been made towards reconciliation between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous peoples, providing historical societies with the opportunity to be part of this process through their engagement with their local communities.


# 2023 RAHS Conference - The Way Ahead: Local and Community Histories for our Future

## RAHS Day Lecture The Shipwreck: The True Story of the *Dunbar*

**Speaker:** Larry Writer.

In The Shipwreck: The True Story of the Dunbar, the Disaster That Broke the Colony's Heart and Forged a Nation's Spirit, author Larry Writer chronicles the tragedy when, in a ferocious storm at midnight on 20 August 1857, Dunbar, a magnificent sailing clipper, collided with the cliffs of outer South Head and 121 of the 122 passengers and crew perished. Larry reveals why the ship crashed, who was to blame, and follows the personal stories of its crew, the passengers and the sole survivor, James Johnson, whose miracle rescue defies belief. The effect on the fledgling colony is movingly told. More than a third of Sydney's 57,000 population lined the streets as the funeral procession of the victims made its sad way at dusk from Circular Quay to Camperdown Cemetery. The aftermath to the shipwreck saw enormous and desperately needed changes to Port Jackson navigation and maritime safety, including the building of Hornby lighthouse that still stands overlooking the Heads, upgrading of the marine pilot service, and the construction of a telegraph line from South Head to the city.


A joint meeting of the Australiana Society and the Ceramic Collectors Society. \$30 per person with a welcome drink, then a talk and display of the State Library's 'Sydney Punchbowl', as well as a modern replica and relevant archival material. Members and their quests are welcome to attend.

The Sydney Punchbowl in the State Library collection, c.1820, is one of only two Chinese export hand-painted porcelain punchbowls known to exist that depict scenes of Sydney Town dating from the Macquarie era. This punchbowl is rare and of exceptional interest to those with a love of Australiana and ceramics.

A PowerPoint presentation will be given by Robert Hannan of the Australiana Society. Reference to the second punchbowl in the National Maritime Museum of Australia will also be made.

The Sydney Punchbowl and a modern replica along with relevant material from the State Library archives will all be on display for close-up inspection. Curatorial staff will be in attendance to assist us and there will be time for Q&A.

Three Sheets to the Wind

When, in 1796, Calcutta-based Scottish merchants Campbell and Clark dispatched an Indian ship hurriedly renamed the *Sydney Cove* to the colony of NSW, they were hoping to make their fortune. The ship's speculative cargo was comprised of all kinds of goods to entice the new colony's inhabitants, including 7,000 gallons of rum. The merchants were planning to sell the liquor to the Rum Corp, which ruled the colony with an iron grip.

But when the *Sydney Cove* went down north of Van Diemen's Land, cargo master William Clark and sixteen other crew members were compelled to walk 600 miles to Sydney Town to get help to save the rest of the crew and the precious goods. Assisted by at least six Indigenous clans on his journey,


Clark saw far more of the country than Joseph Banks ever did, and his eventual report to Governor Hunter led to far-reaching consequences for the colony.

# Treasure House The Stewart Dawson Story

In February 1998, the death occurred in South Kensington, London of David Stewart Dawson. The passing of the 75-year-old retired taxi driver went unremarked. There is no record of a funeral notice. He departed in obscurity. This was the same David who had inherited a life of privilege and luxury in Australia fifty years earlier, lived at Sydney's best addresses, married two beautiful women, owned a hotel and gambled millions, only to lose it all in scandal and shame.

**Speaker:** Geoff Nadin is a retired business consultant living in Springwood, Blue Mountains, who wrote too many dry-as-dust reports for too many indifferent readers. Seeking an outlet for his unacknowledged talents, he turned over a stone and found, right on his doorstep, a whole world hidden in plain sight: the long-forgotten saga of the Stewart Dawsons. The path it took him on was long and winding, the goal sometimes out of reach. But the reward was worth the effort, he thinks. With several short stories already published and a possible novel in the pipeline, he's playing the literary field, enjoying every minute of it.

Advocacy requires a multifaceted approach in Parramatta where its significant heritage is under substantial threat from the burgeoning development plan for the Central River City. The challenges Parramatta faces are not only individual site based but require the recognition of Parramatta as an area with an overarching heritage context. Cheryl will use examples of some lesser known Parramatta advocacy battles in which she has been involved. She is also a member of the City of Parramatta Council Heritage Advisory Committee; Greater Sydney Parklands Parramatta Park Community Trustee Board; Parramatta Heritage Partners and the Roxy Theatre Action Group. In June 2022, Cheryl was awarded an Order of Australia medal (OAM) for 'community history preservation' to acknowledge her work in Parramatta.




seeking family historians to join our research project.


