### **2023 President's Report**

I would like to thank those of you who have continued to support the Society through your membership. Without you the Society would not be able to keep on with the work that we do. And also, many, many thanks to your Executive - Vice President: Tina Bean, Treasurer: Christine Jones, General Executive: Peter Rich, Lesley Gibb and Colin Kilduff and our Public Officer Christine Sanderson. Special thanks to Betty Willis who helps with membership and meeting minutes and many other aspects of the Society.

Also thanks those people who assist us on Fridays and at other times – our open houses, speaking events, book sales, festivals, research enquiries and so on. It is through your support that we continue to be a viable organisation. If you would like to be more involved with the Society, even in any small way, please let us know.

Thanks also to our two patrons, Judith Godden and John Booth, for your continuing support.

We have been fairly busy this year. We managed to hold all of our regular monthly meetings, something that we have not been able to do since 2019. And, we have been here most Fridays, working away.

As you all know, the City of Ryde Council owns Willandra, but they are more than pleased to involve us in their events. We have held a couple of joint events with them recently. A Seniors' Day in 2022 was heavily attended after it was postponed due to rain. We held another Seniors' Day yesterday (10 February), with over 90 people attending. This means that more people are able to see the house and learn what we are doing. We can now spread the word of our events through the Council's online media, reaching a greater number of people. We have also managed to have Willandra added to the Council's list of properties to be cleaned and a cleaner comes in once a month.

The Council has appointed a new Heritage Officer, Fiona Mann, and we are working with her in an effort to have the NBN connected to Willandra. As it is a heritage property this is taking some time to work through, but Fiona is supporting us and working through the necessary requirements.

We have received a grant from RCC for \$2,200. This is being used to scan five Ryde Council letterbooks covering the period 1870 to 1920. These will be in PDF format and we can then work on indexing them.

We will again be working with Macquarie University within their PACE (Professional and Community Engagement) project. This allows us students to assist with, or work on new projects, for 75 hours each.

From 19 March we will be holding our regular Sunday Open House. We had discussed, pre-Covid, the possibility of having a speaker at these Sundays, holding a workshop or other events both for our members and to engage with the public. With this in mind we are hoping to have a discussion session with our members following the March General meeting to look at possibilities.

We will also be trying to arrange a couple of excursions throughout the year. If you have any ideas or preferences, please let us know.


# Mapping Ryde and Field of Mars Cemetery

In 2016 some members of the Society commenced work on our digital database – Mapping Ryde. The database currently contains nearly 70,000 items and images, categorised mainly into three sections: people, places and events. One of these places is the Field of Mars Cemetery.

2021 saw RDHS members and Macquarie University students working together to photograph and transcribe headstones in the Presbyterian and Congregational sections at Field of Mars Cemetery. Around 5,000 photographs of graves, crypts, tombs, headstones and memorials have been taken and the text transcribed. RDHS members Maureen Copley, Marg Farlow, Sabina Fielding-Smith, Chris Jones, Helen Patterson, Chris Sanderson and Betty Willis spent hours at the cemetery checking the work of the students and checking the exact location of graves against maps. Covid did slow this process but all this information has now been added to Mapping Ryde. The Congregational section is complete, the Presbyterian section has about 20% still to do. The remaining sections are yet to be started.


What have we collected? What does the information look like? An interactive map has been made for each section currently being worked on. Once you know the grave number, the link on the map will take you directly to the grave.

Buried in grave 381 is Mary Ann McINTOSH who died on 8 May 1942. At the time of her death Mary was living at 44 Regent Street, Ryde (now Putney).

High resolution photographs of the grave and headstones are attached, together with copies of Mary's death and funeral notice from the *Sydney Morning Herald* newspaper. This information is also linked to her address at 44 Regent Street, Ryde.



### Bill Stacey – Founding President of the Ryde District Historical Society

If you wander the grounds at *Willandra*, headquarters of the RDHS, you will come across a small monument at the base of our flagpole that commemorates our founding President, Albert William "Bill" Stacey. Pat Smyth wrote a history of the early years of the Society for the November 2007 issue of *The Ryde Recorder* and she started with the following paragraph:

The existence of Ryde District Historical Society is owed to Ryde Rotary Club, and especially to its President, Mr. A.W. (Bill) Stacey, whose idea it was to make the foundation of a Historical Society for the area Rotary's project for his presidential year.

A public meeting was held in October 1961 at the old Ryde Town Hall in Blaxland Road and, with the support of Alderman C M Cutler, historian Colin Roderick and *The Weekly Times* proprietor John Booth, it was agreed to arrange a first meeting of a Ryde District Historical Society and this was held in December of 1961. It appears that it is a tradition of Rotary International that new Presidents espouse a special project.

Albert William "Bill" Stacey was born on 1 September 1903 at Inverell, northern NSW (Reg. No. 30776), the son of James Stacey and Edith nee Mawkes. Bill was the second of seven children, four girls and three boys. He married Florence May Hough, known as May, daughter of Michael Joseph Hough and Matilda Jane nee Stewart, on 3 January 1928 at St Stephen's Church, Newtown (RN 2519). May was born on 3 November 1904, also in Inverell (RN 33058), and was christened on 14 March 1905 in St Mary's, Bundarra.

Bill had trained as a teacher in the NSW public school system and there are some details of his early career in the Public Service Lists:

- In 1926 and 1927, he was an Assistant Teacher at Adelong District School.
- In 1928 and 1929, he was an Assistant at Murrumburrah I. H. School

From 1930 to 1980 Bill and May Stacey were in the following Electoral Rolls:

- 1930 and 1932, 34 Wombat St, Forbes, ("school teacher" and "home duties"),
- 1933, 20 Byng St Orange, ("school teacher" and "home duties"),
- 1934, 1935, 65 Maxwell St, Wellington, ("school teacher" and "home duties"),
- 1936 and 1937, School Residence, Murrurundi, ("school teacher" and "home duties"),
- 1943, District School, Quirindi, ("school teacher" and "home duties"),
- 1949, 68 Brae St, Inverell, ("school inspector" and "home duties") (His mother Edith Stacey was living at 28 Bannockburn Rd, Inverell.),
- 1954, 54 Tozer St, Kempsey, ("school inspector" and "home duties") (They were accompanied by their daughter Laurel Jean, "bank officer".),
- 1958 to 1980, 1 Commissioners Road, Ryde, ("inspector of schools" and "home duties").

From the above lists, we can theorise that Bill was promoted to Principal at Murrurundi in 1936 and to Inspector at Inverell in 1949. In fact, his appointment to Inspector was at Inverell in 1947 (*Government Gazette of the State of NSW*, Friday 26 September 1947, Page 2305). Also, according to numerous articles in *The Inverell Times*, he was a dominant golfer in the town during the late 1940s.

Perhaps Bill was sporty and this was why, from 1955 to 1957, he served on the National Fitness Council of NSW, as reported in the *Government Gazette* of Friday 10 June 1955, Page 1567:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION. - National Fitness Council of New South Wales. - HIS Excellency, the Governor, and the Executive Council has approved the appointment of Mr. Albert William Stacey as representative of the Institute of Inspectors of Schools on the National Fitness Council of New South Wales in the place of Mr. Dallas Arnold Dunstan. - J. J. CAHILL, Premier.

There was a similar notice in the *Government Gazette* of Friday 5 July 1957, Page 2077, when he was replaced by the next representative, Rowland Stanley James Dart.

Because he was an educator, Bill's first project within the RDHS was the compilation of a booklet entitled *A Basic History of Ryde*. The first edition was published in 1964 and the Preface states:

This small booklet is an attempt both to preserve and to disseminate knowledge of the past. It has been kept brief and simple in an endeavour to capture the interest of the citizens and to provide data for school pupils [author's underlining].

This *Basic History* was reprinted in 1966 and a new edition came out in 1976 with extra information, including a "chronicle of recent events" at the back. There was also a third edition in 1981. Like the earlier history books about Ryde, *Ryde*, 1790 – 1926 (edited by R Carmichael) and *Wallumetta* (written by M C I Levy in 1947), all the characters of *Basic History* are either settlers or pioneers and the word convict does not appear. It was not until *A Place of Pioneers* (Philip Geeves, 1970) that the word convict could be used; however, Geeves did call his second chapter "Reluctant Pioneers".

Despite some minor errors and slightly outdated emphases, Bill Stacey's *A Basic History of Ryde* is still a good introduction to the European history of our area. When I joined the RDHS in 1987, Bill was still presenting talks based on his booklet and he could describe the settlement of the district in considerable detail. I heard his talk a few times in the early years of my membership.

Bill lost his wife May on 12 May 1990 and the following notices appeared in the *Sydney Morning Herald* of 14 May 1990, page 34:

STACEY, Florence May. - May 12, 1990, of West Ryde, formerly of Kempsey, Inverell and Quirindi, beloved wife of Bill and loved mother of Laurel and John and loved nanna of Debbie, Shane, Nigel, Sandra, Mark and Christopher. Aged 85 years.

STACEY. - The funeral of the late Mrs. MAY STACEY of West Ryde will leave St Anne's Anglican Church, corner Victoria Road and Church Street, Ryde, tomorrow (Tuesday), after a service commencing at 10.15 a.m. for the Northern Suburbs Crematorium. - In lieu of flowers, well-wishers

may forward donations to the Diabetic Association of N.S.W., 250 Pitt Street, Sydney. ALBERT & MEYER, THORNLEIGH.


Bill himself died on 12 March 1996, described as "late of Eastwood" in his death notice in the *SMH* of 16 March. We can see from May's death notice that he had two children and several grandchildren but there is a sense in which the members of the RDHS are also his descendants.

### The War Memorial Honour Board at West Ryde Baptist Church Colin Kilduff

The West Ryde Baptist Church contains a memorial board honouring those of its members who served in the Second World War. The board was originally installed and dedicated in the second church building in 1946.


In Baptist churches of the time, decisions were usually made at monthly meetings of the deacons, who were elected lav people. various discussions behind the original proposal and background apparently went largely unrecorded. example, the deacons decided on 7 August 1945 to proceed with the honour roll the minutes imply previous discussions on the subject.

The minutes of the deacons meeting of 4 December 1945 record that "... The matter of implementing the Honour Roll was gone into. The

cooperation of the Baptist National Service Auxiliary be sought as to obtaining a complete list ..."




WW2 Honour Roll Photograph: Colin Kilduff

The minutes for the meeting in January 1946 recorded that all the eligible names should be inscribed irrespective of length of service, unit or sex and that all ranks be dispensed with. It was also decided to have the service of memorial on the evening of Sunday 17 March. This would coincide with the 22<sup>nd</sup> Anniversary of the church.

The same meeting decided to invite Rev E J Rogers, a former minister of the church, to give the address and perform the unveiling of the Roll. Rev H E Evans, the present Pastor, should also give a short address. Although there were several soldiers named E J Rogers who enlisted during the war, he is almost certainly the Edward James Rogers who was living at West Ryde when he enlisted in 1942 and whose service number was NX169209.

In later years the building needed to be enlarged. With the remodelling, the grand gable with its rose window could not be accommodated. When the third enlarged and remodelled building opened in 1962 the war memorial board was reinstalled.

The church is now known as West Ryde Community Church, although it remains a member of the Baptist Union of NSW & ACT.

# Reverend E J (Ernest James) Rogers

Shortly after Rogers took up his position at West Ryde, *the Sydney Morning Herald* ("The Churches. West Ryde Baptist. The Rev. E. J. Rogers" 28/1/1939, p. 11) reported that he had served at several churches, most recently Dulwich Hill, and that he had recently celebrated the silver jubilee (25 years) of his ordination.

Three years earlier, several newspapers had reported that he was taking up his position at Dulwich Hill and that he had been born at Sofala (e.g., the *Daily Examiner*, Grafton, "Personal," 19/11/1935, p. 4).

Ernest James Rogers was born in 1880 (NSW BDM 24421/1880) at Sofala, to William and Mary Jane Rogers. He married Florence Edith Stocker in 1912 (NSW BDM 3055/1912). He was more than 60 years old when he enlisted with the Defence Forces (NAA.gov.au Name Search, under Army Personnel Records). He served as a chaplain.

Ernest died in 1950, age 70 years (NSW BDM 29394/1950). The funeral notice mentioned that he was late of West Ryde and Kurri Kurri. The service was to be held at Central Baptist Church with the burial in the Independent section at Rookwood.

### From the Archives

**Betty Willis** 

I was going through the old Ryde Recorders in the Reading Room at *Willandra* and came across the following article in which the writer certainly believed in not mincing his words:

1st May 1967:

Extract from Sydney Gazette, 17th April, 1803.

LIFE AT KISSING POINT

On Thursday night last, a settler at Kissing Point attempted to put a period to his worldly difficulties, by scientifically applying a noose to his neck, and turning himself off in due form. The noise occasioned by this dernier resource alarmed the young girl in an adjoining room, who, with a remarkable presence of mind, severed the suspending cord, and thus, though not without much difficulty, restored the care-devoted victim to the current of anxiety by which he had been precipitated to so criminal an attempt upon his own existence; and which had been occasioned, as we are informed, by a super-abundance of sensibility, and an insupportable vexation, occasioned by the elopement of an amiable partner, as paramour, to add to his mortification, wore a wooden leg.

Another item I saw in the Ryde Recorder of 1st June 1967 it is recorded that at the last meeting of the Society, Roland Trevitt read from the first of the series "Fragments" which is collecting from information given in interviews with old identities of Ryde. Unfortunately it doesn't give the name of the Ryde identity who spoke this "fragment"

'Let us pick up all the fragments we can and sift and sort them. Placed together, the pieces that remain will eventually give us a true picture.'

It is in effect what members of Historical Societies are doing, collecting whatever historical facts can be found and hopefully putting them together to show the complete history of an event, a building etc.
