

TROVE TREASURES

The National Library of Australia welcomes the commitment made by the Albanese Government to provide \$33m over the next 4 years to maintain Trove, with \$9.2m ongoing and indexed funding from July 2027. We are delighted that Trove's future has been secured.

Trove has a place for every story, with 14 billion Australian moments captured for future generations. It has a story for every place, with Voluntroves [sic] from Groote Eylandt in the Northern Territory to Burnie in Tasmania. It is where old poetry is transformed into new lyrics, newspaper articles become historical fiction, and where Australian humanities research is powered.

Most recently, it has been a place for First Nations communities to continue to tell their stories, through our First Australians pages.

Trove is a place for all Australians, which is connected to all our places. It is a truly national treasure, and an international world leader. The overwhelming support we have received from the Trove community (both new and old) has been humbling. We take our role as the custodians of Trove, on behalf of the Library and our partner organisations, very seriously.

The certainty of this funding decision will allow the National Library to continue to provide this essential service, enrich it with new content, and stabilise and secure the platform, in line with the Trove Strategy. ... ❖






Last session on 22 June 2023

THE SCOURGE OF POLIO [INFANTILE PARALYSIS] IN THE 1930S

I recently discovered that a cousin of my mother's, Brian Douglas REMILTON died from polio in 1938. He was only 10 years old. He had the dubious honour of being the first such fatality in Cairns. It is all so sad. The information in the local paper is reminiscent of recent Covid regulations.

FATAL PARALYSIS.

CAIRNS SCHOOLBOY DIES. STRINGENT REGULATIONS.



The first fatal case of infantile paralysis in the Far North occurred in the isolation ward of the Cairns District Hospital shortly after 1 p.m. yesterday, when Brian

Remilton, a 10-year-old scholar of the Marist Brothers' School, passed away. The funeral will take place this morning.

Dr. J.V. Guinane, medical superintendent of the Cairns District Hospital stated last evening that in addition to the prohibitions, already provided in the "Government Gazette" all children arriving in Cairns from Southern States must report immediately to him as Municipal Medical Officer of Health at the District Hospital, and continue to attend at the hospital daily for examination for a period of three weeks. Such children must not attend any school in Cairns for three weeks, after arrival here.

The gazettal provides that, until April 6, 1938, no person under the age of 16 years shall, attend, or be permitted to attend at any cinematograph theatre, place of amusement or resort, or other places or premises where persons regularly or occasionally congregate or assemble for amusement, entertainment, dancing, physical culture or athletics, within the city of Cairns, also that Marist Brothers' School, Cairns, will remain closed until April 6, 1938, and any children living in the same home as those attending the Marist Brothers School are forbidden from attending any school for the same period.

Poliomyelitis known as infantile paralysis is caused by an ultra microscopic or filter passing virus usually conveyed by droplet infection from infected mucus membranes or contaminated faeces.



The disease was not confined to children. Joan Bushnell (1937-41) remembers:

"The poliomyelitis epidemic of 1938 was frightening. It was a crippling disease. Most of us had known or seen a child at school limping around with one shortened leg, wearing an ugly built-up boot with iron splints around the leg."

In severe cases Polio attacks groups of motor nerve cells in the spine and depending upon the extent of inflammation, various muscles in one or more limbs can be paralysed. If the paralysis involves the diaphragm or respiratory muscles artificial respiration is required to keep the patient breathing. Initially the patient was kept at rest. The paralysed limbs were supported and splinted, care had to be taken that the limbs remained straight and did not become cold and blue from lack of circulation. When the patient's condition improved, usually after several weeks, massage, movement and re-education of the affected limbs would commence. A cheerful optimistic atmosphere was an essential requisite for the

convalescent stage, as regaining all or some mobility was a long painful process for the patient. Hydrotherapy was used in some cases.

Polio vaccines were introduced in Australia in 1956 (Salk) and 1966 (Sabin) and were followed by mass immunisation programs. With the continuing immunisation of children, the disease has effectively been eradicated in Australia. The Polio vaccine is now included in the

Australian Government's childhood immunisation program.

It is estimated that a minimum of 20,000 – 40,000 people had paralytic polio in Australia between 1930s and 1960s. Actual figures for the number of people infected with the virus are up to a hundred times greater, 2 – 4 million Australians. Polio is no longer present in Australia.

Hopefully, some time soon, we will be able to say the same about Covid! ... ❖

On Saturday 29th April, we had a great Seminar held at the Tuggerah Community Hall, with Christine Yeats as presenter, our first for this year.



PORT MORESBY (BOMANA) WAR CEMETERY

Unofficial history of the Australian & New Zealand Armed Services

The Port Moresby Memorial stands behind the cemetery and commemorates almost 750 men of the Australian Army (including Papua and New Guinea local forces), the Australian Merchant Navy and the Royal Australian Air Force who lost their lives in the operations in Papua and who have no known graves. Men of the Royal Australian Navy who died in the south-west Pacific region, and have no known grave but the sea, are commemorated on the Plymouth Naval Memorial in England, along with many of their comrades of the Royal Navy and of other Commonwealth Naval Port Moresby (Bomana) War Cemetery lies approximately 19 kilometres north of Port Moresby on the road to Nine

Mile, and is approached from the main road by a short side road called Pilgrims Way.

The cemetery contains 3,819 Commonwealth burials of the Second World War, 702 of them unidentified.

Only one woman is buried there : Sister Marie Craig who was on board a medical transport plane that crashed in Mt Carstenz.

Historical Information.

After the Japanese landed at Lae and Salamaua in March 1942, Port Moresby became their chief objective. They decided to attack by sea, and assembled an amphibious expedition for the purpose, which set out early in May, but they were intercepted and heavily defeated by American air

and naval forces in the Coral Sea, and what remained of the Japanese expedition returned to Rabaul. After this defeat they decided to advance on Port Moresby overland and the attack was launched from Buna and Gona in September 1942.

Early in 1942, and almost without resistance, the Japanese established a considerable force and developed a useful base on Bougainville, the largest and most northerly of the Solomon Islands. This they held until Americans and Australians began offensive operations towards the end of 1943, when Bougainville was the only one of these islands remaining in Japanese hands. By August 1945, when the Japanese surrendered, most of the island had

been recovered.

Those who died in the fighting in Papua and Bougainville are buried in PORT MORESBY (BOMANA) WAR CEMETERY, their bodies brought in by the Australian Army Graves Service from burial grounds in the areas where the fighting had taken place. The unidentified soldiers of the United Kingdom forces were all from the Royal Artillery, captured by the Japanese at the fall of Singapore; they died in captivity and were buried on the island of Bailale in the Solomons. These men were later re-buried in a temporary war cemetery at Torokina on Bougainville Island before being transferred to their permanent resting place at Port Moresby.

MARIE LOUISE HAMILTON MACK (10 OCTOBER 1870 – 23 NOVEMBER 1935)

Audacious, unpredictable, bewitching – these are just some of the words used to describe Australian writer, poet, and First World War correspondent Louise Mack during and after her remarkable lifetime.

One of thirteen children born to Hans and Jemima Mack in Hobart, 1870, Louise made a name for herself as early as her teenage years. When the family moved to Sydney in 1882, Louise enrolled in Sydney Girls' High School, where she and her friend Ethel Turner – who would go on to write the

classic novel *Seven Little Australians* – edited rival magazines.

In the late 1880s when Louise was not yet twenty, she became a regular contributor to the *Bulletin*, a Sydney-based political and literary magazine. In 1898, she was given her own column, writing the 'Woman's Letter' under the pen name 'Gouli Gouli' until 1901. During these years she married her first husband, John Percy Creed, and published her first novel, *The World is Round*. Yet the true success Louise craved remained elusive. To remedy that, she sailed alone to England in 1901 to pursue fame and fortune on the world stage.


Success did not come easily overseas. Louise spent her first year there struggling to make ends meet, writing about her experiences in her 1902 book *An Australian Girl in London*. The work was well-received, and Louise was finally able to forge lasting connections in London's literary sphere.

Everything changed in 1914 when war rocked the world on a scale never before seen. Despite Lord Kitchener's restrictions on war correspondents on the Western Front, Louise managed to make her way into occupied Belgium. She travelled through German lines to Brussels, Louvain, and Antwerp, all the while reporting for both the *Evening News* and *Daily Mail*.

Louise's memoir of her time on the front, *A Woman's Experiences in the Great War*, recalls how she was the last journalist left in

Antwerp after all others had fled: "The whole city was mine. I seemed to be the only living thing left ... The ghosts of five hundred thousand people floated before my vision." She departed the city only days later, disguised as a hotel maid and smuggled from the country with a false passport. Louise's account of her final days on the Western Front cannot be confirmed. Indeed, fellow Australian war correspondent Frank Fox recalls that she left Belgium along with the other reporters.

True or not, the story was compelling enough to launch Louise on a nationwide tour upon her return home to Australia. As one Queanbeyan newspaper reported in 1918: "This is Miss Louise Mack, the pretty and charming little lady who has been thrilling crowded houses all over Australia with her wonderful recital: 'What I saw in the War'." Her lectures were almost certainly embellished versions of the truth, becoming more and more sensationalised with every new audience. It is for



this very reason, historian Jeannine Baker argues, that Louise Mack has yet to be properly studied for her role in Australian military and media history.


Yet despite the sensationalism, despite the embellishment, at the core of Louise's experiences lies the very important contribution she made towards women's achievements in journalism. Reporting on her death in 1935, the *Sydney Morning Herald* had this to say: "Her work would live after her." Eighty-five years later, we can say with certainty that it did."

"She was not only the first woman to be a war correspondent, but she was also the first Australian to study the Germans this closely during this time. She was under shell-fire for thirty-six hours in Antwerp, and at one point went right through German lines to the city of Brussels. This fearless pursuit earned her great fame in Australia and gathered many audiences in Australian theatres, streets, and anywhere Mack was willing to tell her courageous story.

While back in Australia, in 1917-1918 she used her lectures on her war experiences to raise money for the Australian Red Cross Society.



On 1 September 1924 Louise married 33-year-old Allen

Illingworth Leyland (d. 1932). In the 1930s she wrote a series of humorous but helpful articles for the Australian Women's Weekly, titled "Louise Mack advises".

Mack died in Mosman, New South Wales in 1935.

From Australian Dictionary of Biography:

In 1916 she returned to Australia and in 1917-18 toured the country, speaking on her war experiences and raising money for the Australian Red Cross Society. From 1919 to the early 1930s she lectured in the Pacific islands and New Zealand and, in association with the Department of Education and the Good Film League of New South Wales, toured Australia with travel talks and films for schools.

*When in Melbourne on 1 September 1924 Louise married 33-year-old Allen Illingworth Leyland (d.1932), a New Zealand Anzac, she claimed to have one living child. These years were very difficult for Louise, but she met misfortune with her usual courage and vitality, working as a freelance journalist and publishing two more novels, *Teens Triumphant* (1933) and *Maiden's Prayer* (1934). She died on 23 November 1935 at Mosman of cerebro-vascular disease and was cremated with Presbyterian forms. Described by Le Gay Brereton as fluffy, like a chicken, Louise was fair, pretty, extroverted, audacious, unpredictable, a genuine Bohemian who chose a life of adventure and insecurity. She died possession-less. ... ❖*

THE STORY OF CECILY

March 26, 2023, marks one year since the passing of my amazing mother. I thought I would honour her by starting to write up her life story for the family. Back in 2002, when Mum still had pretty good eyesight, I gave her a folder of loose-leaf lined pages, a glue stick and a decorative jar full of slips of paper. On each slip of paper, I had typed up a statement or questions for Mum to answer. WFHG Inc. used to sell similar Memory Jogger kits a number of years ago. These

consisted of a cloth bag, an exercise book and another small bag full of question slips. Perhaps these can be reinstated?

Mum chose a slip at random and used the question as a memory jogger. Her answers are in her handwriting, with her unique spelling, grammar and logic clearly recorded. Some of what she had to say would not be considered 'politically correct', but it is true to

what she believed about various matters.

I have transcribed her words verbatim, only adding in extremely essential punctuation and spelling corrections. Anything that needed to be explained has been added in brackets to distinguish the information as mine.

I am very lucky that my family loved taking photos, so I have many images to add to her story. A few years ago, I also created a scrapbook for Mum, documenting her many achievements. This was to celebrate her 90th birthday in 2017.

Mum was awarded the Order of Australia medal for her extensive volunteer work in 2013. Sadly, Mum's sight was taken away by macular degeneration, so she did not get to see the small details I had included in the scrapbook. Friends and family appreciated it though. I will include all the text from the scrapbook in the "Book of Cecily" as I have called this work.

I plan to put all of this information on a USB for each of my children, and for my sister's children. I will also print off at least one copy and have it bound. Who knows how long it will be before USBs are superseded? Paper has more chance of lasting a long time.

My mother-in-law, Gladys SMITH nee MUNNS, also completed her memory jogger folder about the same time. I don't have as many photos of Glad's life, but I will do the same for her notes.

Unfortunately, I don't have the same information from the men in

my family. I have been trying, for some time, for my darling husband to use his copy of the Memory Jogger to record his life before meeting me.

I have written my life story pre-marriage and have added in many relevant photos and extra detail that has come from research. If you choose to do so, please ensure that you acknowledge your sources, otherwise, you are guilty of plagiarism. My husband is assisting me in detailing our lives together. Next year we will celebrate 50 years of wedded bliss. He seems to have a better memory for details than I have. We are both avid photographers so our stories will be well supplied with images. Doing so has encouraged me to

date and identify our saved photos, whether they are in printed form or digital.

DO NOT leave boxes or albums full of unidentified photos for your children to sort out. They are more likely to bin the lot and that would be a terrible shame.


DO NOT leave your own story untold. If you are lucky enough to still have older relatives around, please talk to them about this idea. Their answers can be recorded orally if writing is not a possibility for them.

When I first started school, we were living at Chatswood. When I was seven, we moved to

Artarmon. I caught the bus or walked, usually with my sister.

Spelling was always the worst [subject], so reading was difficult. I have tried to improve over the years.

Best: History, Geography, Physiology, Maths.

[Mum was excellent at mental arithmetic.]
 Primary:- I suppose I was classed as slow, being put out to do the gardening a lot. *[I think Mum probably had some undiagnosed learning difficulties.]*
 High school: Always a struggle, never much help from home with lessons. When kept in, had to walk home from Willoughby via Mowbray Rd because there was no bus. Left school at 14 at the end of second year and started work. On leaving school have tried to better myself- Can't ever remember my sister helping me with schoolwork.

[Mum went on to attend Stott's Business College and learned book keeping, shorthand and typing. She served as President, Secretary or Treasurer of multiple organisations for many years.]

Such heart-felt comments gave me insight into my mother's experience as a student, something I would not have had without the memory jogger activity. Her other answers are just as informative.

We sold Rotary Tickets again, mostly at local shopping centres, and raised \$714. Members bravely offered to share their expertise and we ran our first "How to trace your Family History" course at San Remo Neighbourhood Centre. The course ran for 7 weeks and we gained many new members as a result. We also started producing a monthly newsletter for members which we called "The Branch".

Kerrie Metcalfe helped Pam Mansergh with this. Pam was also

the editor of our quarterly journal "Tree of Life".

In May, we hosted another BBQ at our home. On this occasion, we recognised all the work Keith had done for the group. Sadly, Keith had been diagnosed with a serious illness and his ability to participate in the group became severely reduced as a result.

In Sept. 2004 our local paper *The Central Coast Express Advocate* ran an article and photo about our group transcribing Palmdale. The photo comment was "armed with digital cameras, water, brushes, pens and paper Jan and Elaine [and others] have transcribed 3/4 of the plaques to date".

I again stood for President and Esther stayed as Secretary for 2004-5.

We attended the Yarramalong Fair in Sept. 2004 and manned a popular table. Having Keith there to chat with descendants of local pioneers was a great bonus. In Dec. 2004 we decided to hire Charmhaven Hall for our Christmas Party. Our daughter, Jacqueline, helped out as the Christmas Elf, giving out gifts. In May/June 2005 our group was featured in a lengthy article in an *Over 50's Lifestyle newspaper supplement*. Tuggerah Library now had the Internet connected and our group provided lessons to members and the public in using it for research.

When Bunnings opened at Tuggerah Super Centre, we joined the list of groups eligible to run sausage sizzles there. This has proved to be an excellent source of funds. It does, however, require a

team of dedicated people to help out each time. For many years, Norm and I cut up many kilos of onions for each BBQ. The things you do!

We also purchased our own microfiche/microfilm reader. Then we received some bad news. Wyong Plaza had been sold and was to be refurbished. We had to find a new home, yet again.

I organised a meeting with Wyong Council and we were eventually offered rooms in their newly refurbished Community Cultural Centre in the grounds of the old Wyong Public School at the beginning of 2006. The 'Cottage' had been the local Minister's residence. There used to be a church on the block below, facing the river. The old school buildings had also been allocated to different groups. It was all hands-on-deck to move ourselves into the Cottage.

Sadly, we lost Keith Shakespeare [founding member and Life Member No.1] so we decided to honour his contribution to the group by dedicating our new Library Room to him. Keith's wife Jean attended the ceremony. She also donated a lot of Keith's research materials to the group. We were finally able to run an "Exploring Family History" course in our own rooms. We also held a successful seminar at The Berkeley Centre in Glenning Valley.

Originally, we shared the Cottage with the Tuggerah Writer's Group, but they decided to meet elsewhere after a couple of years. One of the conditions of use was that we had to open to the public, so we chose

to do so on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. This meant that our members had to commit to being volunteer research assistants on a regular basis.

Our group decided that we needed to update our Pioneer Register, and we began collected data for "The next generation." By the end of the year our membership had passed 100 financial members. By the end of June 2006, the long-awaited Palmdale Lawn Cemetery and Memorial Park CD was available for sale. I had a busy year, attending the NSW State Family History Conference, The Central Coast FHS Fair, Maitland Family History Fair and the Wyong Historical Society's Pioneer Dinner. We also managed to get the Internet connected to the Cottage. The group also made many bus trips to Kingswood State Archives and Norm was our friendly driver.

In 2007 I was featured in a local publication called "*Significant Women of the Central Coast*". Later the same year, MP Paul Crittenden nominated me for the NSW Woman of the Year and for entry in a new publication called "*Who's Who in New South Wales*", Inaugural edition. I was accepted and also ended up with an entry in the "*Who's Who of Australian Women*", both published in 2008. I had to answer a lengthy series of questions for both publications and Jacqueline helped me with this task.

I was often involved with other groups, such as the Pioneer's Association. Fellow WFHG member, Lorna Clayton comes from a

Pioneer family [The SMITH's of Jilliby]. We often called upon her to give talks at our meetings. I arranged for guest speakers to receive embroidered hand towels and other items as a thank you. I often attended the annual pioneer's events as well.

Changes to our constitution meant that this would be my last year as President, so I took the opportunity to put a number of deserving members up for Life Membership. Unbeknown to me, I was also nominated, so I joined Esther, Marilyn Cridland and Pam Mansergh in receiving this honour. The group now had 162 current members. We had continued to sell Rotary Raffle tickets and run Bunnings sausage sizzles, and the group was now quite financially sound. We also purchased some microfilm for the group. We held our first open day at the Cottage, which was very successful. One of

our members, John Owen set up a website for the group and we formed a partnership with the LDS Church to obtain their microfilms for members. Over time we have used grants and our own funds to purchase computers for our members and visitors to use.

Kerrie Metcalfe took over as President for 2007- 08. We celebrated our 25th birthday that year and managed to obtain an Ancestry.com subscription for the Cottage. We had applied to run a State Conference and did so in 2009 at Wyong Racecourse. I joined the Conference committee. [photo at right of us having lunch together]

I took on the job of approaching businesses for donations, organising the printing of photos of Old Wyong and the creation of placemats for the Conference dinner. The Conference, called "From Home to the Hinterland" was a great success. I also helped man the group's bookstall. WFHG presented me with a Certificate of Appreciation for my work in organising the Conference. At our December Christmas Party, I was presented with the "Skeleton Award" for my work transcribing the dead and Norm received the Silver Salver award for all his efforts at our BBQs.

Although I was no longer President, I continued my interest in keeping our cemetery records up to date. I was our group's contact with Wyong Council's cemetery officers. I was also involved with recording the historic funeral details from Simplicity, Long Jetty.

Kerrie continued as President in 2009/10. Our Next Generation Pioneer book was published and we held another seminar and Open Day. Kerrie was made a Life Member and we had over 260 financial members. Kerrie



presented me with a plant to commemorate my 11 years on the committee and my photo was put on the front of Tree of Life in May 2010. I had resigned from the Committee in Feb. 2010 as both my and Norm's health had become an issue.

I was also Welfare Officer for many years and coordinated the embroidery of our group shirts and gifts for guest speakers. In 2010 Member of Parliament David Harris made a speech about our Conference and the Group's value to the community. Since 2010, Norm and I participated in WFH Group activities when our health allowed. In 2013, the Family History Group celebrated 30 years with a special luncheon.

In 2014 I was nominated for the Australia Day Volunteer Award, run by the then Wyong Shire Council. I was also nominated, in the same year, for Citizen of the Year.

In 2018 Wyong Family History Group celebrated 35 years with an event at Wyong Golf Club. Member for Wyong, David Harris mentioned our group's activities in Parliament, and congratulated us on our longstanding dedication to family

and local history. I attended this event. In the November 2018 edition of WFHG's Tree of Life journal, I was featured with other members who had reached various milestones. I was recognised for 20 years of membership, as was Norman. "Janice has worked tirelessly for the Group over many years until bad health made her slow down. She was President for seven years and was instrumental in getting permission to transcribe and photograph Palmdale cemetery. She has worked closely with Council to keep the Cemetery and gravedigger records up to date until recently; organised many events between 1998 and 2007 which included social BBQ's at her home, fund raising events and Bunnings BBQs."

Unfortunately, continuing ill health has stopped me from being too active lately. My mobility has been greatly affected by troublesome legs and feet and I have given up driving. I try to make it to meetings and social events, but access to our cottage is quite difficult for me.

I have focussed on tidying up my own files and finalising my work on the Shark Arm Case. I have also had family photos scanned and copied to share with other family members. Sadly, my beloved Norman passed away suddenly on 9th November 2019. I now live at Dora Creek with my daughter Jacqueline and rely on her for transport.



In 2020, fellow WFHG member, Lynda Smith helped me create two books, one about myself, and one about Norman's life. My hands don't like typing these days. We had copies made for the family. I have recently received my DNA results but have had difficulty following all the possible links. In 2023 I will celebrate 25 years with the group. I am very proud of our achievements to date and I hope that the group continues to grow in the future. ❖





THE CENTRAL COAST MILLION DOLLAR ROTARY CLUB

The Rotary Club of The Entrance

Over the last 39 years The Rotary Club of The Entrance have been running a Community Raffle where local charities sell raffle tickets to raise money for their own organisations. This year the total raised over the 39-year period has passed the one-million-dollar mark at \$1,002,625, with 36 charity and community groups taking part during the year, raising over \$30,000 for the local community.

The Rotary Club procures the prizes and pays for printing the tickets. They then invite local charities to sell the tickets over a 20-week period with the Raffle draw being held in mid-February. After the draw the Rotary Club donates back the value of all tickets sold to participating organisations.

The beauty of this project is that it enables small local groups to sell

tickets, knowing that every ticket they sell will result in the money they raise coming back to them. And although the administration can be onerous, the club is able to direct significant funds into the community.

The club's first Combined Community Raffle was conducted in 1985-86, being the brainchild of a Rotarian, Merv Harvey who wanted to do something to help local charities. Merv ran the raffle for five years turning it over to Con Bartsos in 1988 who ran it for the next 26 years. In the inaugural year, the first prize was a trip to Fiji; it is now \$4,000 thanks to Mingara. Local community groups participated and received from the club an amount equal to the value of tickets sold. The principle of 100% return to participating organisations was part of the original formula. In its second year, eighteen community

organisations sold tickets, with 13500 tickets printed. Money raised was \$9,408.

This is the longest running project for a Rotary Club on the Central Coast winning the 1991 Sydney Morning Herald Community Service Award for the Wyong Shire, having by that time raised \$100,000. In 2002, the club's 30th year, the "30-30-30" goal for the club's Community Raffle was achieved: a \$3,000 prize and \$30,000 raised, and breaking through the \$300,000 mark in total funds raised by community organisations since the inception of the project.

Over the period 214 local charities have participated ranging from Scout groups, Surf lifesaving, Ronald McDonald house, Historical societies, softball and football clubs, bush fire brigades to Neighbourhood Centres. Some organisations have been participating for up to 20 years and have made the raffle their main means of fundraising. Current Raffle organiser David Waterhouse commented "For instance, over the last 39 years, clubs such as 1st Kanwal Scout Group raised almost \$20,000, Wyong Family History Group \$37,300, the Berkeley Vale Rural Fire Service raised \$31,00 and the Special Olympics Central Coast Region raised about \$31,000, just to name a few."

Special thanks must go to James Sleeman and his staff from Sleeman Optometry at Chittaway Bay for the distribution and collection of tickets from their shop over many years. This is now done by club members in the foyer at Mingara.

In 2019 the captain of the local Rural Fire Service decided to buy all remaining tickets from books sold by

the members of the brigade. On the night of the draw, we were amazed when his name was on the first and second tickets drawn from the barrel!

During COVID, our club depended on the raffle as our major fundraiser raising approximately \$6,000 in 2020-21

Last year the club celebrated its



50th Anniversary. During the proceedings, long time Raffle Organiser Con Bartsos, was acknowledged with a Paul Harris Fellowship for the work he had done in keeping the raffle running over 26 years. This project is our most important annual activity.

The club is very grateful to our wonderful sponsors, who year after year provide at no cost to us the prizes for the Raffle. Mingara Recreational Club has been providing the cash prize, this year increased to \$4000. This year's other sponsors were Helloworld Travel Bateau Bay, Gem Design Jewellers, The Entrance, Ming Dragon Restaurant, Mingara and Bunnings Warehouse Tuggerah. All tickets have had a popular two for one McDonalds voucher on them thanks to Saronbell Pty Ltd. ... ❖

THE ROYAL FLYING DOCTOR SERVICE

The Royal Flying Doctor Service has a rich and vibrant Australian history.

Before there was the Flying Doctor there was little medical help for people who lived in places far from cities. If they were seriously injured they had to travel hundreds of kilometres by horse, cart, or camel to reach a doctor. They often died before they got there.



The Royal Flying Doctor Service History

On 17 May 1928, the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) was born, taking its first flight across the skies of Cloncurry, Queensland, on a life-saving mission. Since then, thousands, if not millions, of similar flights have taken place, supplying both emergency and primary health care to rural, remote, and regional areas of Australia where doctors are few and communications difficult.

The plan for this type of service was conceived in 1912 by the Reverend John Flynn, superintendent of the Australian Inland Mission (AIM) of the Presbyterian Church, who working in outback isolated regions, had witnessed the tragedies that could result in communities far from reliable medical care. Aided by fledging technologies in flight and radio, the organisation expanded rapidly from the 1930s with services and bases across the country, growing to be one of the largest and most comprehensive aeromedical organisations in the world today.

Twenty Dollar Note

In 1994 the Australian Council Office collaborated with the Reserve Bank of Australia on the design of the Australian twenty dollar note, to feature the face of the Reverend John Flynn. In 2019, the Reserve Bank has released a new twenty dollar note, once again featuring the origins of the Flying Doctor.

Want to learn more about the Flying Doctor's history? Take out a \$20 note.

The fabric bi-plane 'Victory' which flew the first Flying Doctor mission from Cloncurry, QLD on 17 May 1928.

The Australian \$20 note features the Rev John Flynn (1880-1951), founder of the Aerial Medical Service in 1942 and the Royal Flying Doctor Service in 1955.

A camel signifying the five camels Flynn purchased in 1913 so that his Patrol Paddres could complete their mission work throughout central Australia.

Beneath 'Victory' is the pedal radio invented by Alfred Traeger in 1929 enabling the people of the outback to call on the Flying Doctor for assistance.

The Body Chart was created by Sister Lucy Garlick in 1951 and is still used today. It enables patients to describe the region and intensity of their pain or injury during a remote telehealth consultation.

RINGING OF THE BELLS FOR THE KING AND QUEEN

Extract from: *The Good Shepherd*, October 2022, St Peters Church, Little Budworth (Cheshire)

“It is the tradition to ring church bells not only to call the faithful to church on Sundays but also to commemorate special occasions, particularly Royal ones.

“Sadly, our much-loved Queen Elizabeth II died on 8th September and so according to protocol we rang the bells on Friday 9th September. For this the bells were half muffled. The effect of this is to make every second-strike sound like an echo of the previous strike. It is a sorrowful and dignified sound which is used to commemorate the passing of a Royal person,

“The muffles are leather pads which are tied to the clappers of the bells (the clappers are the parts of the bell which hit the side of the bell inside and cause the sound of ringing). When muffles are put on, they cover one side of the clapper so that when that side hits the bell it is “muffled”. On 9th September we rang for 1 hour at noon with a mixture of ringing sounds (one bell after another) and tolling (when one bell is rung by itself, usually the tenor bell which is the biggest with the lowest note). This ringing was done by an exclusively Little Budworth band with no external help.

“After ring for her Majesty, we removed the muffles so that we could ring open” to celebrate the

accession of King Charles III. This we did on Saturday afternoon 10th September. The sound is much brighter when ringing open and is the same as ringing normal Sunday services.

“The muffles were put back on the bells and any ringing done before the State Funeral which took place on 19th September was done half muffled because the country was in a period of mourning. This included Friday evening practice. The bells were rung before the State funeral which took place in Westminster Abbey for one hour. This took place at churches across the country.

“So, this is how bell ringers honour our Royalty both at time of deep sadness and also rejoicing.”
