TROVE IN TROUBLE

Any researchers out there who have used trove to aid in their family history will be disturbed to hear it is suffering from lack of funds. An article in the *Sydney Morning Herald* by Linda Morris was published on the 21st December 2022 which states three key points:

The National Library of Australia is facing a \$13 million, or 21 per cent cut to its operating budget from July 2023.

Budget funding runs out then for Trove, the Library's online portal that provides millions of Australians access to newspapers, photographs, and records.

Internal report finds without dedicated and sustainable long-term funding Trove will cease to exist.

Without additional support it could cease to operate from July this year and this would be a great loss to the community. Currently it receives more that 22 million visits each year and our president Kay McDonald finds it an invaluable and interesting source for family research. Trove holds a significant number of digital records of newspapers going back to the earliest publications of the NSW colony to lose access to this would be a significant loss.

Change.org has a petition looking for signatures to submit to the government in the hope of persuading them to increase the funding to this valuable source of information. Anyone can add their name to this or can write to their local federal MP about this problem in the hope this worst-case scenario of closure does not occur. https://www.change.org/p/fully-fund-trove

1888 - THE NEW MAYOR OF YOUNG (N.S.W.) MR. G. A. CRANFIELD

From *Australian Town and Country Journal* (Sydney, NSW: 1870 – 1919) Saturday 10 Mar 1888, Pg 28. George Arthur Cranfield, the recently elected Mayor of Young, is an Englishman; he having been born in London on November 10, 1855. Mr. Cranfield reached this colony in 1874, under special engagement to Messrs, Barrett and Co., aerated water manufacturers, of Redfern, Sydney. In 1875 he arrived in Young, and shortly after began business as a baker and aerated water manufacturer. By his energy and perseverance Mr. Cranfield soon built up a good business. In a few years he disposed of his baking business, and started the famous crystal spring brewery, a venture which, in conjunction with the aerated water business, has been so successful that Mr. Cranfield contemplates shortly making improvements on a very large scale. Since his arrival in Young, Mr. Cranfield has always held a prominent position in connection with every movement calculated to in any way benefit the town or district.

He first came into prominence as a public man in the Young district as a member of the Progress Association-a body since defunct, but one which, in former years, played an important part in the public affairs of the town and district. He also identified himself with most of the public movements of the town. For years he held the position of honorary secretary of the School of Arts, and in that capacity displayed exceptional ability. Mr. Cranfield is also a great supporter of all kinds of outdoor sports, and has held the position of secretary of the Amateur Turf Club. He was also the founder, and is at present the vice-president, of the Poultry, Pigeon, and Canary Society, which has lately attained much success. Mr. Cranfield took a lively and active interest in getting the town incorporated, and at the first election was returned high up on the poll as one of the aldermen - a position which he has held ever since.

At the municipal election in 1884 Mr. Cranfield was returned at the head of the poll with the highest number of votes recorded for one candidate in this borough, viz., 298. Mr. Cranfield is now the only member of the original council at present holding a seat in the council.

During the time Mr. Cranfield has been in the council he has advocated progressive measures. He brought forward and carried a motion in favour of tree planting. This is undoubtedly one of the most useful and ornamental works the council has undertaken. Mr. Cranfield was unanimously elected to the mayoral chair on February 10. He is not what one would call a brilliant orator, but he has plenty of common sense, and is endowed with an originality peculiarly his own. There is no doubt that under the presidency of Mr. Cranfield the interests of the ratepayers will be properly looked after. He is known to be a strong advocate for lighting the town with either gas or electricity. In politics Mr. Cranfield is a strong supporter of freetrade, and at present holds the position of secretary to the local branch of the Freetrade Society. He is energetic and is possessed of a great amount of business tact; and the aldermen may be congratulated on having selected the best man available for the position of Mayor.

*A new restaurant, wine bar and providore shop called 'The Cranfield' opened in Zouch Street Young in December 2022 honouring George Cranfield, who was the mayor the year the building was completed in 1888. The building was built for Burrangong Lodge of St John, who boasted having 'the most handsome and commodious building out of Sydney devoted exclusively to Masonic purposes'. A portion of the site was donated by Samuel Tout of Calabash with the remainder being purchased from the government for 200 pounds. The building was designed by W. Sharp and built by Millard and Turnrock as a cost of 1200 pounds. It remained as the Masonic Hall for over 100 years until it was purchased by locals in November 2000, and became Zouch Restaurant opening in April 2001. More recently the building became Mullino's Restaurant trading to about 2016, and was then purchased by a new owner in 2022.

BILLS TROUGHS - A Forgotten Memento to a Bygone Era

Bills Troughs are in several towns in New South Wales and Victoria.

Do any members have a connection to the Bills family and these old water troughs?

Would your ancestors have watered their horses in one of these troughs?

George Bills was born in Brighton in England in 1859. He migrated with his family to New Zealand and subsequently to Echuca, Victoria in 1873. He met and married Annis Swann who had immigrated from Sheffield in England. They moved to Sydney in 1884. In 1908 George retired to Hawthorn, Victoria and in 1910 Annis died while the couple were visiting England. George became a Life Governor of the RSPCA in 1924. Bills horse troughs are watering troughs that were manufactured in Australia and installed to provide relief for working horses in the first half of the twentieth century. The troughs were financed by a trust fund established through the Will of George Bills. A total of 700 troughs were distributed by the trust in Australia and 50 in several other countries.

From 'Aussie Towns' Facebook page:

It is easy to forget that, before the advent of the combustion engine and the motor vehicle, most transportation was by horse. When I was writing the entry on Bacchus Marsh in Victoria I noticed that a Bills Horse Trough was listed on the local Heritage Trail. What a strange thing? What a strange story? Researching further I found a wonderful site dedicated to the Bills Horse Troughs which reminded me (and I can still remember them from my childhood) of "the trades men with their horse and carts stopping at the trough to give their horses a well-earned drink, as they were delivering goods to homes, such as Ice, Bread, Milk, Wood and briquettes, most of these goods were delivered by horse and cart, even the old Bottle O who bought empty bottles to be recycled, plus many other people who were still using a horse and gig as a means of transport. On a hot day these cart horses could drink up to 60 litres plus of water a day."

I knew about the Bills Horse Troughs but not the details. George Bills, born in Brighton, England, in 1859, emigrated to Australia and established a wire mattress business (now there is something you don't see today – thank God!) and when he died in 1927 "after providing many personal bequests, George directed the income from the residue of his estate to be used to provide drinking troughs for horses, and other animals he said it was in preventing cruelty, and alleviating the sufferings of animals in any country. "He wanted no animals to go thirsty. There were probably more than 500 troughs made and erected in Australia mostly first in Victoria then in New South Wales and, and others were funded in overseas countries England, Ireland, Switzerland (for donkeys) and Japan. In the early stages of trough supply, each was individually designed and constructed.

"One of the first was a granite Memorial trough, hewn in one piece as a memorial to George Bills. It was situated in Barton Street, Hawthorn, Melbourne; the trough has long since been removed. Later a standard design from a mould made at the Rolca Concrete Company was used and many hundreds of these troughs were supplied throughout Victoria and New South Wales.

The troughs were supplied free of charge after an application to the Bills Trust by local councils. Truckloads of 10 would often leave the Rocla Factory for installation in country towns. Most of the troughs were made and supplied in the mid-1930s in Victoria."
