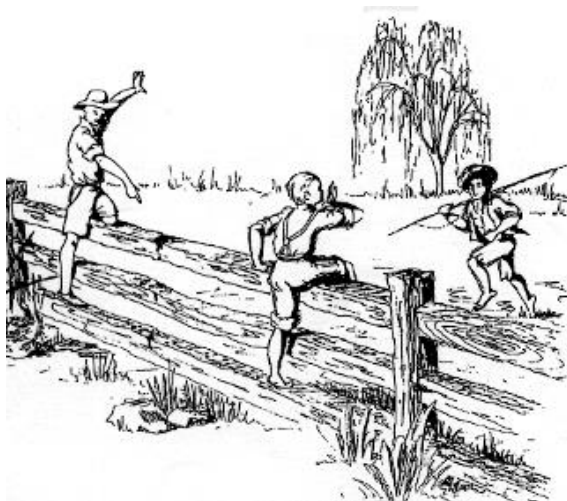

It's a long way from Tipperary

This is my story about searching for family history in County Tipperary, Ireland. I was following the Davis family who had come to Australia to settle. Of the 16 children some went to USA but eight came to Australia and the rest stayed in Ireland. They lived near the area known as Modreeny and the Modreeny Church was where they had attended, and many were buried, so this was where I intended to go.

The nearest I could find accommodation was the town of Nenagh. I had only two days to achieve my goal. I spent the first part of the time at the library looking for information. I found it was going to be difficult to get to the church as public transport was difficult. The only way I found to get there was to catch the train towards Dublin and alight at Cloughjordan and then walk the two miles to the church. I had only an hour and a half before I had to get the last train back to Nenagh. I could just do it!



The problem was that when I got to Cloughjordan, the station was a long walk from the village – I wouldn't have time. So I walked to the village anyway and went to the library. After talking to the librarian and telling her my sad story she said - My husband will take you. She went to the phone, rang him and soon he was across the road, and we were on our way. All the way there he (a retired policeman) told me about the history of the area. At the church he waited while I got my photos. The headstones could not be read as they were covered in moss. Then we were on our way back to the station and I caught my train. Later I received contact with a local who supplied me

with family history of the Davis family. That Christmas I received a card from Marie Brady and her husband that featured the Modreeny Church with snow falling all around.

My Irish ancestor: well, one of them – by Sharon Greene

There are several Irish ancestors in my family tree and I have chosen one person that had a long and difficult life however it was a very full one. I'd like to tell you a little of her story: from a difficult beginning, and a long and arduous journey to a new country, where she was given some wonderful opportunities that combined with her commitment for hard work, saw her live a long and purposeful life, tinged with a little sadness.

Margaret LEGASS was born in Wicklow, Ireland, c1807 to protestant parents and sadly due to the harsh times in Ireland, found Margaret, at a very young age living in a church orphanage [or foundling hospital], indeed it may have been her saving grace as she learnt to read and write and the skill to become a needlewoman. By 1832 Margaret would be aboard the ship, the *Red Rover*, with over two hundred single women sailing to Australia as very early 'assisted immigrants'. These women were referred to 'whores and prostitutes', in the press of the day, (the term 'Red Rover' would become a derogatory term about women of loose morals) when in fact they were just poor girls and women, that would become the backbone of our early community by becoming wives and mothers.

Margaret is listed as a needleworker on the shipping list and this would be her path throughout her future life. When she arrived in Sydney she was received employment with Captain Edmund Cliffe and his wife, Jane (nee Forbes) at a wage of ten pounds per year. There's a family story the Margaret was one of the seamstresses that helped make the 'white flannels' for an early Australian cricket team that sailed to England. [I

have been unable to confirm this fact].

Cliffe was a successful businessman and sailor, living in Chowder Bay (Mosman) and had called his estate 'Cliffeton' (this area would later be known as Clifton Gardens) on the shores of Sydney Harbour. Within a month of Margaret's arrival, Mrs Cliffe died in childbirth and was buried with her stillborn baby. Cliffe returned to the sea aboard his whaling ship, chasing sperm whales in the Southern Seas. Cliffe married a second time in May 1835 to Julia Talbot. He purchased extensive properties over the next two years throughout the Riverina and (later) Canberra areas. Cliffe suddenly passed away in November 1837 aged only 40: leaving extensive lands and property to his new wife, who in turn remarried eight months later in July 1838, to Kenneth McKenzie, a surgeon from Edinburgh, living in the Shoalhaven area. [Life could certainly be brief!]

On 15th December 1834 Margaret Legass marries John Christopher COFFEY at Sutton's Forrest, in the Church of England chapel at Bong, Bong. Margaret is recorded as 24 yrs and John as 35 yrs. John born in Currans, Kerry, Ireland, c1796 was only 10 years old when he joined the British Army following the death of his father. By the time of his marriage he was an ex-soldier from the British Army and ex-mounted policeman from NSW. What or how they both came to be in this area to meet and marry is unknown however by the time their first child was born a year later, they were living in Parramatta and would remain in the Sydney area for the rest of their lives.

Margaret's first child was Cornelius Ambrose born in late 1835, then Cecilia Jemima Agnes born in 1838, with John Henry arriving in 1841, then George Arthur Francis in 1844 and finally Silvester Augustus in 1848.

John worked as a labourer and Margaret probably as a seamstress working from home. John died in November 1861 following a long illness. The following year both Cornelius and Cecilia were married and had left home. Her three younger sons John, Arthur and Silvester had also left home due to the harsh treatment from their father and she was never to know what became of them.

Margaret continued her work as a needlewoman and was recorded as such in the Sands Directories of Sydney, living in various locations of the city, for the editions in 1864, 1865 and 1887.

Sadly, her only daughter Cecilia died in 1875 and Margaret assisted in the care of Cecilia's two surviving daughters, Hannah and Amy. In her later years Margaret went to live in the Newington Asylum (State Hospital of the Infirm and Destitute for Women, at Lidcombe and this was the former estate of the explorer John Blaxland).

On the 30th August 1906, Margaret passed away, at either 90 years of age (as recorded on her death certificate), at 94 years as recorded in the newspaper by her beloved grand-daughter, Hannah or 99 years by all the other forms of documentation. It was also noted that Margaret was very deaf and almost blind - at 99 it's not surprising. She is buried in Rookwood cemetery.

Hannah's final words to her beloved grandmother in the newspaper read: *Sleep on, beloved, sleep, and take thy rest...*

The Sea-Faring Irish Kearon Family

My husband's Grandfather Edward Kearon was born in Arklow, County Wicklow Ireland in 1881. An Irish sailor, Edward was born into a maritime family.

In recent years we visited Ireland and were excited to be shown by distant cousins the house where Grandfather Edward was born. We were taken to the Arklow Harbour where generations of Kearons had ships built that they sailed for over 200 years.

The 1911 British Census showed Edward Kearon was living at Dublin's South Dock, aged 30 years. 12 years later we have the birth certificate of his daughter in Sydney, NSW. What happened to him in those interim 12 years? We believe

he travelled the world working on ships and having adventures, ending in NSW.

Sadly many Kearon men were lost at sea. Some had their ships torpedoed during war, killing all on board. During one of his voyages we think Edward jumped ship in Sydney after meeting his future wife Mary Ann. Investigating NSW BDM records revealed that he and his sweetheart weren't married until 1931, at St Phillips Church, Sydney. Mary Anne Barrie (born Reincke) was a deserted mother of 2 small boys at the time. Her first husband had vanished and she was in difficult circumstances. It took 7 years before Mr Barrie could legally be declared deceased; so that she and Edward could marry, finally. In 1951 Edward died at home aged 70. Edward had worked on coastal ships from Sydney and they had raised 2 daughters who married sailors during WW2. Grace to a British sailor on leave, and Olga Jean to a U.S. naval officer, sailing the NSW coast.

Edward's father in Ireland was John Kearon; 1852-1917. Also born in Arklow, John was one of 8 brothers who were all Master Mariners. The brothers were: - Richard Kearon (1836-1918), George (1839-1914), Edward (1842-1867), Robert (1844-1932), Thomas (1850-1900), John Joseph (1852-1917) and William (1856-1944).

Their father was also a ship's captain. He was another Edward Kearon, born in Arklow in 1808 and who died there in 1878, aged 70, we discovered.

His Father was Captain Richard Kearon (1767-1832). Richard was another generation of Irish sea captains who was born in Arklow, Ireland. However, we were a little surprised to read that his christening was registered in London, England at St Leonards, Shoreditch. Baby Richard's parents were recorded as Patrick and Margaret Kearon. As Shoreditch is close to the River Thames and Canary Wharf, it's possible that his father Patrick had taken his wife and sone on his ship to London for a Church of England baptism. This would make at least 5 generations of brave Irish mariners in the Kearon family, all Anglican persuasion. These days Edward Karon's descendants only go down to the sea in ships with the aim of a cruising holiday or a fishing expedition.

(Circa 1740) Patrick Kearon → Richard → Edward → John → Edward Kearon (1951).

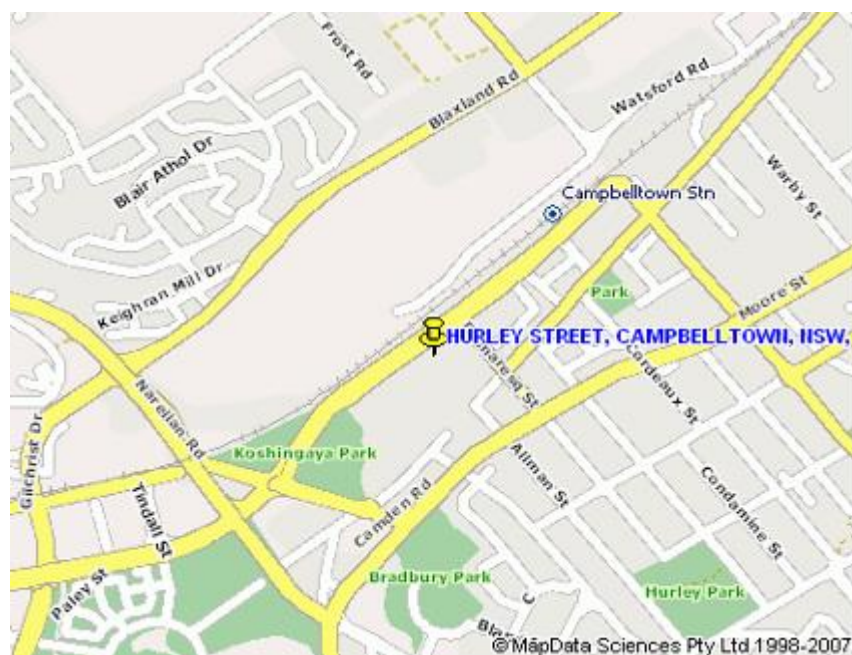
