COMMUNITY ACTIVIST, COMMUNIST & A FOUNDER OF THE MINER'S WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

It has been many, many years since women were banned from working in the coal mines!

However women have never abandoned their contribution to the coal mining industry and their support for their menfolk and their community. Just as the miners themselves supported each other in times of strife, so too did the women support each other and the men.

The Lockout of 1929 was a time of great distress for the coal miners on the Northern field. No employment! Families struggling to survive. Many miners moved to places like Lake Macquarie and Port Stephens, where they built humpy like dwellings and at least were able to fish for food.

Gloria McDONALD – That Hidden Decade in the book Beneath the Valley states "Rough shacks, tents and humpies sprang up and fish became the main diet" and then again she states "Our humpy, where we lived for the next six years, was right beside Nelson Bay beach, It was an old canvas tent overbuilt with brush timber and bark."

Grace SCANLON (Nee BARRETT) was twenty six years old and had been married for only two years at the time of the Lockout.

Her new husband Henry SCANLON was a coalminer. Grace's father James Peary BARRETT was a coalminer and an activist, so naturally Grace would and did become involved with the plight of coal miners and their families, but not before she witnessed the injustice first hand.

The 1929 strike and Lockout resulted in the Rothbury Riot and the presence of the police (known as "basher gangs"). Whilst picketing the local shops to prevent sales to the police, Grace and a friend were harassed by the police.

The fact that Henry SCANLON was prominent within the movement naturally made him a target for the police.

It was around this time that Grace became a Communist (she joined the CPA – Communist party of Australia - in the 1930s) and became one of the founders of the women's auxiliaries. In 1938 she helped establish the Cessnock auxiliary. By corresponding with the Welsh mining women in the Rhondda Valley she helped them establish their own women's Auxiliary.

In 1939 a delegation of women, Grace among them addressed the Miner's Federation Central council asking for recognition for auxiliaries as a constituent part of the union. They were successful in their endeavour.

Grace along with other women began actively taking part in the disputes and struggles of the miners. How? You may ask yourself. The women's auxiliary worked with the Miner's

Federation, taking part in the demonstrations. During lockouts and strikes the women's auxiliary provided meals and soup kitchens for miners and their families.

After some initial objections, especially from the older miners the women began to play a significant part by supporting the men and the mining families. The auxiliaries where not only for the miner's wives, their constitution embraced any women on the coalfields. The auxiliaries became a fighting force for social and economic reforms.

Grace and other members of the women's auxiliaries set up a District Council of auxiliaries in October 1938 at a conference in Newcastle. Representatives from Cessnock, Kurri , Bellbird, Swansea, Belmont, West Wallsend, Dudley, Boolaroo, Abermain, Weston and Stanford Merthyr attended. Mrs TEERMAN as President, Grace SCANLON as Secretary and Mrs LONSDALE as Treasurer. At this meeting discussions were held regarding the formation of a National organization, thus uniting the different states.

A National organization was formed with Mrs TEERMAN president and Irene ORR as secretary. The first meeting was held in 1940 in Sydney.

Grace Irene BARRETT was born in Minmi on 6 January 1903 to coalminer and unionist James Peary BARRETT and Elizabeth Harriett PETERSEN. She married Henry SCANLON, coalminer and unionist in 1927. She died 12 August 2003 (age 100), leaving an insurmountable legacy for women of future generations to learn from. Amongst her many achievements were:

- 1930s joined the Communist Party of Australia and remained a member until the late 1960s. Along with fellow members, Ethel TEERMAN and Nellie SIMM was instrumental in campaigning for women's auxiliaries in the Miners Federation.
- She was co-founder of Cessnock, Bellbird and Aberdare auxiliaries and the District Council in 1938. She was active in the 1938 and 1940 coal strikes.
- 4 1939 part of the successful delegation that addressed the Miner's Federation Central Council to become a consistent part of the union.
- 1940 Elected Northern District President
- 1942 Elected National Secretary.
- 🧸 Auxiliary delegate to Newcastle Trades Hall Council.
- 🧸 1943 organised international affiliation with Welch Miner's Women's Federation.
- Conducted radio talks during WWII
- 1949 Active involvement in strike
- Member National Committee of the Union of Australian Women.
- Committee member of East Cessnock bowling club Women's Auxiliary.
- 1950s opposed local government rate increases
- 1957 Involved in Pensioner's Association demonstrations
- Assisted in Bellbird Strike and lockout.
- 1950s delegate to Cessnock Mineworker's Area Committee.
- 1957 Actively involved during Aberdare sstay in strike
- 1928 Secretary of the Cessnock Workers International Relief Committee .
- 1920s Coal lockout elected Secretary of the Cessnock Unemployed women's Committee.

Through her involvement with the women's auxiliaries Grace was able to assist the Crippled and spastic children, Cessnock Maternity hospital, Cessnock aged women's home and pre-school kindergarten committee.

She was also involved in the Joint Committee of Housewives, Cessnock and Newcastle co-operative guilds, May Day committees, Anti-tuberculosis committee, Newcastle Kindergarten Union, the peace movement and flood relief.

The Northern District Miners Women;s Auxiliary was instrumental in the establishment of the ROTHBURY RIOT MEMORIAL located at North Rothbury NSW. The dedication took place on the 16 December 1989 and celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of the Rothbury riot where miner Norman BROWN lost his life and many more miners were injured. They were also instrumental in the establishment of the original memorial commemorating the sixty seventh anniversary of the Bellbird Mine Disaster

THE JIM COMERFORD MEMORIAL WALL

The Jim COMERFORD memorial wall, situated on the site of the United Miner Workers Federation Office on Aberdare Road, Aberdare was commissioned to honour miners, both men and boys who were killed or died of mine related injuries in the Northern District and Hunter coalmines. The wall was constructed with the assistance of the Mineworker's Trust. The wall was so named as a tribute to Jim COMERFORD, who was one of the most respected members of the coal mining Union. (Jim passed away on 3 November 2006). He took part in the Rothbury riot, was a long time member of the Miner's Federation and was passionate about the mining history of the area He wrote books to preserve the history and heritage of the mining industry. The dedication was carried out on Saturdy10 February 1996 by Paul KEATING, who was Prime Minister at the time. The wall was constructed at a cost of \$160,000. The youngest miner honoured on the wall was 11 year old Robert IRVING, who was killed at the Co-Operative Colliery, Plattsburgh on 16 February 1883. The oldest is Frederick Charles ROOSE, aged 73, who was killed at the Waratah Colliery.

The inscription on the front of the wall reads:

"Remember Before God the Men and Boys who Gave Their Lives in the Northern District Mines."

As at the 10 September 2023 there were 1793 names on the wall,



TREVOR MILGATE ESM OAM CESSNOCK CITY HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

Trevor was born in Kurri Kurri on 17 December 1946 and lived his whole life in the Cessnock Local government Area.

Trevor attended Abermain Public School and Kurri Kurri High School, he gained employment at Kurri Kurri store and worked in the heavy industries at Newcastle until he was successful in obtaining a position with Cessnock City Council as a ranger which he held for 25 years.

Trevor first joined the RFS and the SES units in 1976, he was appointed the positions of Captain, this have him the opportunity of attending a course in Leadership at Mt Macedon VIC. The experience he obtained gave him the skills required in leadership and training to establish the Rescue Squad in Cessnock.

Following in 1988, Trevor became a foundation member of the squad for his dedicated Volunteer service to the community of Cessnock.

During his time Trevor was appointed as an SES Deputy Local Controller and then onto SES Local Controller in 1994, also with the NSW VRA he was appointed in 1992 as the Hunter Region Co-ordinator for the squads of Cessnock, Central Coast, Merriwa, Taree, Bulahdelah and Murrurundi, in 1996 implemented the SES Flood Plan for Cessnock. With the Cessnock Rescue Squad, Trevor has witnessed many incidents and accidents that some of us could never imagine, apart from attending 100's of car crashes and most with great outcomes than others, thanks to the expertise of the Rescue members through training programs.


Trevor got great satisfaction in helping elderly owners in retrieving and rescuing their cast or dog or having a tarp over the roof of their homes.

Trevor was instrumental in the following incidents: 1985 Hail storm; 1986 Search for missing plane at Barrington Tops; 1989 Flooding responses; 1989 Newcastle Earthquake; 2014 Ellalong Earthquake; 1997 Thredbo disaster; 3004 Storm incidents; 1994 Bush Fires; 2002 Abernethy Bush Fires and many other Flooding and storm events throughout Cessnock and surrounds
