## George DOWDEN

George DOWDEN (a) married Bridget KERWIN 17<sup>th</sup> February 1857

### DOWDEN - George c.1820 – 1875

. (From "Stories Behind the Tombstones" John Rossiter)

George **Dowden** was born in Berkshire, England, c.1820; came to Australia on the 'Argo' in 1854 destined for Adelaide, and soon moved on to Ipswich. He married Bridget **Kerwin** at St Mary's, Ipswich on 17<sup>th</sup> February, 1857 with Rev William **McGinty** officiating. They had a family of ten children.

He was one of the earliest, if not the earliest, cabinet maker in Ipswich. His advertisement in the Moreton Bay Courier on 22<sup>nd</sup> December, 1855, advised the public that he had set up business in Brisbane Street, Ipswich, as a cabinet, chair and sofa maker, and upholsterer.

Furniture specimens produced by George **Dowden**, are today highly sought after as items of special interest from this early period. A couple of these examples of his craftsmanship may be seen at the Ipswich Art Gallery.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> June, 1857, he announced in the North Australian that he had expanded his business by adding an undertaking business for which he had furnished himself with a very neat hearse, to give to the naturally solemn funeral ceremony a spirit of Christian-like respect and regret. Prior to this, bodies were taken to the cemetery in the back of a firewood cart. This announcement heralded some refinement into the solemn burial service for the dead.

George **Dowden's** business was located in a single-storied wooden building on the corner of Brisbane and Ellenborough Streets, but as the business grew he had to seek larger premises. His original site was where in 1887, the new Queensland Times building, designed by the local architect Samuel Shenton, was erected.

On 31<sup>st</sup> December, 1875, while conducting the funeral of John **Drysdale**, the proprietor of the Royal Mail Hotel at Goodna, he became alarmingly ill and

had to stop at Ebbw Vale, at the house known as Ross's old hotel, for a drink of water. The weather at the time had been extremely hot for several days. He was unable to resume his seat on the hearse and was rushed back to Ipswich by Mr John **Carroll** of Redbank Plains. On the way he lapsed into a delirious state and it was with difficulty that he was kept in the buggy. Doctors **Kennedy** and **Rowlands** were called in but he died within an hour from the time he was seized with the illness. The doctor's report stated that death was from apoplexy induced by the extremely hot weather. He was 52 years of age and left behind a wife and eight children; Two other children having died in infancy

## OUR ABSURD FUNERAL CUSTOMS

The absurdity of our funeral customs received a very painful illustration a few days ago. Mr. George **Dowden**, of Ipswich, was conducting the funeral of Mr. **Drysdale**, of Goodna, and as the cortege was en route to the cemetery Mr. **Dowden** was taken suddenly ill, and after procuring a drink of water, was unable to resume his seat. Mr. John **Carroll** undertook to drive Mr. **Dowden** home in a buggy. Before reaching home he became delirious, and in spite of medical attention died within an hour from the commencement of the attack. The symptoms were those of apoplexy induced by the extreme heat of the weather.

The question arises: — How far were the professional # habiliments responsible for the illness? Black is a powerful absorbent of heat, and undertakers unwisely adhere to the customs of the Antipodes. It is more than ridiculous, it is dangerous, in such weather as we have lately had, to sit on the box of a hearse or coach for several hours with the head covered by a black silk hat wrapped round with a heavy black silk band. Let us be courageous enough to adapt ourselves to circumstances, and discard a style of funeral and memorial clothing wholly unsuited to the climate. # Clothes

## DEATH OF MR DOWDEN (b)

The death occurred on Saturday night last, of Mr. George **Dowden**, a native of Ipswich, who, for many years past, conducted an undertaking business in Brisbane-street. He had been ailing for about a couple of years, the final cause of death being chronic bronchitis.

Mr. **Dowden** was born at the corner of Brisbane and Ellenborough Streets, where the "Queensland Times" Building now stands, his father having conducted the business of an undertaker in premises, then situated on this site. Deceased, who was well known and highly esteemed

throughout West Moreton, leaves a widow, one son, and one daughter.

The funeral on Sunday last was very largely attended, the members of the Hibernian Australasian Catholic Benefit Society marching in front of the hearse in procession.

The ceremony at the graveside was conducted by the Rev. W. **Cashman** of St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church.



“If at first you don’t succeed, try – try – try – again ----and again ---- and again.”

Remember that no one person knows all the answers. This is why being a member of a society such as ours, it opens up the field to learn from each other. We each have an area where we have operated and the best knowledge probably comes from practical experience.

If, on your first visit to our society or other research areas, you go away disheartened by not finding the answers you had hoped for, go back again on a different day and you will probably meet a different assistant who may have knowledge in that field. Some of us have skills in computer operations. You may find a member who has done research into German families – someone who excels in Scottish information – someone who negotiates census records – or someone who knows the local area. You will find somebody who will be of assistance. Remember that **all brick walls** are able to be broken, but it often takes considerable time and effort.

It is surprising just what information can come out during a chat over a cuppa.

Bounce off one another and you too will gain from the experience.


Beware! Not all of the information you may find on some on-line resources is 100% accurate. Use this as a guide and check it out for yourself to assure yourself that it does apply to what you are researching. Sometimes, you will need to purchase birth, death or marriage certificates. Yes, they can be costly, but if you want accuracy they can be important. With death certificates, some of the information can be questionable as the person who would best know the correct information is the one who was buried. You may find on some certificates where corrections have been made in a side column many years later. These can include items such as spelling, ages, parents’ names or even a name changed by deed pole. These adjustments can be quite enlightening and provide the answer to that long-held question.

## F.E. BARBAT & SONS Manufactures of North Ipswich

*History of Queensland It's People & Industries Vol 1 (page 499)*

Felix **Barbat** was born in France c1820 and came to Australia as a 30 year old in the 1850's. He was a sawmiller and general contractor, and established a carrying business between Melbourne and the Ballarat and Bendigo goldfields before opening a number of general stores in the scattered towns of the state. (*Felix died in Victoria in 1889 aged 70*)

Eldest son Felix Edward **Barbat** was born in Maryborough Victoria 7<sup>th</sup> November 1858. He had very little schooling and at 17 years of age began work with contractors Miller & Sons working on the Port Augusta to Charlotte Springs railway for 4 years, then later as assistant engineer. Felix Edward moved to Sydney and set up as an architect and one of his buildings was the Randwick Hotel. For a number of years he was a general builder and contractor working on Circular Quay, the Petersham Viaduct and a number of railway stations.

After a failed gold mining venture at Temora, Felix E. went to the Western Australian Lake Way district and the timber industry. The next move was to Ipswich and working on the steel construction of the Railway Workshops at North Ipswich.

In the 1870's an engineering company had been started in Ipswich by F.G. **Springall** and J. **Frost** as iron and brass foundry and bolt manufacturers, and later became the Phoenix Engineering Company. When the company was put up for sale about 1900, Felix E. bought it and he, and his seven sons had at one time up to 120 employees working on two shifts.

Felix E. was very involved in community affairs, stood unsuccessfully for a seat in Parliament, was a J.P., and on the Committee of Pastoral and Agricultural Society, and for three years was president. He was one of the founding members of the Ipswich Chamber of Commerce, and was also one of those who founded the Ipswich and West Moreton Mutual Accident Insurance Company, and was chairman until it was wound up.

In 1883 Felix E. married Maria/Myra, the daughter of John **Carr** from Ireland and they had four sons. After the death of Maria, he married Cecilia, daughter of Pierce **Blanchfield** in 1892, there were three sons born to the couple. Both marriages were in Victoria.

**Mr. F.E. Barbat** - A wide circle of professional and personal friends will learn with sincere regret of the death of Mr. F. E. **Barbat**, at Hongkong, on November 23, news

of which has been received by cablegram. The late Mr. **Barbat**, who was 74 years of age, left for the East some time ago on a health trip, which, unfortunately, did not prove successful, and one of his sons left Mackay for Hong Kong recently for the purpose of returning to Australia with his father. The deceased gentleman was formerly managing director of F. E. **Barbat** and Sons Ltd., of Ipswich. He carried out engineering contracts at Tully River Sugar Mill and at the Power Alcohol works at Sarina, and he had resided in the Sarina district of late years, supervising the work at the plant. A large employer of labour, he was widely known in Queensland, and his ability as an engineer and his fine personality earned him a host of friends both in and out of the business. He is survived by six sons.

Mr. Arthur **Barbat**, who had been on active service at the front, had died on the 16th instant from a gun-shot wound. The deceased is a son of Mr. F. E. **Barbat**, of the firm of F. E. **Barbat** and Sons, foundry proprietors of North Ipswich. The Mayor communicated the information to the Rev Father **Lane**, of St Mary's Roman Catholic Church, who proceeded to the house and broke the sad news to Mrs. **Barbat**. The deepest sympathy will be felt for the members of the bereaved family. The message received by the Mayor requested him to express to the parents of the deceased the sympathy of their Majesties the King and Queen and the members of the Federal Government in their bereavement.

### IPSWICH AND WEST MORETON EMPLOYERS MUTUAL ACCIDENT INSURANCE COMPANY LIMITED

#### ACCIDENT INSURANCE

The prospectus for the Ipswich & West Moreton Employers Mutual Accident Insurance company Limited appeared in March 1906. Provincial directors were to be Messrs F **Barbat**, J **Bottomley**, F **Goleby**, Oliver **Perry**, H **Pommer**, W **Tunstall** jnr and J **Wigfull**. This company was to be formed for the purpose of providing the employers of Ipswich and West Moreton with facilities for insuring liabilities that may incur under the employees Liability Act of 1886 - The factories and Shops Act of 1900 and the workers Compensation Act of 1905.

**INSURANCE COMPANY'S OFFICE.** We have been requested to state, in connection with the Ipswich and West Moreton Employers' Mutual Accident insurance Company, Limited, that offices have been taken in Brisbane-street, a few doors past the Queensland Times' Buildings, where the secretary will be in attendance to effect insurances and give all necessary information.

**IPSWICH AND W.M. INSURANCE COMPANY** An extraordinary general meeting of the Ipswich and West Moreton Mutual Insurance Company, Limited, was held in the rooms of the secretary (Mr. G. W. **Allen**), Bell-street, last night. In the absence of Mr. F E. **Barbat** (chairman of directors), Mr. J. P. **Bottomley** presided. He moved "That this company be wound up voluntarily under the provisions, of the Companies Act. "This was seconded by Mr. T. **Dangerfield**, and carried. The directors -Messrs. **Barbat**, **Bottomley**, and **Dangerfield** were appointed as liquidators for winding up the company.

## OF LOCAL INTEREST

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT] Great excitement was caused here on the 24th December last, by the receiving-officer refusing to deliver the mail, because, as he stated, the Postmaster-General had changed the name of the district from \*\* One-eye Waterhole. In consequence of this shameful proceeding on the part of the receiving-officer, the inhabitants of this locality were deprived of their usual letters and newspapers from the 17th December to the 1st January, on which date the mail was delivered by Mr John Campbell, the Postmaster-General having marked his disapproval of Mr Nelson's conduct by dismissing him, and appointing Mr Campbell in his place.

Mr Nelson ought to be thankful to the postal authorities for acting so leniently towards him, as he rendered himself liable to a heavy fine. This ought to be a warning to receiving-officers in general, not to allow their petty jealousy and spite to interfere with their public duty. Mr Campbell's residence is not more than ten minutes' walk from the Primary School and is convenient to the whole neighbourhood having a road front and back, and cross roads within a short distance on either side.

Unfortunately for this district, there are a few who seem determined to oppose everything brought forward for the benefit of the inhabitants in general, unless they themselves derive some special benefit by the same. It is no doubt in the remembrance of most of your readers that a public meeting was held at the residence of Mr W. Alcorn, on the 13th of October last, for the purpose of taking steps towards the erection of a place of worship in this neighbour-hood. At that meeting it was stated by the chairman-the Rev. D. Mossop, that the only land available for building a Congregational Church upon was Mr John Campbell's, and as Mr Campbell kindly offered one acre for that purpose, it was resolved by a large majority of the congregation that Mr Campbell's offer be accepted, and that the church be built upon the said piece of land.

A committee was appointed to carry out the object of the meeting, and collectors chosen to canvass the several districts for contributions in aid of the same. Another meeting was held on the 13th of November to report progress. In the meantime Mr Campbell transferred the acre of land to the Congregational Union of Queensland. At this second meeting some objections were made to the proposed site for the church, although it had been previously confirmed and carried by a majority at the first meeting. Mr Baines, the chairman, was most certainly out of order in bringing the subject a second time before the committee, and as the secretary persisted in adhering to the original resolutions, the meeting was adjourned to the 11th of December. At this third meeting the malcontents mustered in force, and brought with them some half-dozen more, most of whom were

strangers to the congregation - men who have never given one farthing towards the erection of the church, nor towards the support of either the minister or Sabbath school.

These they get appointed committee-men, and then carried a resolution to the fact that the church be built on the Government Reserve - a distance of one mile and a half from the original site: a spot nevertheless very convenient to the Cameron Flatites. Not content with having obtained ten acres for a school, they must now have ten acres more for a church. Surely the Minister for Lands will not perpetrate so gross an injustice on the poor scrub farmers, who are struggling so manfully to gain an honest livelihood, and who have only this small reserve of thirty acres whereon to graze their horses and cattle. Again, this reserve is the only camping ground for a considerable distance on the Dugandan and Coochin road, and for this reason alone ought to be kept entire. If the Government would grant as an additional reserve the dummied selection adjoining it, they would confer a great boon on the inhabitants of this district.

The early crop of maize is not looking so well as it was a short time ago; it needed rain very much, and I am afraid it is too far gone for rain to be of much benefit to it now. We had a heavy downpour on Saturday evening, and a steady rain Sunday evening, which lasted for about three hours. The cereal crops have turned out splendidly, and I believe they will yet prove to be the best paying crops that can be grown in this district ; the average yield this season is wheat fifty, oats sixty, and barley forty bushels to the acre. This is not so bad for Queensland. I send you samples of the above, which I feel confident will bear comparison with any grown in the colony. Messrs J. Campbell and J. G. Maddox have grown wheat, oats, and barley on the same land for three years successively, and have always had a good return.

Christmas is now over with us, and I suppose, Mr Editor, it is with you too. Anyhow, what with social gatherings, picnics, &. it glided pleasantly enough by. May the year 1876 be one of continual prosperity, and may you, dear sir, be long spared to us, for you have ever been on the side of truth and justice.

## **CHINESE MARKET GARDEN**

There used to be a Chinese market garden in Cyprus Street opposite the junction of Liverpool Street in North Ipswich in the 1930's/40's. The operator was known to everyone as "Georgie Song". He had good alluvial soil and a string of water holes ensuring a constant supply of fresh water. A small shack was erected on site in which he lived and stored everything. He started with a hoe and fork to till the soil and carried the water in two buckets attached to a yoke placed across his shoulders in the traditional Chinese way. When he reached the area to be watered, the buckets were lowered to the ground by bending his knees and the water was tipped into a watering can to spray over the vegetables. These buckets of water were heavy and involved considerable effort going up and down the rows. The ground was divided into drains and pathways to make his access easier.

Early in the morning he'd be up picking and preparing his produce for sale, which was taken to town with his horse and cart. A long, thin, sharp knife was attached to his belt. This was used to cut the lettuce, cabbage and other similar vegies off at ground level. All off cuts were recycled through the compost pile to be reused as mulch. A story circulated that the night-soil man didn't need to call as this was also used as fertilizer. However, someone who knew Georgie very well, strongly refuted this as purely a myth. This young friend to Georgie said that he used to help Georgie with planting the seedlings and had a good working knowledge of his operations. He stressed that this story was totally incorrect.

As Georgie became more financial the horse and cart was replaced by a small blue ute. With the help of his friends in the area a small petrol driven pump was set up near one of the water holes and the buckets on the yoke across his shoulders were replaced with an irrigation system. A petrol driven rotary hoe was also added to his work shed. This item was sometimes a worry to Georgie as it used to get away on him. He was probably happy with his conventional system of tilling the soil. Those who visited his garden to purchase his fresh vegies, have all commented on how crisp and tasty everything was. One of his customers recalled how he always called the turnips "turnie-ups" and the lettuce was "lettis-ee" - hence, "TURNIE-UP and LETTIS-EE". He was described as being good hearted and a thorough gentleman.

He sold his garden and moved to Sydney for a short time, before coming back to Queensland and renting a market garden in the Kuraby area. When George was unable to continue with this work he entered the Salvation Army Men's Eventide Home at Riverview. George Wong Song died in the Ipswich General Hospital on 25 January, 1964, aged 82 years.

## **MORE IPSWICH FIRSTS – Ipswich City Council**

1973 - The first Primary School Library built in Queensland was opened at Goodna State School by Keith Hooper MLA;

1977 - The first Genealogy Society in Queensland was formed in Ipswich.

1979 – Ipswich can also lay claim to the first woman recognised as a builder in Queensland. Jeanette Horwath attended her first Moreton Shire Council meeting as a Councillor in April 1979. At the meeting she learnt that she was granted registration as a building contractor;

1982 – Ipswich was the first city to declare itself 'Nuclear Free' in December, 1982;

1984 - Australia's first Medicare Office was opened in Ipswich, by Mr. Bill Hayden, the nation's first national health scheme instigator;

1995 – Ipswich City Council became the first local authority in Australia to provide access to the Internet. Global Info Links was established as part of Information Technology led Economic Development Strategy for the Ipswich region;

1997 – Ipswich became the first local government in Queensland to have a Master Planned Area Structure Plan approved under the Integrated Planning Act 1997 (IPA);

2006 – Was named as the first city outside the USA to be part of the Liveable Communities Partnership which promotes quality of life, economic development and social equity;

2007- Ripley Valley became the first area in Queensland to be declared a Master Planned Area under the Integrated Planning Act 2007 (IPA);

2009 - First local government in Queensland to prepare an Enquiry by Design under the Sustainable Planning Act 2009 (SPA);

2010 – The first successful confirmed pregnancy through Ipswich's first IVF clinic (Ipswich Day Hospital);

2010 - Ipswich was named as one of the world's smartest communities by the International Intelligent Community Forum. Ipswich was the only Australian city listed among the 21 global finalists.

2010 - First-ever virtual cooking class was held in Ipswich when Jamie Oliver broadcast live to d'Arcy Doyle Place in the Ipswich CBD. The celebrity chef brought his Ministry of Food Australia to the big screen in his first-ever virtual cooking class.
