

BEYOND THE DIGITAL HORIZON: TROVE, LIBRARIES AND ARCHIVES

The RAHS is pleased to share that we will be returning to Gosford in March to stage another regional seminar with the <u>Central Coast Family History Society</u>. Last year's seminar was such a success, we just had to go back with a new program. The focus of the 2024 seminar will be ways to research 'beyond the digital horizon'.

RAHS Senior Vice President Christine Yeats will discuss researching passenger arrivals to the Australian colonies using the NSW State Archives Collection and the National Archives of Australia. Christine will also talk about making the best use of Trove for your historical research and offer tips and advice.

participants on a 'tour' of the RAHS Library and discuss what makes this collection so special for local and community history.



JRAHS Podcast:
Bridging the Past with the Present

supporting cast of the Chunking Legation 1941-1942.

We are pleased to share the launch of a new digital initiative – a podcast that features interviews with contributors to the *Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society (JRAHS*).

Dr Samuel White, RAHS Councillor and *JRAHS* Editor, launched the initiative in January. In each episode, he speaks to contributors about what inspired them to pursue their research, what sources and archives they used, and their future research plans. The contributors also share how their article contributes new insights to our understanding of Australian History.

In the first interview with Emeritus Professor James Cotton – *Chungking Follies:* The supporting cast of the Chunking Legation 1941–1942 – we learn how family records of letters and photographs can reveal insights into the interpersonal dynamics that impact high-stakes diplomatic initiatives, such as the opening of the diplomatic mission in Chungking (Chongqing).

Professor Cotton discusses the impact of several key employees – Bill Westwood, William Stanley Mew and Edmund Burgoyne. His interview highlights the human element in government bureaucracies and the impact of good (and not-so-good) employee choices that get hidden in more official records. We also learn how a very human story – talented employees who become disillusioned by less experienced and difficult colleagues – impacted foreign policy implementation between Australia and China.

The Game of Croquet: Sydney Croquet Clubhouse listed on SHR

The Sydney Croquet Clubhouse at Rose Bay was recently listed on the State
Heritage Register. The RAHS Heritage Committee supported its listing in 2023.
Croquet enthusiasts Lyn Stewart and Dr John Watson contributed the following short history of the game in Australia.

The game, in its present form, has been played in Australia since the late 1800s. A probable forerunner was 'crookey', played in Ireland with a curved mallet. Croquet reached 'craze' level popularity in Victorian times when both men and women played together. The mallet was always, to that point, swung from the side like a golf club. But swinging the mallet between the legs was recognised as providing a superior stroke and so the game, and the outfits, changed. In the 1950s, ladies played croquet wearing long skirts and stockings, and the clubs, understandably, limited their membership to women. The sexism

disappeared.

Clubhouses vary in size and design across the nation. A recent listing of the Sydney Croquet Clubhouse on the NSW State Heritage Register provides a rare example of an Inter-War period split-log building constructed for recreational use. Although the club had been playing croquet since 1922, the clubhouse was built in 1935. The building, within the Woollahra Golf Course at Rose Bay, stands on ground that was part of Captain John Piper's property in colonial NSW.



RAHS Day Lecture Ella Zuila, Australia's Forgotten Heroine of the High Wire



While Australia has been visited over the years by many circus companies, troupes and performers, Australia has also produced a number of circus artists who garnered international fame. One of Australia's earliest circus 'exports' was Sydney-born Catherine Webber (1854–1926) better known in the United States, England and Continental Europe in the last decades of the 19th century as 'Ella Zuila, The Australian Funambulist & Heroine of the High Wire'. This presentation will outline her life and career and will be richly illustrated with photographs and posters.

RAHS Day Lecture Building a Place for Virtue in Australian Capitalism

In 1868, Lucy Osburn read a book on board the *Dunbar Castle*, where she and six Nightingale nurses travelled to Sydney to take up their posts in the Sydney Infirmary. Miss Osburn's book was a gift intended to help her prepare for life in the colonies, though 'she was afraid', she wrote to Florence Nightingale, that it was about a different colony. It was very easy to get the mix-up, partly because they all shared a common goal of building a new kind of economy based on virtues that seemed marginal at home in England.

Nurses like Osburn, but also medical doctors, lawyers, accountants, clergy, teachers, charity workers, engineers and even accountants were at the vanguard of moral-economic goals. Working in the 'social laboratory' that was Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand, by the 1870s and 1880s, middle-class morality shaped such white-collar professions that were growing

in the Antipodes and in the other English-speaking settler colonies of Canada and the United States. Over the following decades, this middle class invested a combination of financial capital and morality into the economies of Australia and the rest of the settler world, building a model that would take over the global economy in the mid-twentieth century.

In this lecture, Hannah Forsyth will talk about the ways virtue was imagined and built into Australian capitalism, how it went wrong and what has happened to professional expertise and morality in the economy in recent decades.

Sydney Benevolent Asylum, c.1840-1850 (State Library of NSW)

The Sydney Benevolent Asylum: Its history, records and association with the Randwick Institute for Destitute Children

its links to the Randwick Institute for Destitute Children. The Asylum, administered by the NSW Benevolent Society, was established in 1818 as a philanthropic organisation caring primarily for Sydney's poor, abandoned, destitute and sick in the 19th and 20th centuries. Many of those entering the Asylum were placed in the Randwick Institute for Destitute Children.

Heather Garnsey joined the staff of the Society of Australian Genealogists (SAG) in 1984 and was its Executive Officer from 1988 until her retirement at the end of February 2020. Heather is an Honorary Member and Fellow of SAG, an Honorary Fellow of the Heraldry and Genealogy Society of Canberra and was the joint recipient of the AFFHO Award for Meritorious Service to Family History in 2015. She holds a Masters degree in English History and SAG's Diploma in Family Historical Studies. In her retirement, she is enjoying having time to spend on her own family history research.

'Fighting Mac' McKenzie and Other Anzac Chaplains of WWI

the outbreak of war McKenzie applied for a chaplaincy immediately and joined the AIF, attached to the 4th Battalion. He was one of the first chaplains ashore at Gallipoli. He lumped stretchers and carries water for months on end as well as tending the wounded and burying the dead. In France and Belgium he continued to live in the front line with the troops. McKenzie was at Pozieres, Bullecourt, Mouquet Farm, Polygon Wood and Passchendaele.


What makes McKenzie's reputation incredible is that he embodied almost everything that the typical digger loved to hate. He railed against booze, brothels, betting and bad language, and ran frequent evangelistic campaigns for the Anzacs. Despite these apparent disadvantages Fighting Mac was worshipped and revered by the soldiers — becoming the man who best represented the Anzac ideal. In this talk, historian Dr Daniel Reynaud, author of The Man the Anzacs Revered: The Legendary William 'Fighting Mac' McKenzie, Anzac Chaplain will tell Fighting Mac's story and discuss the role and contributions of other Anzac chaplains of the First World War.

From First Fleet to the Harbour Bridge:

Sydney's astronomical beginnings

The voyage of the First Fleet to Botany Bay was more than a convenient way to rid Britain of its convicts. Join us as historical detectives on the trail of William Dawes, astronomer, engineer, surveyor and ordnance officer – from his arrival in 1788 until the construction of the Sydney Harbour Bridge in 1932.

The First Fleet was not just for military but also scientific purposes, which is poorly known today. Astronomers were vital on voyages of discovery, because they could cross check the readings of a chronometer – a portable timekeeping device also used for determining longitude at sea – with time measurements based on the stars. Willam Dawes spent much time building rapport with the indigenous people and was working with a young Aboriginal woman to record the Gadigal language. He was the first European ever to do this. While Dawes was making scientific progress and surveying the stars and streets of the new colony, his relationship with Governor Arthur Phillip deteriorated.






