

Geographical Names Board celebrates milestone 400th meeting

The RAHS would like to congratulate the Geographical Names Board (GNB) on reaching a significant milestone on Tuesday, 5 April 2024—the 400th GNB meeting. The GNB hosted a special event at the State Library of NSW to mark this milestone, which was attended by RAHS President Dr Iain Stuart, RAHS Councillor Adjunct Associate Professor Carol Liston AO, and RAHS General Manager Suzanne Holohan. Carol is the current RAHS representative member of the GNB.

Established in 1966, the GNB is the official body for naming and recording details of places and geographical names in NSW. It has officially recorded 65,000 place names for mountains and rivers, along with suburbs, railway stations and other geographic features. The RAHS acknowledges the importance of this work as place names are an integral part of understanding the historical, cultural, and geographical context of NSW regions, suburbs and streets.

We also support the NSW Government's dual naming policy for geographical

cultural respect and reconciliation. It also contributes to preserving Aboriginal knowledge, revitalising languages, and enriching historical understanding.

At the State Library event, the GNB highlighted its ongoing commitment to Aboriginal place naming with a screening of *Reawakening Aboriginal Place Names*. The NSW Dual Names Map, available online, was the backdrop to the event's speeches. This included a presentation acknowledging the service of Dr. Peter Orlovich who has been an integral part of the GNB since 1966. He represented the RAHS on the GNB and was a RAHS Councillor. He made a significant contribution to the identification and research of historic place names across NSW, including playing a vital role in the Anzac Memorial Place Names Project: he assisted the GNB in identifying 1,701 hometowns of enlistees for the First World War.

Central Coast Regional Seminar - Beyond the Digital Horizon: Trove, Libraries and Archives

On 2 March the RAHS, in collaboration with the Central Coast Family History Society (CCFHS), held its first regional seminar for the year at Gosford. The RAHS acknowledges and thanks Create NSW for its support for these regional events for local and family history communities outside Sydney. The seminars play a crucial role in supporting continuing education and facilitate networking and collaboration among RAHS members and supporters in the regions.

The theme of the seminar was *Beyond the Digital Horizon: Trove, Libraries and Archives*. The speakers were Carol Liston AO and Christine Yeats. Carol and Christine took the 67 attendees down pathways of future research possibilities with presentations on Trove, immigration and shipping records (a refresher), an exploration of what's not online and then – the icing on the cake – Carol spoke about some of the hidden gems in the RAHS Library. 

Beyond the 'Kantai Kessen' Japan's Fateful Defeat in the Southwest Pacific

In the 'Kantai Kessen' (decisive naval battle doctrine) the Japanese navy would win a war by fighting and winning a single, decisive naval action.

At the beginning of May 1942 Japan prepared to commence a fresh wave of offensive actions in the Southwest Pacific with the ultimate aims of strategically isolating Australia and America while seeking to finally neutralise the US Pacific Fleet through the destruction of its aircraft-carrier arm. Within a year the ambitions of the Japanese Naval Staff lay in ruins, and the ultimate fate of Japan itself was effectively sealed.

This presentation seeks to illustrate the core weakness of the Japanese military machine, namely its wholesale commitment to offensive warfare, which was exposed and deflated by the Allies in the course of the New Guinea and Solomons campaigns following the disastrous reversal of fortunes for the Imperial Japanese Navy at Midway in early June 1942. Over-ambitious strategic planning, fractious inter-service relations between the Japanese Army and Navy, the lack of proper logistics and supply infrastructure, and weaknesses in the build-up of air and naval forces are identified as the core reasons why any contemplated operations against Australia other than bombing and submarine

Germany made the fatal mistake of assuming that cheap victories alone were sufficient to ensure ultimate triumph over the western powers and the Soviet Union without recourse to the planning and preparation required for the emergence of a total war environment.



TWO COLONIAL WORKSHOPS -STRAW PLAITING & BRAIDING

Making a replica of a Sun Bonnet like the hats made and worn by Female Convicts led by the talented Lyn Watkins, crafter and descendant of Factory women. Straw plaiting was one of the numerous occupations of the convict women transported to the Colony. There were many women in the Female Factory with this skill. Household items and practical goods were made of straw – hats and baskets and all manner of uses. A plaited straw sun bonnet or hat was an essential item of clothing and was trimmed and adorned with a ribbon.



What are the Community Heritage Grants?

The Community Heritage Grants (CHG) program supports community-based organisations to identify and care for Australian cultural heritage collections which are publicly accessible, locally held and nationally significant. The CHG program commenced in 1994, and we are delighted to be marking our 30th

How we can help

The CHG supports small, local groups with limited funding and staffing resources, who would benefit from access to professional cultural heritage expertise. Grants of up to \$20,000 are available to help organisations undertake a three-stage journey to assess their collection, identify collection care recommendations and implement practical improvements.

Non-profit, incorporated organisations – including **historical societies**, **archives**, **regional museums**, **public libraries**, **community groups**, **multicultural and Indigenous organisations** – are encouraged to apply. For more details visit the **CHG website**: <u>nla.gov.au/chg</u>.

Activities we support

In the first two stages, organisations work with experienced heritage practitioners to produce reports that:

- Explain the meanings and value of their collections (a significance assessment).
- Outline the condition of their collections and provide a conservation and collection management plan (a preservation needs assessment).

In the third stage, funding is available to:

Undertake conservation and collection management activities, as
recommended in the preservation needs assessment report. This may
include conservation treatment, purchase of collection rehousing and
storage materials, environmental control and monitoring equipment or
digitisation.

CHG also offers grants for **collection management training projects or cataloguing or collection management software**.


