Women of the Tellicherry

Meeting will be held in the rooms and via Zoom

The convict transport *Tellicherry* has held a fascination for me since 2005 when I first learnt it had brought my 4x great grandfather (one of the Wicklow Rebel Leaders of the 1798 Irish Rebellion) to our shores, as well as the woman who would become my 4x great grandmother.

I received an invitation to a reunion which had been planned to commemorate 200 years since the ship had arrived on 15 February 1806. This reunion took place at the Campbelltown Catholic Club in February 2006 in the area where so many of the *Tellicherry* transportees had spent time. Meeting other descendants of those aboard the ship was very special indeed – it was a shared history which begged to be told.

Over the years since then I have spent a considerable number of hours researching this ship, and many of those on board. Through my research I discovered links to the Hunter Valley and to other members of the NFHS as well.

This research will form the basis for a NFHS publication in the near future. Members of our Convict SIG have enthusiastically researched some of those on board the *Tellicherry* and our female convict bonnet makers have made two complete sets of bonnets which we will feature when our publication is finally launched.

At the April monthly meeting I will share with you the presentation I gave at the November 2022 Irish Conference entitled *Return to Tipperary*.

Overview of February meeting

Our March meeting was extremely interesting and educational. by people such as NFHS member Louise Evans' presentation entitled From Hippocrates to Modern Day: Medical Terms and Facts offered information on scientific and medical facts for anyone interested in history; current medical terminology information including prefixes, suffixes, root words, common abbreviations and health data; and obsolete medical terms for diseases. As an aside here, I was unable to attend on the evening and it brought home the benefit of our YouTube channel where our presentations are recorded. I was therefore able to listen to Louise's presentation at a later date so did not miss out. You too can catch up on Louise's presentation by clicking here.

Louise has had a long and varied career becoming a Registered Nurse in 1976 working in Australia and the UK. She had some very memorable times working with maximum security prisoners, patients with tetanus, patients in an iron long, patients suffering from major gun shot wounds, as well as delivering babies at home. She has thoroughly enjoyed her career.



Louise commenced her presentation with some facts on autopsy.



The word autopsy translates as 'to see for oneself'. Believe it or not, the first autopsy was carried out in Alexandria in 300BC. It wasn't until 1.000 years later that the first legal autopsy was conducted in Bologna, Italy. Although the Catholic Church has become more accepting of autopsies, back in the 1400s it was considered a crime. In the 1700s autopsies became more commonly performed however this led to the occurrence of 'grave robbers' known also 'resurrection men'. Originally

the Government turned a blind eye to this practice and it was left to wealthy family members to try to prevent this from occurring. One type of prevention was the installation of a metal mortsafe such as on this grave at St Tuchaldus, Aviemore in Scotland.

Autopsies led to a greater understanding of the human anatomy and many improvements in medical science. An autopsy is the same as a post-mortem. It can be full or limited. A full autopsy involves the examination and testing of body organs and tissues and the retention of these for more detailed analysis. A limited autopsy is performed when the next of kin has set limits, eg external examination only; external examination with some testing on small tissue; or limited to certain areas of the body. In Australia, the rate of autopsy is dropping. Fifty years ago the rate was 50% of all deaths however now is approximately 15%. There are coronial and non-coronial autopsies. Coronial autopsies are generally carried out if a person dies from an unknown or unnatural cause whereas a non-coronial autopsy requires the consent from the person before they pass away or the senior next of kin after death.

Other medical advances were microscopes and radiology. Microscopes were first developed in 1590 by Dutch father and son Hans and Zacharias Jansen. In the 1600s there were further advancements

Leeuwenhoek (the first to observe bacteria protozoa), Hooke and Kircher who observed cells. Significant improvements were however needed to



these microscopes particularly with regard to the focussing. By 1830 microscopes were becoming more widely used in medicine and improved microscopes had been developed.

In 1896, x-rays were first used to diagnose a fractured wrist on a child in the USA. Prior to this, various methods were used by doctors to diagnose illnesses. Some of these methods were weird and wonderful and thankfully not used today. One such method was the drinking of urine; if

it was sweet like honey, it was a sign of diabetes. A 'fishy' urine smell could mean a urinary tract infection. Observing a patient falling down was a sign of a stroke. Other methods included taking the pulse, feeling the skin for fever, looking at the skin colour and listening to the lungs.

Medical and scientific advances relating to diagnosis led to the need for consistency with medical terminology. With medical terms, the prefix indicating the 'specific location' comes first; then the root word being the 'general location'; and lastly the suffix which is the 'features'.

An example is *myocarditis*. The prefix (specific location) is *my* (meaning muscle); the root word (general location) is cardio (heart); and the suffix (features) is itis (inflammation). So, myocarditis means the muscle layer of the heart that is inflamed. The 'o' is a combining form.

Louise gave a number of examples of prefixes and suffixes, a few being algia meaning pain (eg myalgia being muscle pain); ectomy meaning the removal through surgery (eg hysterectomy being the removal of the uterus); hyper meaning above/excess (eg hypertension being high blood pressure); mal meaning bad or abnormal (eg malignancy or malaria); and peri meaning around (eg a periodontist treats gum/tissues around the teeth).

Some examples of root words given by Louise were: aur relating to the ears; encephala/neur relating to the brain; gastr relating to the stomach; hepat relating to the liver; and pulmon relating to the

There are also many abbreviations used such as: ARF – acute renal failure; *DVT* - deep venous thrombosis; # - fracture; *SOB* – shortness of breath.

During WW1, the major killers were infections such as gastrointestinal and respiratory. Vaccinations were available to soldiers for plague, tetanus, smallpox and rabies. During WW2 the major killer was combat. Penicillin was by now in use and saved thousands of lives. In the UK in the late 1800s to early 1900s, the main cause of death was infections such as tuberculosis, pneumonia and measles. In Australia at this time we also had influenza, gastroenteritis and

smallpox.

Louise continued on by giving some trend data in Australia on the tuberculosis mortality rates; the National Age and Invalid Pension Legislation of 1908; infant mortality from 1915-2020; vaccine preventable deaths from 1907-2020; maternal deaths from the early 1900s to 2020; mortality rates from dementia from 1979-2020; and the current top causes of death

The final part of Louise's presentation focussed on some obsolete medical terms for diseases, a number of which you may have seen on an ancestor's death certificate. Some of the terms Louise mentioned were: *ablepsy* (blindness); *ague* (fever and chills, malaria also called marsh fever or congestive fever); *apoplexy* (a disease in which the patient falls down, eg a stroke); *biliousness* (jaundice);

bloody flux (dysentery); black death (Bubonic plague); brain fever (meningitis); barrel fever (alcoholism); black dog (depression); canine madness (rabies); cholera infantum (infant diarrhea); consumption (tuberculosis); diarrhea of urine (diabetes); dropsy (oedema); falling sickness (epilepsy); grip/grippe (influenza); horrors (shivering due to fever, depression or delirium); general paralysis of insanity (tertiary syphilis); lockjaw (tetanus); mortification (gangrene, necrosis); Visitation by God (death due to natural causes); and many more.

Thanks so much Louise for coming along to present to us on this fascinating subject. It was very much enjoyed by all those present. 


Rest Assured Webinar
