Overview of April meeting

Women of the Tellicherry

Once again, our April monthly meeting was a huge success. We had 21 members and visitors in the rooms and eight joined via Zoom. Remember that if you can't get to the rooms, there is always this option of watching on Zoom from the comfort of your home. Jim MacDougall was once again the lucky winner of our raffle. His wife Margaret won last month and Jim the month before. There is definitely some luck in that household.

Our guest speaker, NFHS President Mel Woodford, honoured the women on board the convict transport *Tellicherry* with an extremely interesting presentation. Mel told us why she was interested in this ship and that she is producing a publication about the ship and the women on board. She guided us through how she had carried out the research and many of the pieces of information she had found.

Since 2005, Mel has had a fascination with the convict transport *Tellicherry*. arriving in Australia on 15 February 1806. She learnt it had brought her 4x great grandfather (one of the Wicklow Rebel Leaders of the 1798 Irish Rebellion) to Australia, as well as the woman who would become her 4x great grandmother.

Over the years she has spent considerable hours researching this ship, and many of those on board, and through this research she discovered links to the Hunter Valley and to other members of the NFHS. This research will form the basis for a NFHS publica-

tion in the near future. Members of the NFHS Convict SIG have enthusiastically researched some of those on board the *Tellicherry* and our female convict bonnet makers have made two complete sets of bonnets which we will feature when the publication is finally launched.

Unusual cargo - The Tellicherry was a mixture of convicts as well

as free men and women. It held an unusual cargo. There were five unconvicted Wicklow Rebels from the 1798 Rebellion. The government was very keen to send them far from Ireland, never to return. They could take their wives and children if they wished.




Arthur Devlin and John Mernagh, two of the rebels were unmarried. Martin Burke's wife, Rachael, did not accompany her husband. Michael Dwyer and his wife Mary chose to leave their young children with family, to follow at a later date. Hugh Vesty Byrne and his wife Sarah chose to leave their eldest son behind but to bring their two youngest, Michael, 5, and Rose, 2. Sarah was also expecting her fourth child, who was born along the way. Her name was Ann.

Identifying the women and girls on board — Mel's starting point was to take a look at the convict indents from the State Records of NSW, a primary source. Here she could find the name, where each convict was convicted, when they were convicted, and the term that they were given. Later convict indents provided more information.

National Archives of Ireland, Dublin - Almost 39,000 Ireland-Australian transportation records are held at the archives which provided wonderful details on each of the convicts who were to be transported on all of the ships. Dr Harding's *Journal of Attendance* (17 June 1805) provides details on convicts aboard the hulks and in the gaols in Cork awaiting transportation, including each of the convicts on the *Tellichery*.

Changes to the female convict list – Changes to the convict list could occur at any stage. Of the 36 female convicts who sailed on the *Tellicherry*, 26 were inspected by Dr Harding. An additional 19 female convicts inspected that day who were to depart on the *Tellicherry* did not. However, another eight did.

Names and ages of the women - The women were not that dissimilar in age to each other. In records it can be found that many of the women remained in contact with one another, so it is likely that at least some formed a bond of friendship and support. The women were convicted in Dublin City, Wicklow, Meath, Limerick, Clare, and County Kerry. Dublin, Wicklow and Meath are not that far apart from one another with Limerick, Clare and County Kerry being fur-



ther away to the south-west. There were also seven women on board who came free (one of these being the baby born on board).

Cork Harbour and the Departure on 31 August 1805 - Cork Harbour, where the *Tellicherry* departed from, was a stronghold

of the British Navy at this period in time. It was an incredibly busy harbour. The East India Fleet was due to depart on 28 August. But unfavourable winds caused a delay until the 31st. That last day of August must have been an amazing sight, as three battleships led the way out of the harbour, followed by two frigates, 38 transport ships, 19 East Indiamen (see photo below left), along with convict ships the *William Pitt* with 120 female convicts from England and the *Tellicherry* with almost 170 Irish convicts. The convict ships parted company with the East India Fleet part way and continued on towards the Cape. The *Tellicherry* spent three days in Madeira and the *William Pitt* remained there for some time.

Captain Thomas Cuzens - (note – different spellings of the name in primary sources Cuzons/Cousins) - Those aboard the *Tellicherry* were fortunate in that Captain Cuzens was a kind man. He looked after the wellbeing of all on board, not generally the norm on many convict ships. The area set aside for the female convicts was small and cramped. The captain then set aside the hospital for the Wicklow Rebels and the free women. He permitted the convicts to spend as much time as possible on deck to ensure their health remained good.

Surgeon John Connellan – (note – different spellings of the name in primary sources Connellan/Conlon) - John Conlon, the surgeon aboard the *Tellicherry*, had been an informer during the 1798 Rebellion. The government was keen for him to leave Ireland. It appears he may have struck up a relationship with one of the female convicts from Dublin by the name of Catherine Brady, who became his housekeeper and moved from place to place with Conlon. In some musters, Catherine is identified by the name Conlon.

The Paracensus - A wonderful resource which is often overlooked is the Paracensus of Australia. It is a collation of primary sources from 1788 to 1828, providing a first-class starting point from which

to gather data. Shown here is just a small section of the codes used in the Paracensus and the source that each code refers to. There are two full pages of code/

source combinations so you can see the extent of the resources that were accessed to create the Paracensus.

Mel continued her presentation by giving some **details of the lives of some of the women** as well as some questions that are still to be answered. One of the women that Mel discussed was Mary Gow.

Mary is believed to be an English lass who was married to one of the soldiers on board the *Tellicherry*. The NSW Corps was to receive an additional 28 Privates who arrived on the ship. Mary's son John was born not long after their arrival in NSW, but sadly her husband, also named John, died a few months later, leaving her a widow in a new land with a newborn baby. She did not remarry until 1810.

Mel spoke about the **musters** and how some are more helpful than others. In the 1822 muster, none of Mary's children are named, nor are their ages given. Mary is recorded as the wife of T. Calledge in Windsor. And in the 1825 muster, the wife of Gulledge, Windsor.

The 1825 muster lists the names and ages of the children. Two of Mary's daughters married into prominent families in the Singleton district. Her eldest, Charlotte, married Richard Alcorn, who owned a succession of inns in the area. Jemima married into the Singleton family, after whom the town is named. Sadly, Mary is buried in an unmarked grave at Whittingham Cemetery with her son Isaac, who died in his 20s.

Sydney Gazette Shipping News: Arrival - Once the *Tellicherry* arrived, those who were unwell were transferred to the General Hospital. The next morning, Captain Cousins, Surgeon Conlon and the Wicklow rebels went to Government House to meet Governor King, where they were entitled to be granted 100 acres along the Cabramatta Creek. They were also entitled, as new settlers, to draw rations for 18 months and receive two assigned convicts who would also be fed (or victualled) by the government. The Colonial Secretary's office took charge of the convict indents, and the convicts were transferred up the river to Parramatta, where a brief muster was carried out and many of the convicts were assigned. The government took the tradesmen. Next, the military and ex-officers had their turn, they were often land holders, and most of the female convicts went into domestic service. Some women went to the female factory at Parramatta.

1806 Muster - The 1806 muster showed exactly where most of the female convicts of the *Tellicherry* were assigned from the outset. Mary Johnson, Mel's 4x great grandmother was already with John Mernagh, her 4x great grandfather. Their children were born a short while later, Elizabeth, her 3x great grandmother, in 1810.

1814 Muster - Unfortunately, the 1811 muster does not provide a great deal of information. However, the 1814 muster does. There are

many changes of circumstance with a lot of the women. This muster tells whether they are receiving government rations, whether their status is free or if they are still considered convicts; as well as who they were married to or living with and how many children were with them. Some of the women had married other *Tellicherry* convicts.

The convicts who were transported to Australia, both male and female, had differing life experiences, with some faring far better in their new land than they would ever have done back home.



Bonnet tribute to the women of the *Tellicherry* - The women of the *Tellicherry* are a part of so many family histories. They are among the matriarchs and pioneers of NSW. As a part of the *Roses from the Heart* initiative of Dr Christina Henri, Artist in Residence at the Cascades Female Factory, a bonnet

tribute has been made for each of the women and girls aboard the ship to acknowledge the part they played in the history of Australia.

Mel's research is ongoing.

Thanks so much Mel for a fascinating presentation. We appreciate how much time and effort you have put into this research and look forward to seeing your book published.

NFHS relies on publication sales to help pay for the important initiatives being undertaken by your Society. The Publications group only meets twice a year - in March and in October. **The next meeting will be held on 18 October from 11.00 am to 1.00 pm.** The rest of the time members work on their individual projects and keep in touch by email. What are downloads?

For members who are not sure about what we mean by the word 'download' and why NFHS is working to make all our publications available as a download, here is some information.

Downloads are copies of what NFHS authors have written that may be paid for and put immediately onto your own computer or onto a USB. The cost of any NFHS publication nowhere near covers the cost of the research and the time that the authors put into the task of creating the work. After that work is finished and formatted, more hours of work go into getting the Publication ready so it can be either printed, put on a USB or downloaded. Once this work is done, the sale price of that Publication includes the cost of all the resources that have been used to make a printed copy or a copy of the file on a USB. As costs rise, printing - especially colour printing - is becoming more expensive. USBs of our Publications are not as popular as books.

Once the files are finished, a download of one of our Publications costs us nothing to make and purchasers get their book immediately. For this reason any download will be cheaper than any book or USB that has to be made.

Our newest two publications will be available to purchase through the NFHS shop on our website as soon as possible after their launch on 3 May 2024. Keep your eyes peeled for those downloads if you believe that this is the best way for you to store and read your books.

Upcoming publications

Two publications are about to be launched by the Society. In two parts, *They Served Their Country*, edited by Maree and Ken Shilling; and *Behind the Sandstone: Hidden Stories of Sacrifice*, compiled by Margaret Ashford. Details of the launch are on page 10.

This work is a comprehensive record of the convict women who came north from Sydney. They often arrived through the settlement at Newcastle but some travelled north as settlers with their families once free.

It comprises three distinct parts:

Part 1 provides a database of almost 1,800 women who came to Newcastle and the Hunter Valley. As well as noting the ship and year of arrival, further information and references are provided.

Part 2 contains biographies of 73 of these women (from the 2019 edition). Some of the stories are told by descendants, others by local history researchers looking to uncover the unique lives and circumstances of the women in the early Hunter Valley.

Part 3 of the publication gives a brief outline of the work undertaken by members and volunteers for the *Roses from the Heart* project which recognises the contribution made by the female convicts sent to Australia. The book contains coloured images of some of the bonnets made for that project.

The Publication contains an extensive bibliography. It is fully indexed and searchable and contains links to each biography.


