**GENERAL:** Members requesting information from the Group's Library are reminded that the Research Monitors work on a voluntary basis and can only provide information from the resources available.

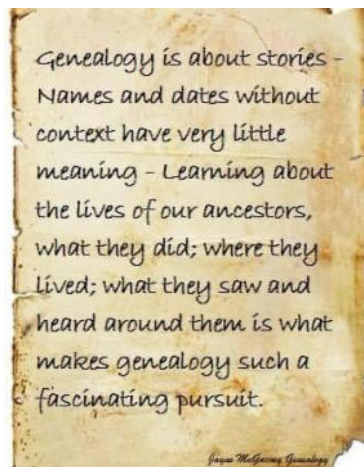

## Book Launch

On the morning of the 14<sup>th</sup> February, we had a very successful gathering at the room to launch the latest book by local man and member, John Hamblin.

John brought with him well known local historian, Ross Maroney and Geoff Snowden a descendant of the Cowell family of Burrangong as guests, and an enthralled audience listened to talks from all three men.

John's book, *The Wayback to Burrangong*, is a new and thoroughly researched account of the European settlement of the area and it dispels some myths and adds some new characters to the story. John's book is available for sale at our research room and at the Hunting Ground (Gilbert's Store), Boroowa Street, Young.

## Visitors from Texas

In December 2023, the Young & District Family History Group received a request for research from Mark Deans who lives in Texas, USA that is not Queensland, about his paternal grandfather, Stanley Thomas Deans (1893-1967)

All that Mark knew was that his father, Edward Deans, was born at Young on 24 Dec 1921, and his grandparents were born elsewhere, (Stanley Deans was born at Gulgong in 1893, and Manaan Deans (nee Long) was born at Young in 1887). The researcher was Karen Smith.

Stanley enlisted in the Australian Military Forces and served in World War I as a signaller. His record is publicly available on the National Archives of Australia website: Items listing (naa.gov.au). Stanley Deans was granted a Soldier Settlement Block on the Marengo Road, Young on the 9 Nov 1916. Karen was able to locate the block using the NSW Land Registry Services site (Parish and Historical Maps tab).

In 1917 at Young Stanley married Manaan Jane Long and it appears that they had their children at Young,

1. Thomas S Deans: born at Young in 1920
2. Edward Noel Deans: AS MENTIONED ABOVE.
3. Henry Spencer Deans: born in 1925

Stanley lost his soldier settlement block of land in 1921. He was not alone in that fate as did many others struggled to hold on to the land they were given. The 1930 Electoral Roll shows Stanley was working as a "Railway Employee".

In March 2024, Mark, his wife & cousin visited the Young & District Family History research room and met up with Karen and Kay McDonald. Karen showed the group how to find out more about Stanley's military service and how to access Trove articles about Stanley as well as articles he had penned himself. Kay then took the trio for a tour, where they were shown the block of ground that had belonged to Stanley. After that the trio did a spot of shopping at Annie B's where they purchased some lovely aprons and tea towels with a map of Young on them to take home to Texas.

## **A Story from our Research**

(previously published in the *Young Witness*)

George and Isabella Summerhayes nee Saywell, Settlers at Young

In the last newsletter I related the story of Isabella Saywell's arrival from Calais as a child, but the same detailed information has not yet been found for the young man she married, George Summerhayes.

George was born in a small English village called Curry Rivel in the county of Somerset in 1837. He and his cousin Simon are thought by the family to have travelled to Victoria together during the Gold Rush. Simon chose to remain in that state, but George followed the Gold to Lambing Flat where on the 8<sup>th</sup> of October 1865 at St John's Anglican Church in Young, George Summerhayes married 17-year-old Isabella Saywell. As a young married couple, they went to live near Bulla Creek (Monteagle) at Fourteen Mile Creek where they farmed and George looked for gold. George's first records of land purchases were for two portions, one of 2 acres where his gold mine was situated, and an adjoining 60 acres. A grandson was told the story of his "pioneering" Grandparents who on their wedding night, "stripped bark from the trees to make a bed and shelter."

George was a successful farmer, grazier, and perhaps miner too as over the years his acres of land increased. So did the children of the family with nine born at the farm. The farm now had the name Pioneer Farm.

George and Isabella bought land in the town of Young and the older children attended school there but spent summer on the farm. They built a row of cottages in Main Street where the Federation Hotel now stands. The family lived in number 9 and the others were leased or sold. The youngest children were born in town, sadly one child Lucy Emma died at five months old.

In 1901, George sold his farm to Francis Gerard of Moss Vale. Three years earlier George had won an award for the best cultivated farm within a radius of fifteen miles from Young.

George Summerhays died at Young on 4<sup>th</sup> December 1917 but Isabella lived for another ten years in her cottage at Main Street. Isabella died at Young in 1928, eighty years after the 'Agincourt' set sail from England.

Mr and Mrs Summerhayes lived from the 1860s in the Young area where they brought up eleven children and still have descendants around the district today.

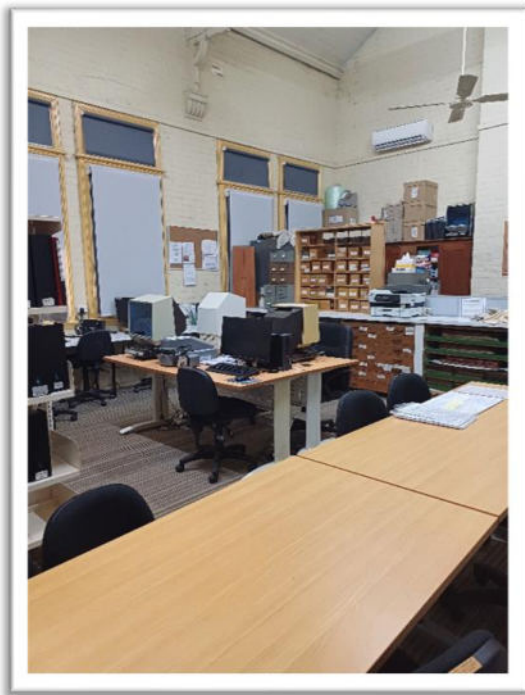
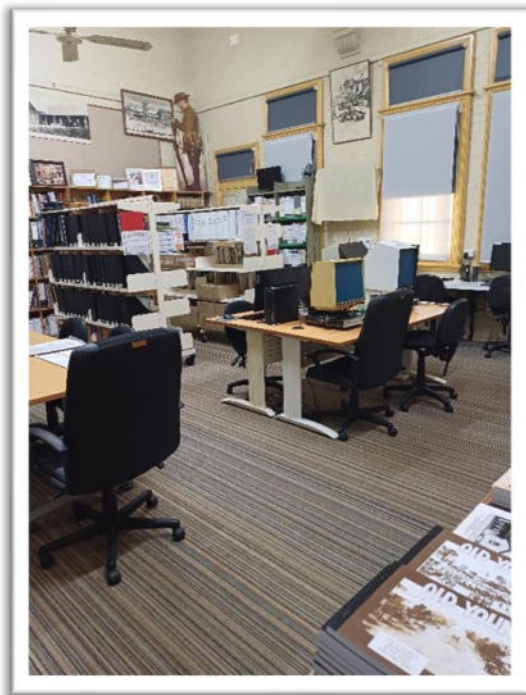
