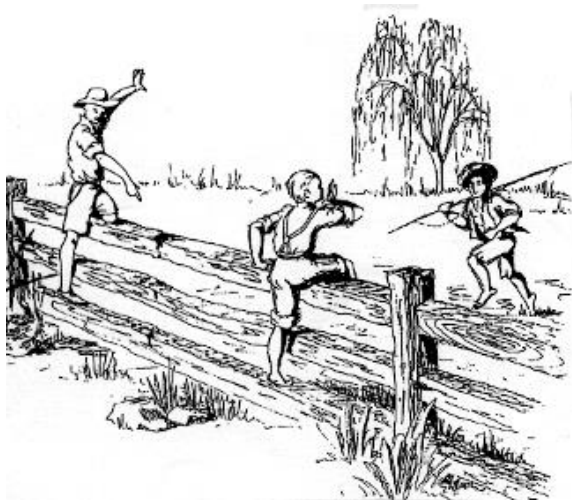

Research report since March 2024, from Greg Dillon and team

- Gail Murphy – looking for information about the birth of Matilda LODGE, daughter of Thomas James F. LODGE (b. 1830) and Hannah CATE (b.1834), Hannah married Stephen STARR (b.1837) in 1856 and they had a large family.
- Alan Clarke – is ghost writing a book about his 3xGreat-grandfather, William PRIOR who was a convict in the Campbelltown area, later Liverpool. His inquiry, how did William become a landholder in the District of Airs 1817-1824 before receiving his Ticket of Leave, and any supporting information.
- Anne Mullen – information about her ancestors: Mary Ann nee TASKER and James BROWN. James was a convict buried at Appin and Mary died in 1920, and was buried at Parramatta. Would like any local information we can provide.
- Richard Nicol – what happened to his grandfather? Oliver Neil NICOL born in Campbelltown in 1889. Oliver's grandparents came from Scotland as Bounty Immigrants: George Snr and Ellen/Helen Nicol, they had a large family and George Jnr and his wife Martha had a larger family, they lived within the Campbelltown area (see George Jnr's Obituary, in another article within this journal).

Cemetery database is ongoing and we are all slowly working through our allotted cemeteries – this task will take some time. Wayne has completed some of the smaller cemeteries. It's going to be a wonderful resource and will give a 'recorded' record or voice to many souls that have remained silent in their unmarked graves.

Family Occupations

Marie Holmes

My Grandmother was married twice. Her first husband was Conrad Phillip Faust, my Grandfather. Conrad was born in 1892 at Milton NSW. He was the eldest of 8 children. In 1903, Conrad was allowed to leave school, receiving a certificate to say he had been educated to the standard required by the Public Instruction Act of 1880.

In 1907, Conrad, aged 15, left home and travelled by steamer from nearby Ulladulla to Sydney, to work at EM Farleigh's Leather Works and Tannery in Corvard Street Mascot. The manager Louis De Hodel was a friend of his father. He was an Austrian and an expert in chrome tanning. It was here that Conrad learnt the occupation of a tanner. While working here, Conrad lodged in the same street in a boarding house run by Marie Measure and her children Rose and George. Conrad became friends with Rose and was later to marry her.

Later Conrad left the tannery and joined the Navy and served on the ships Challenger, Pyramus and Penguin. (see photo of Conrad on right) He entered the Navy as a Boy Second Class and was advanced to Ordinary Seaman in 1909 on his 18th birthday. Conrad had a difficult time in the Navy and sometimes went AWOL for which he would be punished by being thrown in the brig. He married Rose in 1910 and went on to have three children and during much of this time lived in Brisbane while he was absent from his ship and worked at whatever he could find. They returned to Sydney in 1918. The following year, at only 28 years of age, Conrad died of Bubonic Flu at home at Waterloo. My mother, Margaretha was only 4 years old at the time.



Rose and children then went north to Brisbane with a friend who went by the name of Peter Jansen and later married him and had two more children.

Peter worked for a time as a cooper at the Bulimba Brewery in Fortitude Valley, Brisbane while the family lived at Humpybong. This is today known as Redcliffe. Peter went home for weekends and travelled by ferry. As a cooper, he was involved in making the barrels or casks for storage at the brewery and also for repairing these. I remember he later made some small barrels for storage

in the pantry. They were beautifully made. These were of wooden strips joined together. One of these he used for the sauerkraut he made. Peter also went on to other occupations in his later life.

My Ancestor 's Occupation - by Jan Neaves

My 3x Great Grandfather Henry Francis Higgins was born in Buckinghamshire England in 1809. As a young man he had ploughing and reaping skills, so probably worked as a farm labourer. However, to impress his girlfriend Henry committed a robbery, stealing a lace cap to give to her. Not a clever thief! When she wore her new cap he was soon charged and transported on the "Royal Admiral " to the colonies as a convict.

Arriving in Sydney Cove in 1830 aged 21, Henry was immediately employed as a butler by Dr Reid on his farm near Braidwood NSW, Records show he could read and write, so he had employment advantages that many others didn't. At "Inverary Park" he met Irish farm servant Kitty, his future wife.

Henry 's fortune took a promising turn when he was left 100 pounds ,after his uncle died. Then his brother Thomas Higgins came free in 1841, possibly bringing his inheritance to Reidsdale. After Dr Reid's death Henry and Kitty were able to purchase 100 acres of the farm, where they worked really hard and raised their 10 children. They had progressed from servants to landowners.

With the purchase of a wagon and animals, Henry decided to become a carter. He travelled the Kings Highway for many days to Liverpool or across to Batemans Bay on the coast. He carried loads of crops and wool to and from market ,meeting small ships which sailed on to Sydney. Although a former convicted thief, the farmers of the area must have trusted Henry to sell and buy their necessities. All 5 foot 3 inches of Henry succeeded in travelling through the sparsely populated bush, possibly facing fires, floods and attacks by bushrangers. He was an industrious and enterprising fellow who became an Australian pioneer. When he passed away his 10 successful children erected the tallest monument in the Braidwood Cemetery, demonstrating that his most important occupation was of a beloved father.

From the Research Team files ~

A very recent research inquiry asking for help with family history revealed this wonderful treasure, made available to us by Trove. It provides a very rich, diverse and is overflowing with a wealth of family stories and history – in short, a genealogist dream!

I'm writing about an 'obituary' in our local newspaper. Sadly, this is a vanishing resource as more and more local newspapers close, giving way to the so-called technological age: that gives us so much ... yet, also takes away so much more.

This obituary was written over eighty years ago and the author probably knew the subject well. There are some errors, but heck, what newspaper, new or old doesn't have an error or two, or three... George's story, starts like many family history stories but what a story, and such a full and well lived life.

The following obituary recorded as it appeared in 1943, with a couple of grammar corrections, in essence, as it appeared and with the beautiful language of the day.

OBITUARY.

GEORGE NICOL, AGE 96 YEARS.

A foremost link of the Nicol family tree chain became severed five minutes after the hour of midnight on Thursday, 14th January, 1943, when George Nicol, late of Campbelltown, crossed to the Great Beyond. George Nicol was born on the 21st June, 1846, 96 years and 6½ months ago. After the arrival in Australia from Scotland in 1832, George and Helen Nicol, parents of the subject of this obituary, took up farming pursuits on "Mount Huon," Old Menangle Road, the present residence of Mr. and Mrs. James McMinn.

On the 21st June 1846, George Nicol Junr. was born at "Mount Huon." At the age of 7 years, George, and his elder brother, John Nicol, with their parents (George and Helen Nicol) removed to Appin and went to reside at "Netherdale," Appin, which later became the property of John Nicol, eldest son of George and Helen Nicol. "Netherdale" today is the residence of Miss R. Morice.

After some years at Appin School and on attaining the age of 15 years, young George Nicol left home to fare for himself. He roughed it hard on the "Netherdale" farm for 8 years, and became a master of draught horses, and with that knowledge entered the employment as a teamster for the late Wm. Graham, storekeeper of Campbelltown. That was in 1861. From that year to 1863 he carted with his team of 8 horses (sometimes more) provisions from Sydney to Campbelltown until the completion of the railway to Campbelltown.

It was in the year 1863, George Nicol then 17 years of age, was sent from Campbelltown to Sydney, by his employer, to load his team with groceries, provisions, and goods for delivery to Grenfell. This was the first team to go to Grenfell from Sydney direct. The journey for this pioneer teamster took six weeks. He became bogged on more than one occasion, but found assistance from other teamsters carting for Wm. Graham; and he with his team also gave assistance to other teamsters bogged on the crude roads of those days around the Goulburn Valley.

On his arrival at Grenfell, then in the days of the Grenfell gold rush, George Nicol found Grenfell to be only a calico town, there was not one house in the whole of Grenfell or on the Grenfell gold mining fields. This teamster pioneer's trip was during the period in which bushrangers—Ben Hall, Gilbert and Dunn—were active. It was also at this time when the late James Waterworth was main driver for Cobb & Co's. coaches at Campbelltown, taking the mail from Campbelltown to Goulburn and down the South Coast to Wollongong.

For seven years George Nicol was a teamster in the employ of William Graham, who on retirement in 1870 disposed of his business to his three sons (William, James and John Graham, who traded as Graham Bros. in Campbelltown. Mr. James Graham, a member of that firm, now 73 years of age, was at the graveside of the burial of George Nicol in Campbelltown last Friday afternoon.

At the age of 24 years, immediately after leaving the employ of William Graham, George Nicol married Martha Stevens [Stephens], and commenced farming in partnership with the late Jenner Wilson (first town clerk in Campbelltown), on the Appin Road opposite the late George Hodges home. For seven years he was in partnership with Jenner Wilson, and during those years three children were born—the

late Mrs. E. N. Percival, late of Appin; Mrs. C. A. Jones, now of Marrickville, and Annie, who died at the age of 9 years.

Leaving Wilson's farm, George Nicol continued farming on his own account on the adjoining property, at present owned by Mr. Jeremiah Quirk, of Campbelltown, and occupied by Mr. Christopher Johnston. On this farm George and Martha Nicol remained for 38 years, during which time eleven children were born—Mrs. Alice Andrews, of Perth, W.A; George Nicol, of Sydney; Lucy (Mrs. Woodland) deceased; John of Woonona, (now with Hutton Bros., butchers, late of Camden); Florence (Mrs. W. Norman Rudd); Charles A. Nicol of Campbelltown; Edward O. Nicol, Government gardener (Campbelltown); Jessie, (Mrs. George Tritton) Campbelltown; Oliver Nicol; Eva (Mrs. C. Piggott) of Minto, and Mr. David (Dick) Nicol of Auburn, in all a family of fourteen children.

During those 38 years of farming, George Nicol as his children grew up and helped on the farm, did all the ploughing and cultivating, growing feed for his horses and cattle, and wheat which he carted with his horse team to the flour mill, lower Queen St, Campbelltown, now "Milby" private hospital.

He also contracted for carting and hauling during those years, and among many of his contracts, was the carting of the foundation stones of the Campbelltown Police Court, which was completed in 1888; the material for St. John's Roman Catholic Church in Campbelltown built in about the same year when the late Rev. Father Roach was Parish Priest, before the late Very Rev. Father Dunne, and many other prominent buildings of well over half century standing.

At the age of 68 years, he retired from farming and disposed of his team of eight horses, at the Camden Sale Yards, Capt. W. Larkin being auctioneer. That was in 1914, and leaving Campbelltown he lived with his wife at Narellan until 1920 when he went back to Campbelltown to live in a small cottage on the Camden Road between the tennis courts and the Camden railway crossing. This was actually his last place of residence, and at which place his wife died on the 29th September, 1922. He lived for many years alone in his Camden Road residence, and during the last three years lived alternately with various members of his family.

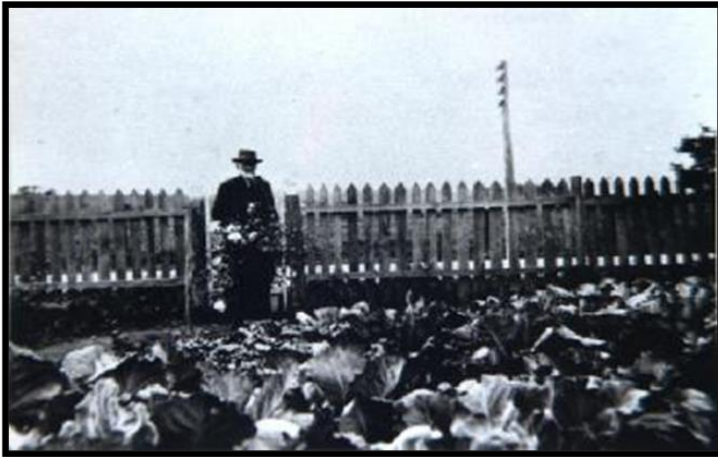
Death took place at a Lidcombe hospital on Thursday morning of last week, and during the afternoon of the following day his mortal remains were laid to rest in the Campbelltown Congregational Church Cemetery, the last rites being delivered by Rev. R. C. Turner, Administrative Head of the Congregational Church Union of New South Wales, Pitt St., Sydney. The attendance at the grave was very representative, among whom were Aldermen T. R. Fitzgibbon, W. A. Longhurst, J. W. Stradling, C. J. Clark, P. Solomon, and W. Bursill (Campbelltown Council); Ald. C. C. Murray (Deputy Mayor, Ingleburn Council); and Mr. C. Asher (Works Overseer, Campbelltown Council), as well as sons and a daughter and grandchildren of the deceased.

What a story! This George was George Nicol Jr; his parents arrived in 1839 from Scotland, with the first of their eleven babes, Mary, she was born on the voyage and was only 4 weeks old when they arrived aboard the sailing ship the Alfred, as Bounty Immigrants, for a new life in Australia.

And for the family historian this article has all the children listed, with their married names, where they were living, with property names to check and add more rich text to the family story. Articles like this are great starting point and research tool to look further, to check primary documents, like birth, marriage and death certificates, and search newspapers via the wonderful Trove database.

Six weeks to Grenfell from Campbelltown, via the Blue Mountains and Bathurst! Now a journey of approx. 350 klms and about 4.5 hours of travel time, and now with two alternative routes of travel ... they made them tough!

What a rich life! Image what Campbelltown looked like in 1846, or more so, Camden Road in 1943. I wonder what George would make of all the changes along his home stretch of Camden Road, no gardens or cabbage patch now – would he be turning over in his grave: hopefully, he is resting in peace. George is buried in the Methodist Congregational Cemetery, there may have been a gravestone could it have been lost or damaged, his parents and extended family are also buried there. His wife Martha, is buried in St Peter's Cemetery.

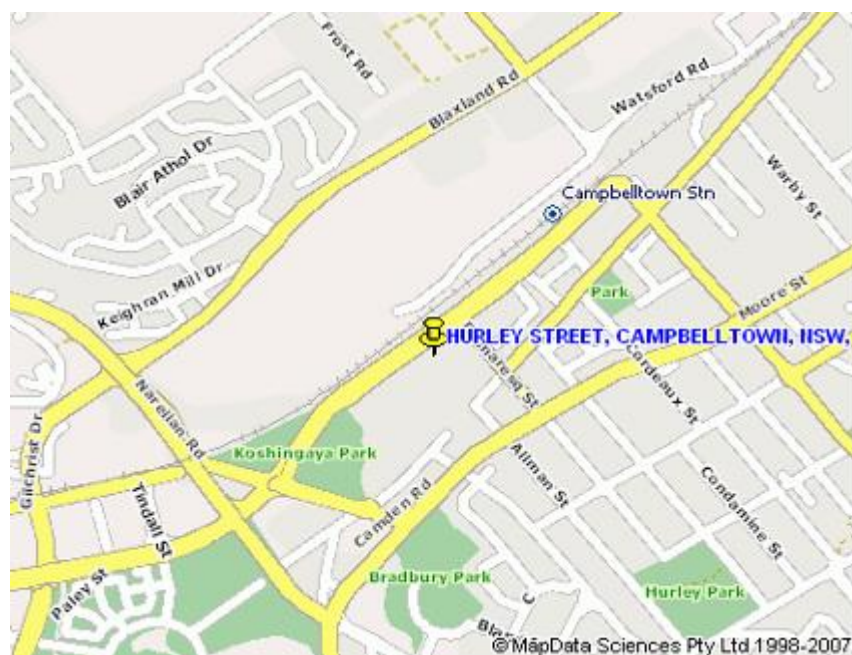
