

Update on Changes for Income Tax for Not-for- Profit (NFP) Organisations

We have received more queries about the changes in Not-for-Profit income tax since our last eNewsletter.

Free online training:

We suggest that you look at the <u>ACNC's free online training</u> available on Future Learn. The courses are for charities and organisations thinking of becoming charities. The twelve courses include how to apply to be a charity, as well as issues of governance and reporting. Each course lasts approximately two hours and includes videos, articles, group discussions and quizzes.

Advocacy:

The RAHS has recently written to the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) and to

not-for-profit income regulations.

Increase in Revenue Threshold: We propose raising the revenue threshold
for income tax from \$416 to \$18,200, which is the tax-free threshold for
individuals. This change would alleviate the financial burden on small
historical societies that often operate with limited resources.

 Inclusion of History as a Cultural Association: We request that local and community history be recognised as a cultural association alongside art, literature, and music. This adjustment would acknowledge history's vital role in preserving and promoting our cultural heritage.

The letters also emphasise that local and community history is more than just a record of past events. It enriches our communities by fostering a sense of identity, pride, and belonging. It also contributes to local economies through tourism and educational activities. Our proposed changes will ensure that the volunteers running our historical societies can continue their important work without undue financial pressures.

We will keep you updated on any developments related to our advocacy and encourage you to write similar letters to and/or meet with your federal and local members. Your support can make a difference!




Interview with Ian Dodd



A Transgressive Life: Monte Punshon and the Transformation of
Australia, 1882-1989

In her 106-year-long life, Ethel May (Monte) Punshon transgressed many of the social norms of her time. She crossed accepted boundaries of gender and sexuality and geographical borders separating Australia from Asia and the Pacific. This talk will explore the challenges of researching and writing Monte Punshon's story and consider the light that her life throws on the transformation of Australian society from the 1880s to the 1980s.

RAHS Special Lecture The influence of English Revival architecture in Neutral Bay and Cremorne Point, 1885–1930

Delayed development on the north side of Sydney Harbour meant that houses in the waterfront suburbs of Neutral Bay and Cremorne Point were characterised by English Revival architecture, which rose in the 1880s to influence the so-called Federation style and continued into the 1920s. Walter Liberty Vernon, Edward Jeaffreson Jackson, BJ Waterhouse and other likeminded architects and builders left their mark on these suburbs so that they remain showcases of English Revivalism.

Prefabrication played an important role in Australia from the first European settlement onwards, and more examples survive here than anywhere else in the world. They include wooden houses from Singapore (none of which survive in Singapore itself), English iron buildings of the 1850s (only one of which survives in Britain), plate iron buildings from Glasgow, like the Legislative Council building in Macquarie Street (none in Scotland), redwood buildings from the USA (none), and others from Germany, France and Italy. Most are of great historical and technical interest.

The life of Dr William Redfern



Picture Palaces and Art Deco Cinemas in Australia


One of the great revolutions of the 20th century in Australia (as with the rest of the world) was the movies and the cinema theatre. Picture palaces became the fantasy environment to enjoy the excitement and escape of silent movies and then talkies. Australians per capita were the keenest cinemagoers in the world. In the 1930s Art Deco was the predominant style in movies and in the architecture of the movie theatres. A few theatres remain intact in Australia to attest to the glory of a bygone era when going to the movies was a major form of entertainment for the Australian family. In this talk, Dr Peter Sheridan, an internationally respected collector, historian and lecturer in the field of Art Deco design, will explore the history and beauty of these iconic buildings.



Book Launch – The World We Want: The New York Herald Tribune World Youth Forum & the Cold War Teenager



Exilio (Exiled): Chile to south-west Sydney


Exhibition at Liverpool Regional Museum until 28 September 2024

Tony Nolan has worked with the local Chilean community to curate an exhibition about the Chilean people who migrated to Sydney as a result of the military coup led by General Pinochet in 1973. The exhibition uses oral testimony, which is presented in a two channel video installation.

RAHS Councillor Alison Wishart's review of the exhibition will be published in the Oral History Australia journal later in the year. Here is an excerpt:

The video installation, *Echoes of Hope: from Allende to Australia*, was created by professional videographer and community worker, Milena Sanhueza Ben-David. She sees it as 'a testament to the indomitable human spirit and the power of community in the face of adversity'. Like her video subjects, Sanhueza Ben-David and her family were forced to flee Chile as a result of the coup. Having a shared country of origin, language, and experience of exile helps her to achieve an affinity with her subjects that other oral historians would have to work harder to develop.

Villawood: Between Hope and Hopelessness

Exhibition at Fairfield City Museum and Gallery until 19 October 2024

RAHS Councillor Alison Wishart's review of the exhibition is published in the *History Australia* journal. Here is an excerpt:

A new social history exhibition at the Fairfield City Museum & Gallery unpeels the layers of the Villawood onion. *Villawood: Between Hope and Hopelessness* takes a place-based approach to the history of the site, about 25 km west of Sydney's CBD. This is something locally based libraries and museums are best placed to do. Researching the history of a site or house using records held by local councils (such as valuation books and development applications) is core business for local history librarians. By revealing the layers of land use on the site that is now occupied by the Villawood Immigration Detention Centre (VIDC), this exhibition subtly draws attention to the irony embedded in its history and the dramatic change in Australia's immigration policy.
