Overview of August meeting

Another fabulous meeting was held at the NFHS rooms and via Zoom on Tuesday 6 August 2024. We had a great turnout with 38 members and visitors in the rooms and three on Zoom. It was very obvious that people had a great interest in the topic being presented - Picturing Watt Street: A look at Newcastle's old town through paintings, photos and other visual sources.

Dr Ann Hardy, Coordinator of the CLX and digitisation projects under living history initiative at the University of Newcastle, was our guest speaker tonight. Ann has done some amazing work at the Uni and is very passionate about the Watt Street area and the early history of Newcastle. Ann showed us some amazing photos and maps and gave a great description of each. Here I have selected a couple of the photos however to see the whole presentation, click here. You won't be disappointed.

The above image is an engraving that depicts the area from a different angle to what we often see. Mostly we see images showing Nobbys and the beautiful view that goes up to Port Stephens. This image is fairly unique in that it is taken from Fletcher Park on the coastline looking back over towards the Cathedral. Although Newcastle was a place of secondary punishment with harsh treatment of convicts, this image shows scenes that are actually quite beautiful. There is not much sign of heavy industry or even convict labour. The theme through a lot of photos at the time shows Aboriginal people depicted in the area and some of the really early maps and plans show exactly where the natives were along the shoreline. This image shows what was called the Government Gardens. The Government farm was further down where the old

Palais site was and it went right down to the river. The Government Gardens were however on a nice gradual slope down from King Edward Park. They ended in what we now know as Church Street where the James Fletcher hospital site was. It was a fairly fertile area and had a natural stream that ran through the middle. This is interesting in the way it's been created because we have someone who has drawn it and then the engraver, so it's a real collaboration between the Government officials and Lycett.



Ferdinand Bauer, a natural history illustrator of mainly plants, drew the above scene in 1804. This copy of the original sketch by Bauer

was created on linen in the 1860s. No-one seems to know where the original sketch is. It is interesting to note that this was the only landscape drawing Bauer did in the colony and that he chose to do it of Newcastle. It shows what became Watt Street. You can see a cottage at the middle right of the image which is probably the first Government House because it is quite large compared to other buildings. It is known that the first Government House was built in 1804 and that it was a pre-fabricated house brought on a boat. In the centre, huts and tents can be seen. On the centre left-hand side, in the area that was referred to as Prospect Hill, there is interesting imagery which maybe something to do with testing and prospecting

for coal. Early descriptions of Newcastle stating that the area looked like sheep pasture are pretty accurate. There were also quite a few trees and even though there is a lot of grass on the slopy area which later became known as The Sand Hills once the trees were removed, it is obvious that the stability of the vegetation was pretty much intact in that area.

There were many more extremely interesting photos in Ann's presentation and I would urge you to watch it by clicking on the link at the beginning of this article. The photos in the presentation show a huge transition in the landscape of the area of Watt Street and Ann's commentary is full of history.

Thanks so much Ann for such an informative visual step back in time.


