Progress Update on History House

We would like to share some updates on the work happening at History House as we have made solid progress since reopening in May 2024.

A key focus has been addressing the roof, which has faced issues due to its age and runoff from nearby high-rise buildings. We've developed a comprehensive waterproofing solution, including improved drainage, to effectively manage rainwater and protect the building's structure.

We've also identified some subsidence issues affecting the sandstone entrance and the ground floor. Our engineers are investigating and will begin stabilising the foundation soon to ensure the building's long-term stability.

As with all heritage buildings, the process can be slow and requires careful planning and extensive paperwork. We are aiming to complete the structural work by April–May 2025, after which we will shift our focus to conservation efforts, including restoring the sandstone façade.

In our last e-news, we highlighted local speakers and topics. Today, we want to showcase other exciting subjects at the conference.

On Saturday morning, we will be joined by eminent historian **Mark McKenna**, who will present the <u>Lesley Muir Address</u> on *Writing a 'Local' History of Australia*. Mark will explain how local history will form the foundation of his forthcoming short history of Australia, which will be published by Black Inc later this year. As Mark says, 'All too often, history is filed according to its geographical span – local, regional, state, national or global – as if certain histories are only of interest to certain readers. But how can we challenge and enlarge our view of Australian history by dismantling these boundaries? And how might close observation of local history help to radically shift our understanding of the writing of Australian history?'

Conference delegates will also have an exclusive opportunity to explore the

innkeeper Michael Byrne, the son of an Irish convict. Glenalvon was restored in 1970 and is the home of the Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society.

On Sunday afternoon, we will be joined by **Gizette Waldron** (Geographical Names Board) and **Sarah Middleton-Jones** (Reserve Bank of Australia Archivist). Gizette will give delegates an introduction to Place Naming in NSW and explain how local historical societies can contribute historical place name information. Sarah will showcase the RBA's digital archives platform, *Unreserved*, which makes the bank's collection of economic and financial records available to researchers.

Government Responds to Concerns About Changes to Not-for-Profit Reporting

The Assistant Minister for Charities, Dr Andrew Leigh, has responded to the Royal Australian Historical Society's concerns regarding changes to income tax regulations for not-for-profit (NFP) historical societies. The RAHS asked that the not-for-profit income regulations be changed so that NFP local and community history associations would be classified as cultural associations and for an increase in the revenue threshold.


The ATO will adopt a practical compliance approach, allowing organisations additional time to submit their returns, with a deadline extension to 31 March

2025. For those unable to lodge online, a telephone service will be available.

He also encouraged historical societies to explore registering as charities if they advance education or culture, making them eligible for additional tax benefits. The Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) has developed a self-assessment tool to assist organisations in determining their eligibility for charity registration, which can be accessed at www.acnc.gov.au/charity-registration-self-assessment

The RAHS also wants to highlight the <u>ACNC free online training</u> available on Future Learn for historical societies that currently do not have charity status but are considering applying. The training contains courses to ensure that your historical society keeps its charity status once you are approved.



Prefabrication played an important role in Australia from the first European settlement onwards, and more examples survive here than anywhere else in the world. They include wooden houses from Singapore (none of which survive in Singapore itself), English iron buildings of the 1850s (only one of which survives in Britain), plate iron buildings from Glasgow, like the Legislative Council building in Macquarie Street (none in Scotland), redwood buildings from the USA (none), and others from Germany, France and Italy. Most are of great historical and technical interest.



Peninsula Campaign of the American Civil War: The Equation Changes, March-July 1862



John will explain how this campaign was the Union's first major attempt to capture the Confederacy's capital at Richmond in a flanking movement up Southern-held territory, with the hope of bringing the war to a swift end. The campaign's failure was disastrous for the North, prolonging the war for three more bloody years.

In this workshop participants will be commencing a replica of a sun bonnet similar to a hat made and worn by Female Convicts.

Workshop led by the talented Lyn Watkins, crafter and descendant of Factory women

Straw plaiting was one of the numerous occupations of the convict women transported to the Colony of NSW. There were a number of women in the Female Factory with this skill and trade - all manner of household items and practical goods were made from plaited straw. A plaited straw hat or a bonnet was an essential item of clothing in such a hot climate and for women, an adornment when trimmed with a ribbon or two.








Hardy Wilson's Old Colonial Architecture 1924-2024

Published in 1924, Hardy Wilson's book *Old Colonial Architecture in New South Wales and Tasmania* was the first major publication dedicated to the documentation and conservation of Australian buildings. 100 years on, this exhibition draws attention to the book's creation, examines its enduring presence and influence in Australian architecture, and contextualises it in Wilson's biography and wider body of published work.

This exhibition was curated by Associate Professor Cameron Logan (Sydney School of Architecture, Design and Planning) and Hector Abrahams and Olivia Salkeld (Hector Abrahams Architects) in collaboration with Rare Books and Special Collections.
