2024 Cultural Grants Recipients

RAHS President Dr Iain Stuart announced today that twenty-one local history projects will receive funding from the 2024 Cultural Grants Program. This grant program is administered by the RAHS on behalf of the NSW Government.

'The Royal Australian Historical Society thanks Create NSW for funding this grants program which supports local and community history projects. These projects provide unique insights into the people and places of NSW and strengthen community connections through preserving and sharing our histories. History is preserved and passed on at the local level through communities interested in our history and by the individuals working in community groups. Without this grant funding, many shared histories and local history resources would be lost to us,' explained Dr Stuart.

The NSW Cultural Grants recipients cover a diverse range of projects, including research, publications, and conservation through digitisation projects.

New Information Board Unveiled for Hume and Hovell's Historic Expedition

On 2 October 2024, RAHS Vice President Carol Liston and RAHS Librarian

Donna Newton attended the unveiling of a new information board to

commemorate the bicentenary of Hamilton Hume and William Hovell's overland
expedition to Port Phillip. The two explorers set out from Appin in 1824. The
board is located on Appin Road, between Campbelltown and Appin, near the
remains of Hume's cottage, 'Brookdale'. The board shares its location with a

The celebrations began at the Harlequin Rugby Union Club, where Phil Hayward, Chairman of the Surveying Heritage Group, gave a welcoming speech. After a coach trip along Appin Road to the monument site, the ceremony consisted of unveiling the board and speeches by project coordinator Pat Duffy, NSW Surveyor-General Narelle Underwood, MP Greg Warren, Council deputy GM Ben Hoyle, and Mitch Hanlon from the Institution of Surveyors NSW.

After returning to the club for lunch, Stephen Coppins, President of the Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society, and Bob Hanna of the Institution of Surveyors NSW's Surveying Heritage Group gave presentations. Along with officials, dignitaries, and other guests, attendees included several descendants of the Hume, Fitzpatrick, Boyd, and Bollard families. The day was a fitting 200th-anniversary celebration for the explorers.



It provides insights into the experiences of Australians before, during and after the war, whether they were combatants or civilians, or soldiers' wives or parents.





The Finding of Montevideo Maru

The loss of the *Montevideo Maru* is the worst maritime disaster in Australian history, and for 81 years, until 2023, the exact location of its final resting place remained a mystery. The ship sank with at least 850 Australian service members and 210 civilians. The tragedy has transcended generations and reminds us of the human cost of conflict.

Andrea Williams was part of the 2023 Silentworld Expedition team that found the wreck of the *Montevideo Maru*. Its discovery in the South China Sea, off the coast of the Philippines, made headlines worldwide. Andrea will share the significance of this expedition and behind-the-scenes insights into the remarkable discovery and identification of the *Montevideo Maru*.



How The Railways Made Bundanoon

The Bundanoon History Group's latest exhibition, *How The Railways Made Bundanoon*, opens in the Old Goods Shed on 26 October. The exhibition looks at how Bundanoon developed with the advent of the railway and declined in the 1950s and 1960s as the motor car became the dominant form of transport.

Her Topic

Bennelong & Phillip: A History Unravelled

Bennelong and Phillip were leaders of their respective people in the first encounters between Britain and Indigenous Australians, Phillip the colony's first governor, and Bennelong the Yiyura leader. The pair have come to represent the conflict that flared and has never settled.



Kate Fullagar's new book, Bennelong & Phillip: A History Unravelled, is the first full biography of Bennelong of any kind and it challenges many misconceptions, among them that he became alienated from his people and that Phillip was a paragon of Enlightenment benevolence. It tells the story of the men's marriages, including Bennelong's best-known wife, Barangaroo, and Phillip's unusual domestic arrangements, and places the period in the context of the Aboriginal world and the demands of empire.

To present this history afresh, Fullagar narrated these events in reverse order. In this lecture, she will discuss both her method and her research, asking questions of both conventional ways of writing history and of the role of the past in debates about nations and Indigenous possibility.

IT'S A RIOT!



FRIDAY 25th OCTOBER 2024 - IT'S A RIOT! - ANNUAL RIOT DAY

Join us as we commemorate the Parramatta Female Factory Riot of 197 years ago. On the 27th October 1827, 100 convict women were missing at the morning Muster and within hours, Parramatta Town was in uproar! The convict women, hungry and fed up with the reduction in rations and their appalling living and working conditions, broke out of the Factory and Penitentiary onto the streets of Parramatta town 'like Amazonian Banditti...and pouring forth 'as bees from a hive...' alarming all before them!

This iconic Annual Parramatta event is on Friday 25th October 2024 at the National Heritage Parramatta Female Factory & Institutions Precinct, 5 Fleet Street, North Parramatta, opening at 9:00am.

Events include an Opening Ceremony followed by a Commemoration at the Bicentenary Commemorative Wall commencing at 11:00am. As a lone piper plays, we will remember the convict women whose lives were cruelly impacted by forced removal from their homelands and kin, through transportation - floral tributes will be laid at the Bicentenary Commemorative Wall This will be followed with the Opening of the Parramatta Female Factory Friends Research Centre & Babette Smith Collection by Dr. Andrew Charlton MP, Federal Member for Parramatta, Meg Keneally and Tom Keneally AO, PFFF Patrons. Take the opportunity to explore this uniquely Parramatta Female Factory focussed collection, for convict and family history research.

Walk in the convict women's footsteps with tours at 9:30am and 1:30pm which will include rare access to one of the three Factory period buildings on site - the haunting 3rd class Penitentiary (c1823-1826), still resounding to the echo of rock breaking and the convict women's chatter!

The Annual Thomas Keneally Lecture (12.00pm) will be delivered this year by eminent historian Assoc. Prof. Hamish Maxwell Stewart, topic: "Fighting Back: Female Convict Labour & Resistance in Convict Australia".


