Reflecting on the Success of the 2024 RAHS Conference in Campbelltown

The 2024 RAHS Conference, themed *Windows into Local History*, brought together members of historical societies, history enthusiasts, and those eager to delve into local history. Held in Campbelltown on Dharawal Country, the event commenced with a pre-conference gathering at the Campbelltown Arts Centre, hosted by the Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society. Attendees connected over drinks and were welcomed by Campbelltown's newly elected Mayor, Cr. Darcy Lound, who emphasised the importance of preserving local heritage.

The conference officially opened with a heartfelt Welcome to Country by Aunty Glenda Chalker of the Dharawal people, whose ancestors endured the Appin Massacre—a significant chapter in New South Wales' history. The site was acknowledged with a <u>State Heritage listing</u> in 2022.

Emeritus Professor Mark McKenna delivered the keynote Lesley Muir Address, exploring how local histories can reshape our understanding of Australia's national narrative. His insights highlighted the profound role of community stories in shaping our collective history.

Launch of the Digitised Settlers' Muster Book 1800

A rare surviving record of European settlers in Australia has been digitised. The 1800 Settlers' Muster Book is held by the NSW Parliamentary Library. Inscribed on the UNESCO Australian Memory of the World Register in 2021, it is the earliest, most comprehensive record of the colony. Compiled by Governors Hunter and King to establish the demands on government resources, it lists the military, their convict servants, the emancipated convicts and their families in a series of returns. Historians have known the names since the publication in 1988 of the 'red book' – *The Musters and Lists New South Wales and Norfolk Island 1800–1802*, edited by Carol Baxter.

The Settlers' Muster Book is not a complete muster but a series of lists showing how many people had to be fed, how many acres were farmed, who were the farmers, what crops were grown, and who was relying on the government to feed their convict servants. Women and children appear usually only as numbers – one woman off stores, three children on stores – but family historians will recognise the composition of these households. Lists of convict work gangs reveal how the government allocated this labour to build and maintain the colony's infrastructure.

The digitisation is a collaboration between the NSW Parliamentary Library and Museums of History NSW and the digital copy is freely available on their websites. Parliamento is the new image database of the NSW Parliament. It will include images and archives from the Parliament's collections. Turn the pages of the Settlers' Muster Book 1800, search for names and enlarge the images to see the rough paper, the pencil drafts and the inked-in entries.

Celebrating 10 Years of the Transport Heritage Grants at History House

Transport Heritage NSW announced the 2024 Transport Heritage Grants recipients at History House on Saturday, 19 October. The 2024 program marked a significant milestone, as the Transport Heritage Grants celebrated 10 years of helping to preserve and promote New South Wales' rich transport heritage. Since its inception, the program has awarded over \$1.7 million to 47 organisations, supporting 132 projects that bring rail, bus, tram, and maritime history to life. Many local historical societies have benefited from the program. In 2022, the Albury and District Historical Society, for example, received \$4,200 for *Connecting the NSW and Victorian Railway Systems*.

This year's program awarded more than \$180,000 to 14 projects. In a first, more Category 2 'Education, Interpretation, Exhibition and Publication' projects were funded than Category 1 'Restoration and Conservation' projects. This year's projects also represent the biggest geographic reach than in previous years. Learn more about the 2024 Transport Heritage Grants. Back to Black: The David Jones Family in Strathfield

Archaeology at Parramatta

Georgia Wright will discuss archaeological excavations at the new Parramatta metro station site that were commenced in 2022 and are now 60 per cent complete. The 23,000 square metre area is being excavated in stages, with work to continue through to the end of 2025. The site once contained wetlands, which provided a rich resource for the Burramattagal people. It is also located in the centre of the early town of Parramatta, which was laid out from about 1790 to 1792. The excavations are providing an understanding of both its Deep Time past and interactions between Burramattagal and colonists following the British occupation of Parramatta in 1788. The excavations are also providing new information about the early colonial settlement, adaption to a new environment, local manufacturing, and the evolution of the township of Parramatta into the city it is today. With thousands of artefacts found so far, analysis is in its early stages. Georgia's talk will explore some of the key findings and artefacts from the site to date.



Knowledge for a Nation: Origins of the Royal Society of NSW by Blue Mountains historian Dr Anne Coote tells the early history of a learned society still active in the intellectual culture of twenty-first-century Australia. Hopes and
