'Zell Meehan V Newcastle City Council (1956): The right of women to continue working after marriage'

Meeting will be held in the rooms and via Zoom

Zell Meehan nee Burke (1918-1998) was 'Newcastle through and through'. Born in Wallsend, she was educated at Plattsburg Public School and Newcastle Girls High. Zell received a scholarship to Sydney Teachers College but her family could not afford for her to accept it. Instead, she studied at Newcastle Business College and became a secretary at the Council's Electricity Supply Department in late 1936. Progressing up the ladder, Zell was appointed secretary to the Lord Mayor Harry Quinlan in 1950. In 1956, aged 37, Zell married and was expected to resign, as was the custom of the time. However Zell refused to do so, and the then Lord Mayor Doug McDougall supported her decision. The Town Clerk and Alderman Charlie Jones (ALP) amongst others, were adamantly against her staying.

To learn more about Zell and the outcome of this battle, either come to the talk at the rooms, or join by Zoom. It will be a very interesting presentation.




