In Memory of Rappville District Pioneers - 22 Trees Planted

Northern Star, Wednesday 21 September 1938, page 3

Twenty-two trees in memory of the pioneers of the Rappville districts, were planted at Rappville on Saturday in the presence of a large attendance, including visitors from Casino and Grafton. The ceremony was organised by the advisory committee of the Rappville Junior Farmers' club, members of which, with the assistance of the junior members, prepared the site and erected the necessary guards. References to the early days of Rappville were made by Mr. C. H. Anderson, of Casino, and a comprehensive review of the district's growth was prepared and read by Mr. K. Muir head, secretary of the J.F. Club.

Proceedings opened with the singing of "Advance Australia Fair" by the school children. Mr. S. Cole, president of the J.F. Club, welcomed the visitors and read apologies from Messrs. T. S. Cole (Busby's Flat), Edward Bailey Snr (Myrtle Creek), G. E. Cole (Casino), A. E. Bailey (South Grafton), Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Bailey (Murwillumbah), Mrs. M. Armstrong (Maclean) and Miss G. Glasby (Bonalbo). The children recited the poem "Trees" and John Bailey, junior president, declared that the members had been pleased to assist at the ceremony.

52 YEARS AGO

Mr. C. H. Anderson, who first went to the Rappville district 52 years ago, spoke reminiscently of his experiences and recounted the many hardships with which the pioneers had to contend. Fifty-two years ago, he had come to that part of the district known as Karwong. He selected land there, then a part of the old Wooroowoolgen station, which was enlarged by the purchase of Hogarth's Wyan station, Robertson's Mongogaries sheep run, and Ellangowan. It extended to Bungawalbyn Creek and had an area of 600 square miles. The head station was about four miles from Casino and the Wooroowoolgen station at one time carried more than 25,000 head of stock. In 1889 Mr. H. V. Rapp took up land and built his home on the Red Hill. He owned a considerable area, known as the Rapp Estate and for many years carried on business as butcher and hotelkeeper. In 1905 Murray Bros, erected a sawmill on the eastern side of the railway station, which was known as Murray's Siding, but eventually the name was changed to Rappville.

Mr. Anderson said that in addition to himself some of the pioneers still living were Mr. Edward Bailey Snr. (Myrtle Creek), Mr. J. Bennett (Clear field), Mr. T. M. Crisp (Coombell), Mr. H. Clark (formerly of Wyan, but now of Casino) and Mr. W. J. Lollback (Busby's Flat).

DESERVED HONOUR

Rev. F. A. G. Woodger (vice-president of the J.F.C. advisory committee), spoke of the work of the pioneers, adding that they deserved the honour being paid to them by the planting of the trees. Mr. Woodger added that on the western side of the town 18 trees were planted in memory of young men of Rappville district who had paid the supreme sacrifice at the Great War, and on the eastern side would be the 22 trees they were that day planting in honour of the pioneers of the district, who also, made sacrifices and suffered hardships in making homes for themselves. He urged the people of the district to do their part by seeing that the trees received proper care and attention.

DISTRICT DEVELOPMENT

An interesting survey of the development of the district was prepared and read by Mr. K. Muirhead, teacher at the Rappville school and secretary of the Junior Farmer's Club. In 1870 there was very little settlement in the district. Busby's Flat was named after a Mr. Busby who,

in 1870, while droving sheep looking for grass, grazed his flock there for several months. In the early days everything was transported from Lawrence to Tenterfield, and Wyan and Busby's Flat were recognised as regular camping places. A Mr. Luke was the first selector, with 300 acres which, after three years he sold to Mr. George Lollback, Snr. In 1871 Mr. Lollback acquired additional land. Later his son, Mr. W. J. Lollback, selected a property on which he grew corn. This was a payable proposition as at that time numerous horse teams were engaged in carrying goods from Lawrence to Tenterfield.

BUSBY'S FLAT

Mr. Jacob Lollback was the first white child born at Busby's Flat. The first post office, known as Murraygang, was kept by Miss Crane, who later married Mr. T. S. Cole. The mail contractor was Mr. Warne, who made trips twice a week. Subsequently Mr. Bannance ran a three-horse coach from Lawrence to Tenterfield. The first school was erected in 1877, with Miss Walsh as teacher. Mr. Whitside conducted a store and accommodation house on the roadside near Busby's Flat, now Piora. Timber was all pit-sawn and the first mill was erected in 1912. At the present time it is operated by Messrs. Slade Bros., of Brisbane. A well-known landmark, the stone chimney, still stands of Mr. W. J. Lollback's property. It was cut from solid rock by a Scottish stonemason, Mr. J. Maclean.

The first settler in the Wyan district was Mr. T. E. Smith, a grazier, who later established a general store there. In 1894 St. Aidan's Church was built on land given by Mrs. George Clark, mother of Mr. H. Clark, of Casino. It later became the parish church. In 1910 the Wyan parochial district was taken out of Casino parish and again absorbed after 18 months separation and eventually included with Rappville, forming the Wyan-Rappville parish. The first clergyman was the Rev. H A. Murphy and the first marriage in the church was that of Mr. E. J. Bailey, of Myrtle Creek, and Miss May Booth, of Wyan. The first child baptised in the church was Eva, daughter of the late H. V. Rapp and Mrs. Rapp and the first boy was Mr G. E. Cole, of Casino. The first burial was that of Beatrice Clark, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Clark. Mr. H. Clark conducted the first hotel in Wyan and is the oldest district pioneer. He at present resides at Casino and is 83 years of age.

MYRTLE CREEK

Mr. R. McDonald was the first selector on Myrtle Creek, obtaining a free grant of 230 acres in 1860. Later he selected 1280 acres adjoining. Mr. B. Sellars was the next inhabitant of the district and kept an accommodation house. Mr. Greenstreet purchased Mr. McDonald's property and was granted a license for a hotel. He also established a general store and butcher's shop. In those days two mails were received each week from Lawrence and Casino. In 1887 Mr. Morrison, of Copmanhurst, selected an area known as the Six Mile big swamp which later was drained by the settlers. Mr. H. V. Rapp selected in 1889, followed by Messrs. G. Mc Kee T. A. Smith, E. Bailey, W. M Bucklan, H. Henderson, J. Bennett, C.H. Greensheet. —: Hilliard, and J. McKee. Mr. Flannagan selected there in the following year. The Baptists built a church on Mr. E. Bailey's property in 1907. High floods were experienced in 1887 and 1901 and before the construction of the bridge settlers experienced difficulty in transporting their goods and produce to market. Before dairying commenced Mr E. Bailey commenced cheese making and afterwards inaugurated the first cream run to Casino. The first school was built on Mr. Buckland's property with Mr. Caldwell in charge. The first goods train ran on September 19, 1904, and the first passenger train (bi-weekly) on March 7, 1905. Saw milling operations were begun by Murray Bros. in 1905. In 1906 Mr. H. V. Rapp built a dance hall on the western side on the township. The first school opened at Rappville was a private school. Later the department opened a school with Miss Brookes in charge. Miss Brookes was accidentally killed in a riding accident. George Rapp was the first white child born in Rappville. Many native corroborees were held in the district on what is now known as the Olive Estate, where the ring is still preserved. Gorge Watt, "king" of Wyan, one of the leaders, was presented with a brass plate by the Governor. The plate has been presented to the J.F. Club by Mrs. H V. Rapp, Jnr. Mr. C. H. Anderson, of Casino, selected the property known as Karwang Karwong and cut the first timber for the homes of Messrs. H. V. Rapp and H. O. Wilson. Mr H. O. Wilson selected "Braemar" ' in 1889. St. John's Church, Rappville was built in 1910 and the Roman Catholic Church at Myrtle Creek in 1912.



TREES PLANTED

Twenty-two trees were planted first, by first-class Const. Duff, in honour of the King. Other trees were planted by Mrs. H. V. Rapp (Grafton), Mr. C.H. Anderson (Casino), Mr. and Mrs. H. Clark, Mrs. S. Collis, Mr. J. A Cairns Mr. C. S. Cole, Rev. F.A.G. Woodger, Messrs. Muirhead, Andrew Burnett, D. Bailey, E W Brewer, A. James, Blanchfield, G Gulliver, W. Reeves, R. Hunter, E. Collis A. Gallagher, Masters J. Cole, Reg Small, Harry Duff. Messrs. J. A. Cairns, C. S Cole and D. Bailey had charge of the arrangements during the ceremony and Mr. K. Muirhead was secretary. Afternoon tea was provided and serv ed by the ladies, to whom a vote of thanks was carried at the instance of Mr. Woodger. Mr. C. S. Cole then formally handed over the trees to the district as a memorial to the pioneers.


A WEDDING PHOTOGRAPH IDENTIFIED

My dad lived on the family farm, near Coraki, that had belonged to his grandfather Patrick Casey. Dad had kept all the historical family photos in a drawer. What a treasure trove this collection is. I found this beautiful large wedding photo in the drawer (about A4 size). The back of the photo had one clue to the identity of the bridal party, the words "Larry's Jack"

So, as I am so into family history, I searched through all the family names, and nicknames, to find that "Larry" is Lawrence Birmingham, Dad's uncle, and "Jack" is his son, John Joseph Birmingham, Dad's cousin. My searches indicated that the Larry married Agatha Nolan on 6 June 1917 at Coraki, NSW.

A quick search of Trove and the local newspapers and I had found a lovely article about the wedding. This led me to identify each of the people in the photo.

BIRMINGHAM— NOLAN.

Flags at every masthead, decorated flagpoles, 'dressed' steamers, the joyous tooting of steam whistles, and other manifestations of gaiety and goodwill were all in evidence at Coraki on Wednesday morning in connection with the Birmingham-Nolan marriage. The bridegroom was John, eldest son of Mr. L. Birmingham, of Sandy Creek, and the bride

Agatha, eldest daughter of Ald. W. Nolan, and Mrs. Nolan, Mayor and Mayoress of Coraki. Tho ceremony took place at St. Joseph's R.C. Church, which was crowded with friends and well-wishers of the contracting parties, wide public interest being centred in the nuptials. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion, lilies, sweet peas, and asparagus fern being chiefly employed, while above the bride was suspended a charming wedding bell, constructed of arum lilies, white sweet peas and asparagus fern.

The decorations were the work of the "Sisters," and the bell made by Mrs. Blakeney, Snr. The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a lovely dress of hand embroidered of crepe de chine, court train lined with pale blue ninon, and finished with tulle roses. The hand embroidered veil was worn mob cap fashion, with circlet of orange blossoms. The bride wore a valuable diamond cluster ring, and carried a bouquet of roses, arum lilies, sweet peas and asparagus fern, both being gifts of the bridegroom. Her attendants were Misses Nellie Birmingham, sister of the bridegroom, and Nellie Nolan, sister of the bride, the former wearing nattier blue crepe de chine with picture hat to match, and the latter pale pink crepe de chine, picture hat to match.

Little Gladys Bugden was train bearer, and wore white China silk, trimmed torchon, pale blue sash. The bridesmaids carried bouquets of sweet peas, roses and asparagus fern, and three attendants also wore gold bangles, both bouquets and bangles being gifts of the bridegroom. The bride's gift to the bridegroom was a set of gold sleeve links. Mr. K. Nolan (bride's brother) attended as best man, and Miss Olive Kelly played the voluntary during the signing of the register, and the Wedding March subsequently.

After the ceremony at the church, a reception was held at the Coraki Hotel, the residence of the bride's parents, and attended only by the immediate relations of the contracting parties. After the newly wedded couple had received the congratulations of the gathering, the wedding breakfast, served on the spacious and gaily decorated balcony, was partaken of. Dean Kiely presided, and the 'proceedings throughout were marked with geniality and enthusiasm. The beautifully prepared repast having been thoroughly enjoyed, and the handsome wedding cake duly cut by the bride, a sheaf of congratulatory telegrams from all parts of the State was read, and the toast list entered, upon.

The Dean, in proposing 'The Health of the Newly Wedded Couple,' said the union that day would cement more firmly than ever the good relations hitherto existing between two of the district's oldest and best families. Not so very long ago, it seemed, both the bride and bridegroom, were children together, now each had made an excellent choice, and they carried into their new life the heartiest good wishes and esteem of all who know them. The bridegroom, in acknowledgment, said he had to thank the proposer of the toast for his kind remarks, and the friends who had presented him and his bride with so many valuable gifts. Mr. M. Birmingham proposed 'The Bridesmaids,' Mr. K. Nolan responding.

Mr. Walter Birmingham, in submitting the toast of the parents of 'The Bride and Bridegroom," said that he had known the parents of the bride ever since he could remember, and a better couple no man could wish to meet. Mr. Nolan always stood high in public esteem. The same might be said, too, of Mr. L. Birmingham. It was an honour to propose a toast of this character where, the parties were so well and favourably known. Mr. Nolan, in response, said it was a privilege for the parents to be present on an occasion of this character to see their children well and happily married. Especially was it a pleasure for him to see his own parents here to witness their grand-child's marriage. So long as the young couple were faithful to their church and loyal to each other, they would get along together. He wished them all happiness and prosperity. Father Cullen (Ballina)

responded in happy vein on behalf of Mr. and Mrs. L. Birmingham, and endorsed the advice given to the newly wedded pair by Mr. Nolan. He added his personal congratulations to the bride and bridegroom. Mr. L. Birmingham gave 'The Press,' and Mr. Nolan that of 'The Chairman."

Later on, the happy young couple left by car for Casino, on a motor trip to Sydney via the coast route. The bride's going away dress was an old gold silk gabardine, hand embroidered, with black mirror velvet hat, trimmed pom poms, tipped with gold. With this she wore a handsome set of black furs, the gift of the bride's brother, Kyran.

The wedding presents made a fine display. They included: — Bride's mother, household linen; bride's father, cheque; bridegroom's father, cheque; Mrs. L. Birmingham, silver tea pot; Misses N. and C. Birmingham, fruit and flower stand; Miss N. Nolan, drawing room lamp; Miss Marie Nolan, doyleys, cushion cover; Mrs. K. Nolan, cheque; V. and T. Birmingham, set silver salt collars; Mr G. Rankin (Gilgandra), Mr. H. E. Pidcock (Tatham), Mr. Jas. Bugden, Mrs. R. Bugden, Mr. W. Molloy, Mr. W. Birmingham, Mr. Maurice Birmingham, Mr. Michael Birmingham, Mr. Thos. Birmingham Snr., Mr. J. Birmingham (Tatham), Mr. F. Bugden, Mr. Pelletier, cheques; Mr. Cohen (Lismore), silver hot-water jug; Mrs. W. Birmingham, set silver vases; Mr. and Mrs. P. Goulding, silver sugar basin and silver butter dish; Mr. J, Sheridan, silver butter dish; Mrs. T. Moroney, silver butter dish; Mrs. J. Bugden, silver honey jar; Mr. and Mrs. A. Bugden, silver jam dish; Miss F. Bugden, set vases; Mrs. Gillingham, silver biscuit barrel; Miss Olsen, set salad dishes; Mr. and Mrs. Cogar, silver mounted jam dish; Mr. and Mrs. Moylan, water jug and glasses; Miss C. Pidcock (Tatham), fancy work; Mr. and Mrs. J. Joyce, water bottle and glass; Mrs. J. Nolan, cushion (fancy); Mrs. McLennan, set glass dishes; Mr. M. Maloney, gold pin.

Edmund King & Mary Ing - by Kaylene Morris


My three times great grandfather Edmund (Edmond) King was born in Sydenham, Oxfordshire, England on 3 March 1800 and was baptised 16 March 1800 in the Church of England Oxfordshire. His parents were Edward King (1781-1859) and Mary Orr or Barrott (1780-1804) Edward and Mary were possibly married 1799. A younger sister Ann to Edmund was baptised on 13th Feb 1803 but sadly died 20th October 1804. Edmund's mother Mary died a few weeks later on the 7th December 1804 leaving Edward and Edmund alone. It was nearly two years, before Edward King remarried. On the 1st October 1806, in Aston Rowant, Oxfordshire he married Alice Flitt (1785-1855). Edward and Alice had ten children.

Edmund's father and stepmother were still having children when Edmund married Mary Ing on 10 Nov 1821 in Aston Rowant, Oxfordshire. Mary born 1st August 1802 was the daughter of John Ing and Anne Flecher or Fletcher. Edmund and Mary's children were all born in England before they emigrated to Australia in 1845 per "Elizabeth". Here they hoped to make a new life. This period was when there was a shortage of food in England and families were encouraged to emigrate using the Bounty System. Several of Edmund's cousins also came to Australia settling in Western Australia, Victoria and a half brother James (1828-1895) with his wife Sally Holland settled much later in Queensland.

After arriving in Australia Edmund started recording his children's births in his bible, which was probably a 'going away gift' from his family in England. Edmund and Mary's family as per the family Bible, which is in possession of my mother. The top section of the page says:

"Edmund which was the son of Edward King, which was the son of Edmund King".

The Bible was a great help when searching records, where names are common. Edmund listed all his children and their births, plus some deaths.



Children of Edmund King & Mary Ing

- 1. John born April 27th 1822 but died May 8th 1822.
- 2. Joseph born June 1823, baptised 29th June 1823.
- 3. Edmund junior born 29th July 1825.
- 4. John (2nd) was born 17th Dec 1827and died 20th July 1848 of a disease of the heart in Sydney, New South Wales Australia. Many researchers have him marrying and dying in 1890's.
- 5. Mary Ann was born May 5th 1831, and died 18thFeb 1862 as Mrs George Wells Watling.
- 6. Eleazer King was born September 29th 1833.
- 7. Caleb King (my great, great grandfather) born August 8th 1835
- 8. William King born October 25th 1837
- 9. Still born August 15th Edmund didn't record the year. Using the dates of the previous and the next child it is presumed it was August 15th 1838.
- 10. Christopher born June 26th 1840
- 11. Arabella born July 4th 1842
- 12. Benjamin born March 15th died a few hours after. There was no year beside this entry and it is presumed to be 1843 or 1844.

The bottom of the page gives a note about Edmund's wife Mary-

"My beloved wife died or rather fell asleep in Jesus on September 1874 aged 72".

Edmund lived to 1882 and lived some of that time with his youngest daughter Arabella and her husband Abraham Quinsey.


