Welcome to our summer edition of the Newsletter. The New Year is shaping up with activities already, regardless of the heat, rain and thunderstorm that have been this summer!



This year has started with a flurry and the surprising news of a precinct-wide rezoning application by the NSW State Government. The National Heritage Listing areas are excluded from this but have the potential for significant impact on the site. While the footprint has no signs of new buildings, the curtilage directly north and east do, so our advocacy is very much needed at this time with vigilance and sharing information critical to the direct context of the Parramatta Female Factory. The building numbers and heights will be the potential impact and should not be 20⁺ storeys as requested by private development previously. For the details go to:



HISTORY CORNER - The Fleet Street Quarry, North Parramatta

Directly opposite the Parramatta Female Factory site entrance, there is a rather secret place - the site of the Fleet Street Quarry. It was here that the stone for the Factory and later Asylum buildings was quarried as well as the stone for the kerbing along Church Street Parramatta and the Parramatta Goal. The Quarry was operational from the early 1800s to the 1890s.

Today, the rich source of sandstone is still evident and the stairs to Albert Street above are well-worn. It is worth a wander across Fleet Street, stand awhile and imagine the activity here two hundred years ago!

In 1825, four female convict ships arrived in Port Jackson. They were the ships Mariner, Midas, Henry and Grenada. As always, a close look at extracts from the ship's journal and ship statistics are fascinating.

The *Mariner* left Cork Harbour on 2nd March, 1825 with 113 convict women on board and arrived in Sydney Cove on 10th July 1825 in the late evening.¹

The voyage had taken 130 days. There was one death on the journey - Eleanor Dalton aged 25, a native of Cork, sentenced for seven years for *stealing a pistol*, died of asthma before the surgeon was able to treat her.

The voyage was mostly uneventful though the ship's surgeon Dr. Harman Cochrane RN reported a rather mysterious ailment suffered by a number of women - he wrote that he treated at least half the women for epilepsy which became more apparent when the ship entered the tropics. He attended case after case, thinking that the reasons for the women's violent fitting and restlessness was due to the excessive heat which none would have experienced before, or perhaps it was linked to some contagion. Also, he raised the question of whether the women were simply mimicing each other. Remarkably, all settled down and there were no further cases once the ship sailed into cooler waters. ²

The women on board *Mariner* were a mix of country women, tried in various county courts across Ireland and women from Dublin.

The oldest *Mariner* woman was Margaret McKenna from County Down who was aged 59. One woman, Catherine McKenny, of Donegal, aged 52 died in Cork Gaol Hospital before embarkation.


One older woman was Cecily Toohey a dairy woman from County Mayo, aged 47. She was a widow with nine children. Cecily was not impressed with her circumstances and within 18 months of arrival,

had been reported as absconding twice from the Factory. 3 Her third offence was in September 1829 when she absconded from J. Henery of Sydney - she was aged 51 and still determined for her voice to be heard! 4

Three of the youngest women on board were all 18 years of age and single; they included Catherine Driscoll, a housemaid from Cork; Ellen Drew, a seamstress of Dublin and Mary Draper, a housemaid also of Dublin.

The *Mariner* women were working women and brought a range of occupations. Women from the country appear to be multi-skilled being described with at least two and sometimes three occupations. For example: Sally Bannon aged 25 of Omagh, Tyrone was a washerwoman, milker and butter maker; Anne Bergen aged 22 of Limerick was a milkmaid, butter maker and cheese maker; Mary Godfrey aged 40 of Clonmel, Tipperary was a butter maker, milkmaid and seamstress; Frances O'Connell aged 40 of Cork was a school mistress and needlewoman. Three Dublin women had 'town' trades - Lucy Fox aged 40 was a silk trimmer; Elizabeth Piggott aged 27, was a milliner and Rose Coleman aged 44, was a boot maker and shoe closer.

Of the 112 women landed in Sydney, 15 had family members in the Colony - all having been transported earlier. There were 13 women whose husbands had arrived previously - they included Sally Bannon, Elizabeth Heyburn, Rosanna Hayden, Catherine Langan, Mary Read, Hannah Roche, Mary Ryan, Mary Ann Wilson, Elizabeth Nicholson, Eleanor Moore, Sarah Murdock, Frances McCarthy and Mary McCabe. Catherine Armstrong had a sister and Bridget Kelly had a brother in the Colony.





The ship's Indent shows that another 21 women were married on embarkation, leaving husbands and some leaving children behind in Ireland. They included: Ellen Burke of Dublin whose husband was a *heraldry painter;* Catherine Byrne the wife of *a victualler in* Dublin; Susan Gafney, the wife of *a carpenter* and Mary Gernon, whose husband was *a gardener* in Dublin and Hannah Martin, married to *a tanner* also of Dublin.⁶ The women's husbands appear to have substantial trades so one wonders what circumstances led to their wives' crimes of theft.

Susan Gafney (aka Gaffney) certainly led a very unsettled life after her arrival - she appears in Colonial criminal records from November 1825 until 1849, being charged with a range of offences including absconding, drunkenness, insolence to her master and disorderly conduct. By 1830 she was serving time at the penal settlement of Moreton Bay for her serial offending. ⁷



New South Wales, Australia, Gaol Description and Entrance Book 1818-1830 - ancestry online.


Sadly, two women did not survive long after arrival in Sydney. Bridget Hogan, of Wicklow aged 22, a housemaid transported for the crime of vagrancy, died in early 1826 - her burial is recorded for 5th May 1826. She is buried in an unmarked grave, exact location unknown, in St. John's Cemetery Parramatta⁸- a life thwarted by illness perhaps. Elizabeth Heyburn aged 28, a seamstress from Antrim, was transported two months after her husband John had arrived on the convict ship *Asia 3* in April 1825. Elizabeth was charged with a Colonial offence in October 1826 and was in the Factory. A year later (24th May 1827), her request for permission to join her husband at 'Hunter River' was refused. On 19th February 1828, Elizabeth was sentenced to 13 hours in solitary for *deliberately breaking her wheel*.⁹

Elizabeth and John were not reunited. Elizabeth died at the Female Factory before the Census was taken in 1828 - Their family narrative is a tragic one of forced separation and a broken spirit. Elizabeth and John had two young children in Ireland.

When the Census was taken in late October 1828, there were 527 women listed in the Parramatta Female Factory Return and 67 children. After three years of arrival, there were a number of women from the *Mariner* either awaiting assignment, reassignment or under punishment at the Factory.

⁴Dive! Australian Submariners At War


In a working life of more than fifty years, Mike Carlton was one of Australia's best-known media figures in radio, television and newspapers. Beginning as a cadet journalist at the ABC, he became a war correspondent in Vietnam. He also reported for the ABC from Jakarta, London, New York and major Asian capitals. In television, he worked on the ABC's groundbreaking This Day Tonight current affairs program in the 1970s and for Nine Network News and A Current Affair. He was also prominent on radio at stations 2UE, 2GB and in Britain.

He is the author of several books on naval history, such as "Cruiser: the life and loss of HMAS Perth and her crew", "First Victory", and "The Scrap Iron Flotilla", just to name a few.

Mike Carlton will be speaking about his latest book "Dive! Australian Submariners at War" which tells the

story of the extraordinary deeds done by Australian Submariners in the First

and Second World Wars and, more recently, the Cold War.



Submariners are a special breed. Not for them a life on the ocean wave, the fresh air and sunshine of other naval sailors. With stealth and daring they go deep and dark, alone and unseen, in often dangerous waters. They sometimes call themselves the Silent Service, with good reason.

Kerima-Gae Topp, former PFFF Treasurer is now enjoying her new involvement with PFFF as a tour guide. As the owner of her own tour company, she is used to guiding but really loves her volunteer role at PFFF sharing the stories of the women and the Factory with groups of people that had no previous idea that the Female Factory even existed, to those who had descendants incarcerated within its walls.

Kerima-Gae is also a DJ on a local community radio station, Alive 90.5FM, based at Baulkham Hills, and for over 30 years she has been presenting her rock and roll show called 'Juke Box Jive' on a Friday night from 9pm till midnight. For the last two years the radio station has given awards for 'best shows' at their Christmas Party

and this year 'Juke Box Jive' was nominated for an award with two other shows that both have very strong listener numbers. ...and the winner ...Kerima-Gae's 'Juke Box Jive'!

As 'Juke Box Jive' is a request show where listeners can ring in or send a text to request a song, Kerima-Gae needs a helper to answer the phones. For many years Kerima-Gae's mother, the late Norma Topp, attended to that duty. These days Kerima-Gae's partner, John Brock, fulfils that role. Listeners to 'Juke Box Jive' are not only local but are located throughout Australia and with podcasting now available, her listeners in the USA can listen to the show at a time that suits them, rather than having to tune in at 5am local time, as some used to.

Kerima-Gae also presents the 'Monday Drive' shift from 4pm till 6pm, and whenever there is an event happening at the Female Factory, she is more than willing to promote it over the air.
