A NOTE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

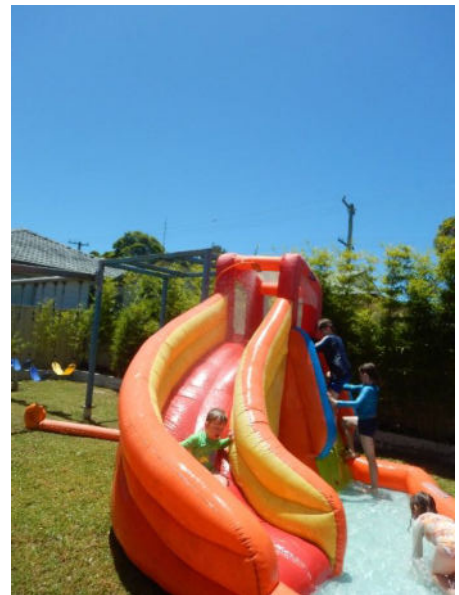
Lynda Smith – President – LM2

Special thanks to Kerrie Metcalfe and Melissa Metcalfe for their contribution in organising Matt as our speaker for the day.



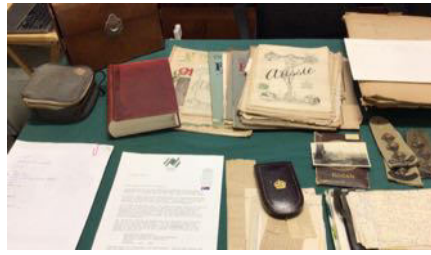



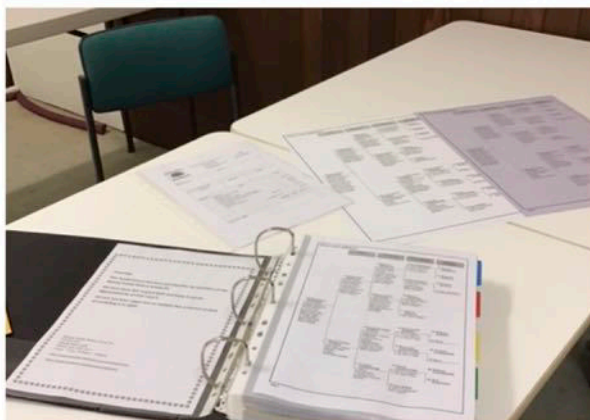

AUSTRALIA UNDER ATTACK: RAIL TRANSPORT AND AUSTRALIA'S WAR EFFORT

Australian War Memorial

Rail transport was the main means of shipping service personnel and military equipment around the country. However, Australian railways were not up to the demands of war. Each state used a different gauge, much of the rolling stock was unsuited for the task, and not until early 1943 was rail transport centrally organised. And yet the demand for quick and efficient means of transport only increased as coastal shipping was diverted for use by the armed forces or reduced by losses to enemy action.

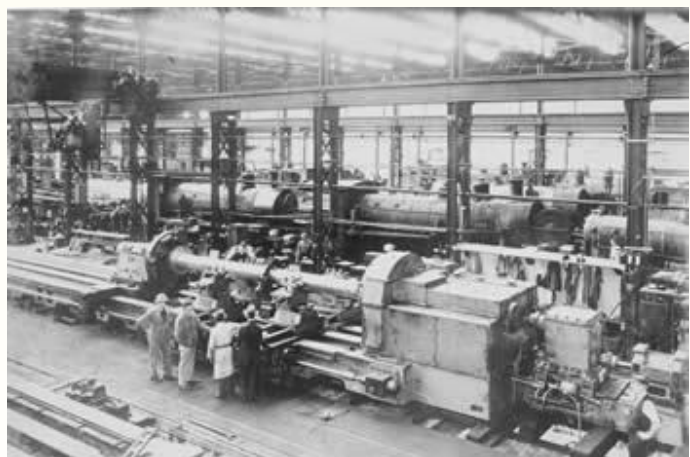
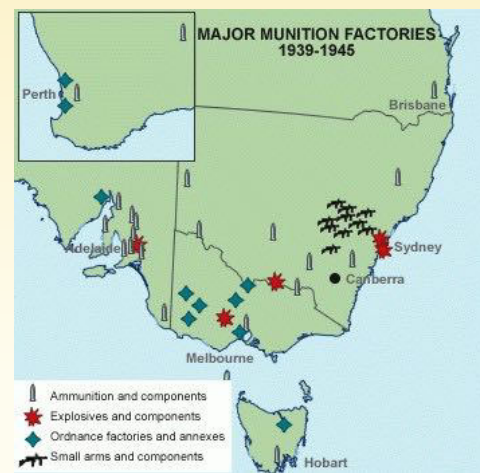
The rail network in Queensland was closest to the fighting. In 1942 the army had effective control of transport in northern Queensland. This led to the Queensland Railways Commissioner and the federal Minister for Transport clashing with the Minister for the Army, a dispute only solved through the Prime Minister's intervention.

By the end of the war hundreds of thousands of Australian and Allied soldiers, and even enemy prisoners, had travelled millions of kilometres on Australian trains.

Rail Workshops

State railway workshops were established centres of industry that played a vital part in Australia's war effort. In 1942 the Ipswich Railway Workshops, Queensland, was a major centre of wartime production. As well as constructing and maintaining the tracks, locomotives and rolling stock that were under

increasing demand from military as well as civilian traffic, the workshops produced war material and provided the expertise and tools to test

enemy weapons.

Ipswich Railway Workshops expanded in 1941 when the federal government constructed a Tool and Gauge Room. The skilled technicians at the railway workshop were able to provide support for the munitions factory at nearby Rocklea.

Troop trains in the Northern Territory

With sea lanes exposed to enemy attack the Allies had a major problem moving troops and supplies over land to Darwin. Troop trains could move armies from east to west but not from south to north. The narrow gauge Central Australian Railway from Adelaide ended at Alice Springs. A single line railway ran southeast from Darwin for 500km to Birdum. The 1000km from Birdum to the Alice was partially traversed by rutted vehicle tracks. In 1942 the AMF, CCC and the US Army worked together to build a road to connect the two railheads. When the link was complete truck drivers of the Australian Army Service Corps ran road convoys that transferred men and material that had been transported by troop train from supply depots and training camps in the south to the railhead to forward bases in the north.

Memories That's How it Was

Looking Back in Time

THE EVOLUTION OF THE PRENTICE FAMILY CHRISTMAS TREE.

When I was about three years old, my family [Mum, Dad, and newborn sister] moved into 39 Lone Pine Ave., Umina. Up until this point, we had been living with my maternal grandmother in Artarmon and Dad was working for NSW Fire Brigade out of Lane Cove Station. Mum and Dad had spent many weekends building a little 2-bedroom fibro and tile house in a newly opened estate. Originally, it was to be a weekender, but housing was still in short supply in Sydney. My dad's parents and extended family helped when they could. When my sister was born in 1958, my grandmother's house became too small for all of us, hence the move.



The soil around our home was largely sand. Mum had to work hard to get anything to grow, even grass. The surrounding bush was full of native plants, including spindly pine trees, paperbarks, old man banksias, bracken fern and flannel flowers. The road was dirt and we had an outside pan toilet and tank water. For a number of years our Christmas tree was one of these bush pines, chopped down by Dad. We filled a metal bucket with sand and stood the tree in this, occasionally giving it some water. If we were feeling especially festive, the bucket would be wrapped in Christmas paper. Decorations were very basic- home-made paper chains, a glittery paper angel made at school, a few store-bought baubles and not much else. Due to the nature of the long thin pine needles, it was difficult to get ornaments to stay in place.



Mum hated the needles dropping, so eventually, we purchased a very modern silver 'tinsel tree' that stood on 3 little metal legs and the branches had to be poked into holes in the timber 'trunk'. It all packed up quite tidily into a box and could be easily stored. We also had those concertina style fold-out bells, balls, garlands and other shapes that decorated the room. These were carefully refolded each January and the cardboard edges held together with a paperclip. Over the years, we added flashing lights, tinsel and more store-bought ornaments to our stash. At some point, the paper angel was replaced by a 'lovely' silver plastic star.



From mid-1966 we moved to Papua New Guinea. We came 'home' every two years, over the Christmas break and stayed with family, so we did not bother to



decorate our tropical homes in those years. When we weren't on leave, Mum did her best to make Christmas look 'normal'. This photo [Rabaul 1969, I believe] was taken using a timer, and tripod. Obviously, Dad didn't get the positioning quite right! The silver tinsel tree had been upgraded to a green plastic version with fold up branches.

Eventually, a 'real' look plastic tree with branches that hooked into the main trunk was purchased. This was taller, in old measurements, maybe six feet high, and was quite impressive. Christmas ornaments were now widely available in shops, and came in many types of material, from wood, to glass, plastic, felt and even metal. We ended up with a large box full and it was fun choosing a particular colour or theme each year.

I left home in 1974 to attend university, but always managed to spend some of the Christmas festivities with my parents. Mum and Dad always decorated the house and kept up our family traditions.

After Dad passed away in 1992, Mum started to simplify her life, and the big fake tree was replaced by a smaller one, possibly only three feet high, but the decorations stayed the same, with some handmade versions from assorted grandchildren added in for colour. After Mum moved into care, in 2018, my sister became custodian of most of the family decorations. She faithfully puts up the tree every year in her granny flat in the back yard of 39 Lone Pine Ave. The roads are no longer dirt, the bush is severely thinned out, but the block still belongs to my family. My parents would not recognise the larger modern home that my nephew has created onsite, but evolution is to be expected. We all have to move with the times. Jan. 2025.

MEMORIES OF CHRISTMAS PAST

I well remember the Christmases of my late teenage years;

But...before we got to the main day there was the Christmas Eve to get past. First was the Christmas Eve service at about 7pm down at the local Methodist church in Lakemba, after which a group of we younger people would gather and plan the remainder of the evening. The remainder of the evening consisting of about 5-6 hours of carol singing around the neighbourhood specifically in front of the houses of the older members of the congregation at their request. We usually had about 15 houses to visit and sing at, spread from Lakemba to Bexley, and Belmore to Condell Park so we covered a large territory but we loved doing it. Before we started there was the job of loading the old piano from the hall on to the truck and lashing it down (we didn't do anything

by halves) Of course everyone we visited wanted us (anywhere between 20 to 25 singers) to come in for a cool drink (soft) and some nibbles but it didn't take an Einstein to work out that we would never have enough time to get through the night and satisfy all requests so we restricted the food and drink to just 3 times during the night. One of the visits was always at midnight as the man who lived there was born on Christmas Day, so he & his wife not only got to hear carols sung but he also received a rendition of Happy Birthday



On Christmas Day it was always church service first, then home to open the presents, followed by a huge Christmas lunch with all the family. The luncheon feast (it can only be described as such) contained amongst other things cooked ham, roast pork, roast chicken, baked potatoes and vegetables, (a far cry from today's cold meats and salad) followed by Christmas pudding and custard. Sixpences from pre-decimal coin days were saved specifically for putting into the Christmas pudding mixture. The meal started with the customary pulling of the Christmas bon-bon and the telling of the groan inducing jokes contained therein.

After the dishes had been cleared away it was all outside to play French cricket until one by one we succumbed to the excesses of the previous hours. ... ❖

A CHRISTMAS TRADITION SPARKS A SEARCH.

Many years ago, I saw an episode of *Days of our Lives*, where the main character decorated her Christmas tree with baubles displaying the names of members of her family. I started doing this, using ballpoint tubes of paint. Since then, I have added extended family members and friends' names to our tree. Each year, the baubles go on our tree first, with the names of those who are no longer with us closest to our angel, and the rest scattered all over the tree.

This year, when I placed the bauble of my husband's cousin Jan high on the tree, it made me remember what a lovely person she was. Jan was a highly respected primary school teacher at



Carlingford West when she was in a car accident with a drunk driver. Jan died of her injuries, leaving a husband and two young daughters behind. Janice Irene MUNNS was born in 1941 and died in 1976. In 1963 she had married a New Zealander, Ivan Francis Leonard LITTLE in Concord West. They had two daughters, Jacqui and Nikki.

Over the years since Jan's death, my immediate family lost contact with Ivan and the girls. I was told Ivan remarried in 1978. The last update I had was in 1987 when Jan's father passed away. My in-laws were executors for Jack and they cared for his wife Muriel until she passed in 1990. They could not locate Ivan, Jacqui or Nikki at the time.

I decided the other day that I would check my records to see what I had on Ivan and the girls. Ivan was born in Dunedin in 1934 and came to Australia sometime between 1960 and 1963. He was a carpenter by trade. I checked the Ryerson Index to see if he had died but did not find him. Obviously, he could still be alive. The last Electoral Roll entry I have for him is 1980, where he and his second wife were still at the family home in Dundas.

Unfortunately, I did not know Ivan's parents or siblings at this stage. I tried PapersPast NZ for entries about Ivan, with no success. I then looked for LITTLE families in Dunedin, and took a leap of faith on a man called Francis William LITTLE, Ivan's full name being Ivan Francis Leonard LITTLE. I thought I was on a roll, finding all sorts of information about this man- WW2 records, Electoral rolls, even a will. There were also items in the NZ papers. I had the feeling this was not the right man though, as his military records for 1939 said he was single and that his next of kin, his father lived in Outram, not Dunedin. His will listed no wife or children, only nieces and nephews.

Then I started to find Electoral Roll entries for a Francis William LITTLE in other South Island locations, with a different occupation and a wife, Annie Edna. A crucial clue came from the newspapers- a Francis William LITTLE was taken to court for the non-payment of maintenance for his wife, Annie Edna and 2 children in 1937. On Ancestry I found a Police Gazette that detailed Francis' abandonment of his family. He owed £16 in maintenance. He was given the option of paying more per week to catch up, or go to gaol for three months. The article said that Francis was born in NZ in 1907. It appears Francis did not make good on his promise, and he was arrested on 14 Nov 1938 and released 11 Feb 1939. I looked at the newspapers again and found death notices for two infants- twins, one dying at 7 months in December 1938 and the second one in April 1942. Annie was living at 83 Glasgow St., Dunedin South on both occasions, with no listing for Francis. I do not know if Francis was the father of these babies, but the BDM Index lists him as so.

It was time to see if anyone on Ancestry.com was researching this couple. I had found a Francis William LITTLE marrying an Annie Edna

ABERNETHY in 1932 on the online NZ BDM site. I also discovered, on Findmypast, a travel document from 1972, showing Ivan returning to NZ at the same time that Annie LITTLE nee ABERNETHY died. Again, a possible coincidence, but the evidence was mounting up. I found someone in NZ who had this couple on their Ancestry tree and wrote to them last night. His tree had a daughter born 1933 and a private male, living, for Francis and Annie. I asked the researcher if he could confirm my theory. I received a reply this morning, agreeing with me. I had found Ivan's family!

The excitement did not end there. I found Annie Edna ABERNETHY being born in 1911 [NZ] and her parents George ABERNETHY and Johanna JOHNSTON. George was born in 1866, Shetland, Scotland to a Mitchell ABERNETHY and Jane/Jean. Mitchell and family emigrated in 1875 per ship ***Invercargill*** and soon started taking up land in the far south. Mitchell died in 1915, and Jane in 1921.



I have watched all episodes of the TV series **SHETLAND** to date, and recognised the names of some of the areas mentioned in the ABERNETHY records. How thrilling! Mitchell's parents were George ABERNETHY and Janet LESLIE [many spelling variations for both names]. George senior was a famer/fisherman in Reawick. His family is listed in the 1841 census, but by 1851 George is no longer with the family. Janet is listed as head, crofter, managing 2 acres, 5 children at home, plus her widowed mother and an aunt. In 1861 Janet had 4 acres. Her eldest son Mitchell was a fisherman, 3 other children still at home, plus her mother and aunt. Other researchers have Janet dying in January 1871. I haven't researched the NZ ABERNETHY's as yet.

Back to Francis William LITTLE- his background is a little confusing at present. It seems his mother was Rose BARRETT, born 1874 in London. She married Ernest Augustus LITTLE in 1895 [NZ] and had numerous children to him. Then in 1906 she registers Myrtle Violet with no father but in 1907 our Francis is registered as LITTLE. At some stage Rose and Ernest part company and she takes up with a Sydney Walter PLAW and has at least three children to him in 1909, 1910 and 1913. They do not marry until 1920. Sydney seems to have a previous wife and numerous children, so it is all quite puzzling at present. Sydney died in 1931 and Rose in 1934. Both are buried at Anderson's Bay Cemetery. It is interesting to note that the 1911 Electoral Roll has Rose and Sydney living at 68 Glasgow St., Dunedin South and Rose's son Francis's family at 83 Glasgow St in 1938... spooky!

Francis, or Frank and Annie must have reconciled at some point, because the electoral rolls for the 1950s, 1960s and early 1970s have

them living together with their daughter Irene. Frank paid for the Anderson's Bay Cemetery plot when Annie died, and her headstone reads: ILMO Annie Edna Little, loved wife of Frank and a loved mother, died 26 June 1972, aged 60 years. When Frank died in 1976, he joined Annie in the same plot, but nothing was added to the headstone.



So the quest for Ivan's family continues. ...

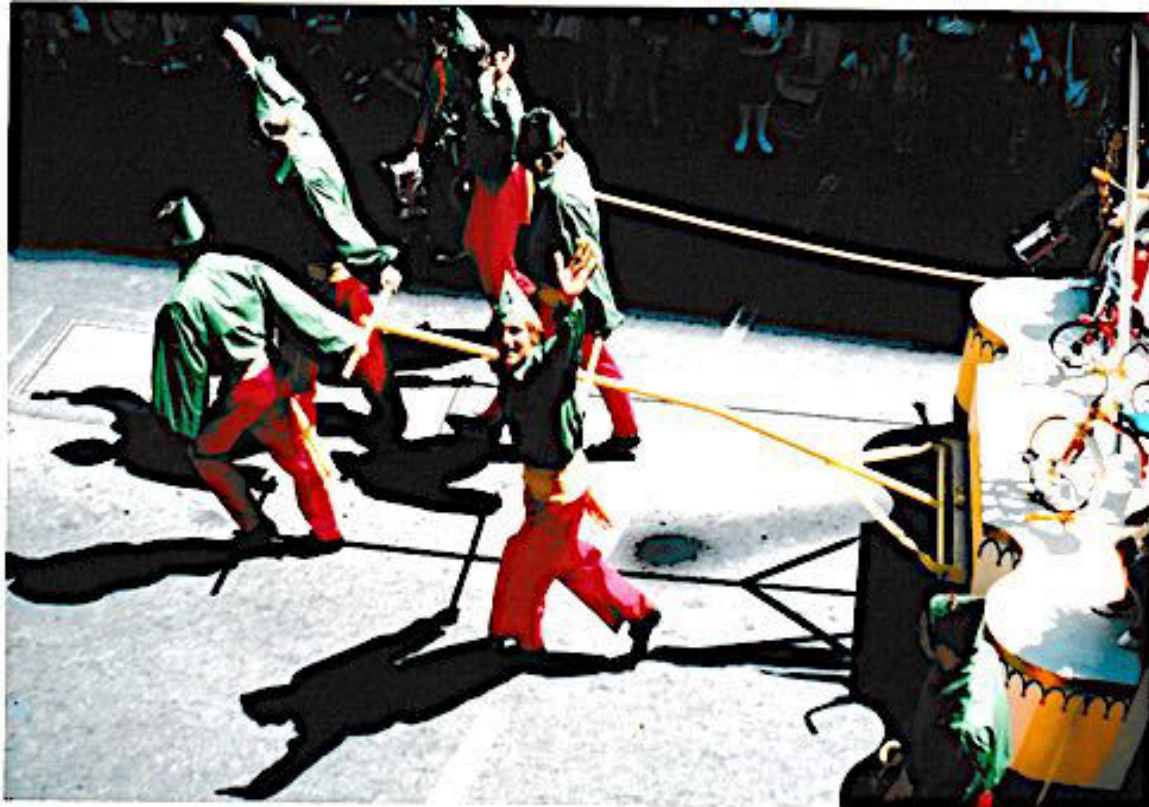
Looking back at my childhood in Adelaide, one of my favourite memories is of attending the John Martins Christmas Pageant. This Pageant commenced during the Depression of 1933 and its main aim was to escort Father Christmas to the Magic Cave at the John Martins Department Store. By 1935 the Pageant included the Lord Mayor's Christmas appeal float to raise money for underprivileged children and in 1939 a Pageant Queen was introduced for wartime fundraising. The Pageant was then abandoned until 1945 due to WWII and has continued since that year though John Martins closed in 1998 after trading for 132 years. Interestingly, the Company's business records are now held by David Jones archives. However, the Pageant goes on and there is a Facebook page with wonderful old photos of both the Pageant and the Magic Cave.

My mother started taking me when I was about 5 years old and I was allowed to sit at the front of the crowd with the other children while the adults stood behind us. It was a wondrous sight and we never wanted it to finish. There were bands playing and the floats held fairies on horseback, nursery rhyme characters, huge puppets and castles. The final float heralded Father Christmas on his sleigh with reindeers on his way to the Magic Cave which we also visited each year.

In 1993 the Pageant celebrated its diamond anniversary with 1600 people taking part and a crowd of 400,000 people.

Before we moved to Sydney I was able to take my two eldest daughters to the Pageant and, of course, they loved it just as much as everyone else.

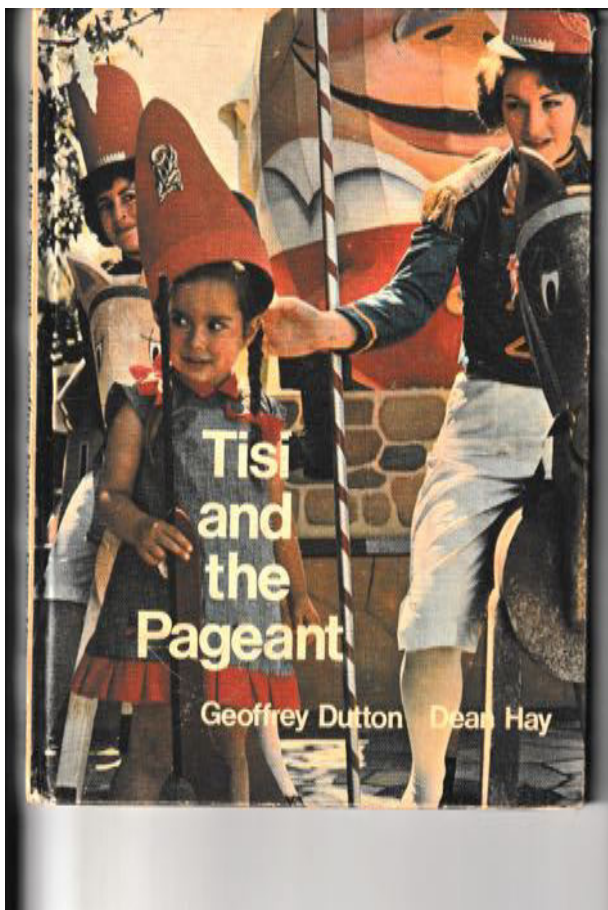
For some years my brother worked for John Martins and here he is waving up at me as we stood on a balcony watching the proceedings below.

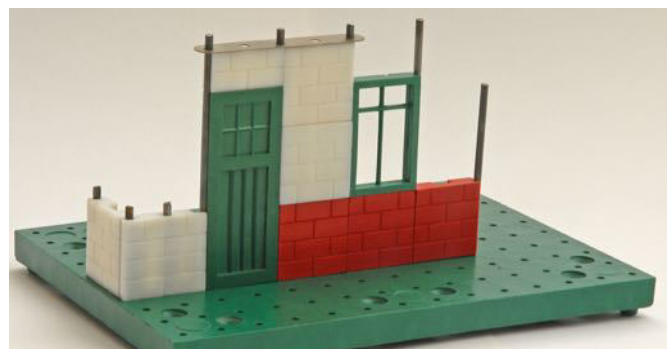
Bayko Building set contained an instruction book and assorted bricks, window frames, roof sections and metal rods for constructing a house.

This construction set system was developed by Charles Plimpton in the 1930s. It uses bakelite, one of the early plastics. Bayko combines the engineering aspects of Meccano with architectural principles of earlier building bricks. Made in red and white



the set came with bricks, window and door frames, roof tiles, pillars, arches and other pieces necessary for building miniature houses and other buildings. Each piece had vertical holes through which thin metal rods could be passed and which attached the model to the base.

Bayko was popular and exported widely. It was taken over in 1959 by Meccano, who marketed it as Meccano Bayko. Under this branding it continued to be manufactured until 1967. By that time Meccano itself had been sold to Lines Brothers, and cheaper alternatives such as Lego were available.





Some years ago, I saw a rather extensive collection on sale on Ebay, the seller was ex-senator Bob Brown.

The Powerhouse Museum have at least one set and I have just discovered Facebook page with 222 members, I have just joined.

THE SWEET TASTE OF CHRISTMAS.

My mother Cecily loved to bake. She was a stay-at-home mum for the first eleven years of my life and we rarely saw a store-bought packet of biscuits, unless it was something savoury like Saos or Jatz. Mum made the best biscuits, slices, pies and cakes. She studied Cake decorating at Gosford Tech. and was very talented with fondant! Luckily for us, she passed this talent onto our daughter.



Christmas cooking was special. Mum always made our Christmas puddings, initially using calico cloths and later aluminium steamers with Bakelite knobs. I still have a selection of these steamers lurking in my cupboard.

Of course, threepences and sixpences could be inserted into the batter, but Mum preferred to add them to each slice to make sure everyone found something. Mum's specialty was her Christmas cake, cooked weeks before,

and given the full royal icing treatment. Sometimes she used fancy paper to go around the sides, but the top of the cake always featured appropriate festive decorations. It was a shame to cut it, but I really loved getting the corner piece that had more icing to enjoy.

Rum balls, small fruit mince pies and white Christmas slice were on hand to feed to visitors, and yes, her rum ball recipe included real rum! Glacé fruit was a special treat at this time of year, and I loved the pineapple and the green and red cherries. Mum loved the ginger and the figs. We had nuts in their shell too, and the grown ups were kept busy cracking the harder ones for us kids. It was a real trick to get the two halves of a walnut out intact. I did not like the Brazil nuts or hazel nuts, and others seemed to agree as they were often the only ones left after Christmas.

Of course, Mum made her own custard for the pudding, but I preferred a big dollop of Peter's Vanilla ice cream. When I was eleven, [in 1966] we moved to Port Moresby in Papua New Guinea and the cost of living was so high, Mum took on an office job with the Forestry Commission to help our family finances. The tropical conditions were not conducive to her cream sponges and fairy cakes, but Mum did what she could to keep traditional sweet treats on hand during the festive season. When we returned to Umina in 1972, she and Dad took on a business, so there was less time for home baking. She still made an effort for her grandchildren's birthday cakes, weddings, anniversaries and even my 50th birthday. Her love of baking was even featured at her funeral, via the photo collage.

R.I.P. Cecily 1927-2022.

Cecily's White Christmas Recipe

Ingredients:

250gms copha	3 cups rice bubbles
1 cup desiccated coconut	$\frac{3}{4}$ cup icing sugar
1 cup full cream powdered milk	$\frac{1}{4}$ cup halved green glace cherries
$\frac{1}{4}$ cup sultanas	$\frac{1}{4}$ cup halved red glace cherries.

Grease a 19cm x 29cm lamington tin. Line with greaseproof paper. Melt copha in a saucepan over low heat and let cool. Combine all the other ingredients in a large bowl. Mix well, then slowly pour in the cooled melted copha. Mix well, then press mixture evenly into tin. Refrigerate until set. Cut into pieces with a warmed knife. Serve.

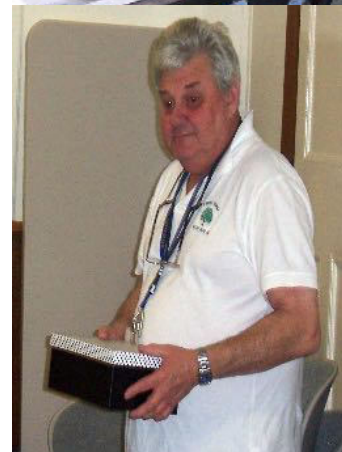
It is with deep sadness that I announce to you the passing on January 27, 2025, of ex member Frank Gero

Nathan Dylan Goodwin meets Long Lost Family.

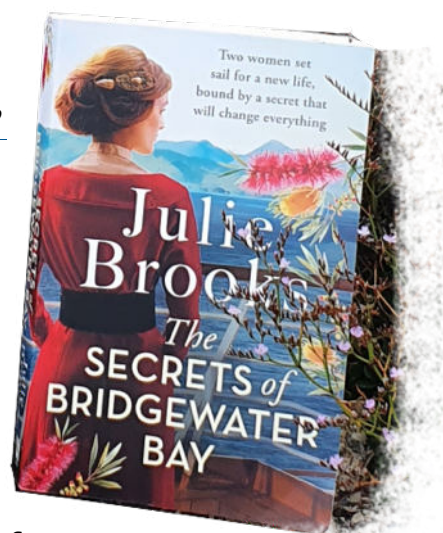
