

2025 Central Coast Regional Seminar

On 29 March, the RAHS and the Central Coast Family History Society will cohost a seminar for genealogists, historians, and researchers titled *Looking Outside the Square: Exploring Business and Biographical Records in Family and Local History.* The event will cover a range of resources essential for uncovering individuals' connections to historical businesses and institutions. Presenters will discuss how to access records from major archives, including the State Archives Collection, the State Library of NSW, the National Library of Australia, Reserve Bank of Australia and the Noel Butlin Archives Centre.

In addition, attendees will be introduced to the Historical Land Records Viewer (HLRV) and strategies for searching for individuals and land transactions. We will also discuss the Biographical Database of Australia (BDA), which offers detailed biographical information that aids in tracking individuals over place and time. This resource is ideal for those researching Australian convicts, soldiers, and other significant historical figures.

A Legacy in Print: Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society

We were pleased to host A Legacy in Print: Honouring the Past and Embracing the Future of the Journal of the Royal Australian Historical Society at History House on Tuesday, 25th February. RAHS President Iain Stuart and JRAHS Editor Samuel White were joined by past contributors Ben Hingley, Christine Yeats, David Carment and Leonie Bell. The event also marked our first hybrid event at History House, with participants joining us online and in person.

The speakers reflected on their experience with the journal, why they decided to submit their research, how being published benefited their professional and personal engagements with history, and what advice they could give to others. A key theme that cropped up was the importance of peer review and how the thoughtful comments and feedback provided by anonymous reviewers helped them improve their manuscripts and consider avenues they had not thought of. It was also noted how important the journal was to their professional development as historians. David reflected on his first academic article, which was published in the journal in 1977, and Ben discussed how the publishing experience had helped him write a chapter for his doctoral thesis. How to watch a flogging: Pop culture convicts and the making of

Australian history

RAHS Day Lecture
The True Story of the Dog on the Tuckerbox

In 1932, the Australian Prime Minister unveiled the statue of the Dog on the Tuckerbox, in Gundagai, NSW, on the Hume Highway halfway between Sydney and Melbourne. As the town's 'pioneer memorial', it would become arguably the most popular purpose-built tourist attraction until the 'Big Banana' in 1964. To coincide with the opening, Royal Doulton released a collection of souvenir ware; other souvenirs would multiply through the rest of the twentieth century.

The statue celebrated a popular story – told in an 1857 poem, and later poetry and song – about an unlucky bullocky whose team had become bogged 'nine miles from Gundagai'. To cap it all off, his dog sat on his tuckerbox. Or did he?





Mothers, Matrons and Lady Superintendents, women working in NSW prisons 1788-1969

By the end of the 19th century, female staff were thought to be more appropriate to manage institutions housing women and children. However, the status, everyday experience and career prospects for women in these senior appointments was often difficult and within the NSW prison service remained discomforting for male colleagues and problematic for the authorities.

Noeline Kyle says she wanted to find the details, the stories and the complexity which surely must have been part of their lives, their character, and their careers. This talk is the result of searching over for the lost and largely forgotten stories of senior women working in NSW prisons.





Sydney Astronomical Beginnings

ordinance officer, from his arrival in 1788 up to his connection with the 1932 construction of the Sydney Harbour Bridge. Dawes was a second lieutenant on HMS *Sirius*'s voyage as flagship of the First Fleet from England to Botany Bay. As shipboard astronomer, he was tasked with geographic position determination at sea and instructed to establish a permanent astronomical observatory on arrival in NSW. In fact, Dawes established not one but two observatories within a kilometre of Sydney's present-day city centre.





The session will be chaired by the PHA NSW-ACT President Dr Naomi Parry Duncan, who currently works as a <u>freelance historian</u>.





Australian Academy of Humanities: Grants and Awards

Applications are open for the Australian Academy of the Humanities **2025 Grants and Awards Program** for ECMRs working across the humanities.

Max Crawford Medal

The Max Crawford Medal recognises an early-career scholar in the humanities whose publications contribute towards an understanding of their discipline. This award relies on nominations, and we encourage all to nominate an ECMR doing exciting work in their field.

John Mulvaney Fellowship

Awarded to an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander early-career researcher or PhD student working in any area of the humanities, the John Mulvaney Fellowship provides \$4,000 to support research or fieldwork in Australia or overseas. This award accepts self-nominations.

McCredie Musicological Award

Recognising outstanding contributions in musicology by an Australian early career scholar. It is one of Australia's most prestigious awards for the study of musicology — from performance practice, music in the cultural context, through to the theory, analysis and composition.

Publication Subsidy Scheme

The Publication Subsidy Scheme supports early-career researchers with costs of up to \$3,000 associated with the publication of scholarly works that advance knowledge of the humanities.
