# **Convict Colloquium at History House**

History House hosted a gathering of historians on 14–15 March to share their research about the convict system in NSW and early colonial society. The colloquium considered the convict system in legal and archaeological contexts, colonial social history, women convicts, marriage, the military, Commissioner Bigge, departing convicts, the broader Pacific maritime context of the colony, and the use of AI to create spoken debates from the past. Brisk discussions followed each presentation with contributions about sources, methodology and issues arising from gaps in resources.

Drawn from academia, PhD students and independent scholars, the speakers presented their work in progress to an invited audience. The speakers were Deborah Oxley, Martin Gibbs, Paula Jane Byrne, Jan Barkley-Jack, Gary Sturgess, Kathrine Reynolds, Carol Liston, Nicola Garvey, Damian Gleeson, Perry McIntyre, Glen Lambert, Michael Flynn, Mark McLean, David Roberts, Matthew Cunneen, Chris Maxworthy and David Stuart.

With few opportunities in recent years to catch up and learn who was working on what, the two days buzzed with exchanges of ideas. With limited digitisation

# Transport Heritage Grant Project: Duck the Hassle Book Launch


The Sydney Bus Museum launched its 2023 Transport Heritage Grant publication, *Duck the Hassle*, this past weekend at the Sydney Bus Museum.

From 1972 to 1980, buses, ferries and trains all operated under the control of the Public Transport Commission (PTC). This Government department brought radical changes to the public transport system in NSW. 'Duck the Hassle' was a marketing slogan used by the PTC featuring the character of Donald Duck to encourage people to leave the car at home and catch public transport.

Duck the Hassle is a 320-page hardcover colour book authored by well-known Sydney transport historians Roy Howarth, Greg Travers and John Beckhaus. If you're interested in purchasing this publication, <u>you can find it here</u>.

The 2024 Transport Heritage Grant round saw the largest number of successful applications for the *exhibition, interpretation, education or publication* category. We hope your historical society will be inspired to submit a public transport project for the 2025 round, which will open in the second half of the year.

# **Exploring Chinese-Australian Heritage Landscapes**

On Wednesday, the RAHS hosted a special evening lecture, 'Chinese Australian Heritage: Sites, Landscapes, and Cultural Legacies,' presented by historian Stuart Read. The talk explored the diverse and lasting impact of Chinese communities on Australia's rural and urban landscapes.

Stuart examined Chinese water management techniques in agriculture, such as dam construction for crop irrigation, and the influence of Chinese businesses, temples, and community spaces in shaping urban streetscapes. He also challenged the audience to reconsider what we define as heritage, highlighting the diversity of sites of Chinese significance on the State Heritage Register.

Stuart spoke of the current efforts to list the Kwong War Chong & Co. premises on the State Heritage Register. Established in 1883 by Philip Lee Chun, the company served as a general store, trading hub, remittance agency, and community centre for Chinese market gardeners, especially those from the Zhongshan region. In 2019, Hector Abrahams Architects – whom the RAHS engaged to work on History House – conducted a heritage assessment of the

and social hub for Sydney's Chinese community. Read more here.

The talk also touched on Australian garden history, highlighting plant species introduced from China and the deep agricultural knowledge brought by Chinese market gardeners. Stuart even brought plant cuttings from the Royal Botanic Garden Sydney, emphasising this rich legacy. The event was a thought-provoking reminder of the far-reaching contributions of Chinese Australians and the evolving nature of heritage preservation.

The True Story of the Dog on the Tuckerbox

In 1932, the Australian Prime Minister unveiled the statue of the Dog on the Tuckerbox, in Gundagai, NSW, on the Hume Highway halfway between Sydney and Melbourne. As the town's 'pioneer memorial', it would become arguably the most popular purpose-built tourist attraction until the 'Big Banana' in 1964. To coincide with the opening, Royal Doulton released a collection of souvenir ware; other souvenirs would multiply through the rest of the twentieth century.

The statue celebrated a popular story – told in an 1857 poem, and later poetry and song – about an unlucky bullocky whose team had become bogged 'nine miles from Gundagai'. To cap it all off, his dog sat on his tuckerbox. Or did he?







**Hitler's Panzer Generals** 

The German panzer generals of the Second World War have been the subject of great historical interest. Much has been written about their campaigns and military decision making, however we know much less about the men themselves – their private thoughts, personal relationships, and ability to cope with the pressures of command.





#### **Building the Arch: The Sydney Harbour Bridge 1928–1930**

Most people in Sydney would know that the Sydney Harbour Bridge was opened in 1932, but fewer could tell you the years when the arch itself was built. 

## The Bravest Scout at Gallipoli



Harry Freame was the first Australian soldier to win the Distinguished Conduct Medal at Gallipoli. He risked his life again and again to scout the battlefield, reporting invaluable intelligence and relieving stranded soldiers. Some say he should have got the VC but didn't because he was half-Japanese, a fact he tried hard to conceal. After the war, Freame became a soldier settler and champion apple grower. But in the lead-up to World War II, he was recruited into Australian intelligence.



**Royal Society of NSW: New Research Guides** 

Australia's colonial and post-colonial history includes many conflicts and controversies. Two new digital reference guides could help modern historians and writers to better understand how many British-European migrant scholars studied, mapped and interpreted Indigenous people, places, animals, plants, geology, chemistry, fossils, weather conditions and astronomical phenomena.

After celebrating 200 years of its intellectual culture in 2021–2022, the Royal Society of NSW (RSNSW) produced two PDF research guides that can be downloaded via its website, <u>royalsoc.org.au</u>. These are:

#### Bicentennial Bibliography

Listing and hotlinking to online scans of several thousand articles that were originally published by the RSNSW, and earlier colonial learned societies, from 1821 to 2021. Links take researchers to digital facsimiles of each article, as archived by the Smithsonian Institution's online Biodiversity Heritage Library. Keyword searches allow historians to quickly search for articles by author, names of particular people, or by keywords such as star, Deniliquin, x-ray, photography, Aborig, longitude, sandstone, or dinosaur.

#### Presidents' Profiles

Listing 122 Presidents and Vice-Presidents of the RSNSW and its preceding societies since 1821. This PDF includes painted and photographic portraits and biographical summaries of many RSNSW Presidents, including early Governors of NSW (although information about some Presidents has not yet been found). This PDF is also keyword searchable, allowing historians to identify and focus on trailblazers from specific fields of research or professional backgrounds.

#### **MHNSW Webinar: Small Debts Register**

In 1846, an Act was passed to consolidate the law regarding the recovery of small debts in NSW. Claims for the recovery of debts up to the value of £10 could be heard and decided on in the plaintiff's local Court of Petty Sessions. These courts dealt with a variety of debts, including those relating to goods sold, wages due, money lent, lodgings, and assault or injury.

This webinar will explore the newly indexed and digitised Small Debt Registers held in the NSW State Archives Collection, and how they can highlight the history of NSW local communities.



**Community Heritage Grants 2025 Round - Now Open** 

#### What are the Community Heritage Grants?

The Community Heritage Grants (CHG) program supports community-based organisations to identify and care for Australian, moveable cultural heritage collections which are publicly accessible, locally held and nationally significant.

#### How we can help

The CHG supports small, local groups with limited funding and staffing resources, who would benefit from access to professional cultural heritage expertise. Grants of up to \$20,000 are available to help organisations undertake a three-stage journey to assess their collection, identify collection care recommendations and implement practical improvements.

Non-profit, incorporated organisations and some government agencies –

encouraged to apply. For more details visit the CHG website.

#### **Activities we support**

In the first two stages, organisations work with experienced heritage practitioners to produce reports that:

- Explain the meanings and value of their collections (a significance assessment)
- Outline the condition of their collections and provide a conservation and collection management plan (a preservation needs assessment).

In the third stage, funding is available to:

 Undertake conservation and collection management activities, as recommended in the preservation needs assessment. This may include conservation, purchase of collection housing and storage materials, environmental control and monitoring equipment or digitisation.

CHG also offers grants for collection management training projects or cataloguing and collection management system software.

#### **Applications and guidelines**
