DNA Painter: Jonny Perl has introduced a powerful new feature—the DNA Matrix tool. You can use the tool to visualise and analyse how much DNA a group of testers share with each other, offering a clearer picture of relationships and aiding in the identification of common ancestors. Ancestry Pro Tools: Upcoming AutoCluster Feature

Ancestry has announced an AutoCluster feature as part of its Pro Tools subscription. This tool will automatically group your DNA matches into clusters based on shared DNA (similar to what MyHeritage already offers), helping to identify branches of your family tree more efficiently. The new feature will be gradually rolled out over the next few months. This Ancestry video explains the feature - begins about the 4 minute mark.

It combines information from our Historic Environment Portal, Canmore and our Property in Care Collections, as well as Scran which holds images and media from galleries, museums, libraries and archives across the country."
