Cessnock Coalfield and the Scottish Connection




The focus of this presentation is the Aberdare South Colliery, a mine on the edge of the Cessnock Coalfield. Founded in 1913 with capital raised by the Caledonian Coal Company, this was to be the greatest mine in the southern hemisphere, producing coal equivalent in quality to the best in the world. All that is left is a tall chimney, a crumbling engine house, an overgrown pit dam and a ruined pub, its gracious second floor and wrought iron balcony removed. The mine closed forever in 1929.



Overview of February meeting

Our February meeting was a fascinating presentation by our member Dr Jude Conway. Jude spoke about the challenge that Zell Meehan faced to keep her job in 1956 when she married. Her talk was titled Zell Meehan v Newcastle City Council (1956): The right of women to continue working after marriage.

In 1950, Zell Meehan was appointed secretary to the Lord Mayor of Newcastle. In 1956, aged 37, she married and as was the custom of the time, was expected to resign. However, Zell refused to do so.

Jude gave us an in-depth examination of Zell's career, the battle that ensued and the attitudes towards women at the time and since.

On 22 August 1918, Zell was born as Amy Gazell Burke at 38 Clarke Street, Plattsburg, an old Newcastle mining village. She attended Plattsburg Primary School and was then selected to attend Newcastle High School, where she successfully completed her high school studies achieving many awards. Whilst Zell was in 5th year, her father unexpectedly passed away impacting her dream of becoming a teacher due to financial burdens. Instead, she completed a business course at the Newcastle Business College. Following her course, she commenced work in 1936 as a typist at the Electricity Supply Department. In 1950 she applied for the position of secretary to the Lord Mayor where she was successful due to her outstanding qualifications. During her long Lord Mayoral secretarial career, she was secretary to eight Lord Mayors, having an extremely busy and varied career.

At the time of Zell's marriage to Pat Meehan, the wide-ranging belief was that married women should stay at home because the man was the main breadwinner. Zell however refused to follow the Council custom of handing in her resignation. It was recommended that Zell be suspended. A controversy raged for weeks in the media. The Lord Mayor at the time, Doug McDougall strongly opposed the suspension of Zell as he stated she was highly qualified and that the Council custom was very outdated. In the end the Council voted 13 to 5 in favour of Zell retaining her employment and also rescinded any resolutions on their books regarding employment of married women.

Zell eventually retired in 1983 and passed away on 15 February

1998, aged 79. She is buried with her husband Pat, in the Catholic section of the Sandgate Cemetery. A Newcastle Herald article following her death stated 'Newcastle was all the better for her determined stand'.

Volunteer Librarian's Handbook

It has been a long time since our volunteer Librarian handbook was updated. In an effort to bring it up to date, I will revise one item per month as this is a big job. The first involves the Wifi and the Wifi extender in the 'back' room.

Wifi:

Wifi passwords are displayed in each room in the Library.

The modem is located in the 'blue' (computer) room. It should always be left ON.

We have a new extender in the 'back' (meeting) room. Whenever the Library is open the extender should be turned ON at the powerpoint next to the jug. (The extender itself is out of reach but there is an instruction sheet on the wall near the extender.) At the end of Library, pack up the 'back' room and turn OFF both the extender and the jug powerpoints as well as the lights, fans and air conditioners.

NOTE: All other electrical equipment in the back room (powerpoints operating the fridge and the printers) should be left ON.

On Sunday 16 February 2025 at 10 am 14 NFHS members met in our rooms and 5 via Zoom to vote on the proposed changes to our Constitution.


